IMPORTANT THINGS TO REMEMBER!

With the start of the school year, it is always good to go over community and parent expectations:

- 1) Parents are encouraged to serve as classroom volunteers. Please contact your child's teacher to find out more details.
- 2) All visitors are required to report to the office and sign in when entering the school when school is in session (9:05am 3:30pm). Visitors must wear a "Visitor's Sticker" at all times while in the building.
- 3) School dismissal is at 3:59 pm. Our teachers need the entire school day to ensure that our Cougars learn all that is needed.
- 4) We understand that there are times in which a student may need to leave school early. To pick up a child during the school day, parents must come to the office, sign the child out and wait for the office staff to call the child to the office.
- 5) As a safety precaution and to minimize interruptions to the instructional environment, non-staff members (parents, guardians, siblings) shall not pick their children up at classrooms or be present in the hallway during the school day. Please utilize the front lobby or the area by the MPR. Visitor's passes are not issued after 3:30pm.
- 6) When calling the school to make alternative dismissal plans, please try and do so before 3:00pm as many classrooms are engaged in learning throughout the building.

Have you heard? Carpenter's Fun Run is RESCHEDULED for October 13th?

Our students will be running, jogging or walking in our annual Fun Run. Each student is asked to raise money to help support our school. 100% of the pledges collected will provide supplies for classrooms, field trips and programs for our school.

Birthday Treat Policy

In an effort to support our district health initiative for students, we are celebrating birthdays differently at Carpenter School. If you would like your Cougar to celebrate their birthday at school, we ask that you adhere to the following guidelines:

- 1. Please notify your child's teacher 1-2 days prior to the day that you would like your celebration. This allows our teachers to plan accordingly.
- 2. If you are sending food, we ask that you only send in fruit, vegetables and/or healthy snacks such as; crackers, popcorn, etc. These foods should be brought in ready-to-serve and easy for children to handle.
- 3. It will also be helpful if all necessary materials are provided (paper plates, napkins, etc.).
- 4. You may also send a small token gift instead of a snack, like pencils, erasers, bookmarks, etc. Other suggestions: donate a book to the classroom library or we can have an additional 5 minutes of recess in honor of that student.
- 5. Our Cougars who have birthdays in the summer are encouraged to celebrate their "half-birthday" or make arrangements in the Spring.
- 6. Invitations for outside birthday parties may be brought to school and passed out if all students in the classroom are invited.

Number of books students can check out:


- 1 Book- Young 5, Kindergarten, and 1st Grade

Here's what we know:

Across the United States, there has been a concentrated effort to tackle chronic attendance challenges – 89% of school districts report some level of chronic absence. In Washtenaw County, nearly 12,000 students missed more than 10 days of school during the 2014-2015 school year. Of the 12,000:

- · 20% missed 19-35 days of school.
- Another 17% were severely chronically absent having missed more than 36 days of school.



Defining Terms:

Average Daily Attendance: The percentage of a school's student body that attends on a typical day.

Truancy: Is defined as a certain number or frequency of unexcused absences.

Chronic Absence: Is defined as missing 10 percent or more of school days in a school year. This comes out to 18 school days in a 180-day school year. This includes excused and unexcused absences.

Attendance Matters!

School attendance plays an important role in academic success.
Children often fall behind in school if they frequently miss all or part of a school day.

You can help your child succeed in school by supporting their daily attendance. You can also help by understanding how schools define absences.



Attendance Matters!

"Talking to your child's school about attendance will help your child achieve"

Absences are a warning sign there may be a problem.

The **attendance** rate is important because students are more likely to succeed in academics when they attend school consistently. It's difficult for the teacher and the class to build their skills and progress if a large number of students are frequently absent.

Start Strong: Absenteeism in the first month of school can predict frequent absences later in the school year. Nearly half of all students that missed more than two days of school in September went on to miss almost a month of school.

Chronic Absences: An estimated 5 to 7.5 million students in the United States miss almost a month of school every year. This adds up to over a year missed by the time of graduation.

Early Absences Lead to Attendance Issues in Later Grades: Absenteeism starts early. One in 10 kindergarteners and first graders are considered to be "chronically absent."

Chronic Absence = Missing two or more days per month: Research shows students who miss 10 percent of school, or two days per month, show negative academic progress. In some schools, that adds up to 18 days a school year and is considered to be chronic absence.

Third Grade Reading Level: Poor attendance can keep children from reading proficiently by the end of third grade, which is shown to negatively affect their chances of graduating on time.

Dropout Indicator: By sixth grade, a chronically absent student is shown to have a significantly higher chance of dropping out of high school.

Excused Absences Hurt Too: Excused absences are just as negative as unexcused ones. Suspensions add additional missed time in the classroom, which in turn increases the dropout risk.

At Risk Students are at Risk for Absence: Students from low-income families are four times more likely to be chronically absent. Reasons for this are often out of the student's control, such as unreliable transportation, unstable housing, and a lack of access to quality health care.

Every Minute Matters: If a student is 10 minutes late to school each day, this adds up to missing more than 33 hours of class time. A student with a 90 percent attendance average for Kindergarten through 12th grade will miss over a year of accumulated time in the classroom.

Excused Absences due to chronic health conditions:

If you expect that your child will have multiple absences for medical appointments or chronic illness, it helps to be proactive and plan ahead. Early and frequent communication with the school can prevent problems later on. Here are some ways to start the conversation:

- Reach out to the school administrator, teachers, counselor, and nurse. These people can be advocates and work with you.
- Develop a plan so your child can catch up on schoolwork. Some ideas include planning for catch-up lessons, having homework delivered to your home, or arranging for educational services at home.
 Whenever possible, plan ahead so that your child can have materials before the absence.

When your child is absent for medical reasons, contact the school.

Many health care providers will write a letter to the school at the beginning of the school year or when your child is first diagnosed. The letter could explain:

- The diagnosis in general, and what impacts it may have at school and on school attendance.
- How often the child will be having doctor's office visits or may be absent for illness.
- Accommodations that may be helpful.

Absenteeism Intervention Protocol:

Points of Intervention I: 5-10 days missed:

- · School personnel meet with student.
- · Parent is contacted by school.
- · Any supports needed?

Points of Intervention II: 10-15 days missed:

- · Letter sent to parents/guardians regarding attendance.
- A meeting is scheduled with parents/guardians to develop an agreement to improve attendance.
- Determine if screenings or evaluations should be conducted.

Points of Intervention III: 15-20 days missed:

- Letter sent to parents/guardians regarding attendance.
- A meeting is scheduled with parents, student, school personnel, and Access & Opportunity Advocates.
- The meeting will result in development of an attendance agreement to improve attendance.
- A three week follow up with parents, student, school personnel, and Access & Opportunity Advocates to review any improvement in attendance.

Points of Intervention IV: Persistent absenteeism:

- · Letter sent to parents/guardians regarding attendance.
- A meeting is scheduled with parents, student, school personnel, and Access & Opportunity Advocates.
