Members of The Board of Education

First let me offer my appreciation and respect for all that you are doing and all that you have been through in the last few months. You have made some of the most difficult decisions we as a district have ever faced.

As a parent, teacher in the district and a community member I do genuinely see the advantages and disadvantages to both returning to school in person and starting school remote. It is a very difficult decision. With the recent recommendation of the Summit County Public Health Department, this decision is intensified.

Living in the community, I hear multiple reasons why a parent may choose remote over in person at this trying time. Some of these reasons are not fear of the virus, but rather uncomfortable with their child in a mask for the day or maybe the inability to adjust their personal schedule when a student may not be allowed at school. At this time of uncertainty we have to respect the decisions we each make.

At Tuesday's Board Meeting, there was discussion of eliminating extra curricular activities if we begin the year remote; also possible discussion of not allowing students who may choose to be on line when we do return in person. I do understand the thinking behind this stance; I get it, it doesn't seem right to allow students to participate in extra curricular opportunities if they are not in school. Our world that we are in right now is not right; what is right from past times is not necessarily right in today's times. At this point we have to do what is right for all of our students. Our students have lost a lot; we have to leave the opportunities that are somewhat safe available to our kids.

If we don't allow our students to have extra curricular opportunities they will likely find the opportunity elsewhere. This may mean losing quality students to neighboring districts or we may lose students to private extra curricular organizations. If we are the only one in our league or in our county to eliminate athletics, I fear the lasting effects this could have on our students and our school. The loss of practice time will put our students and our school at a huge disadvantage when we do get back to the way things were before covid-19.

Know that you are not alone in your frustration and disappointments, we as a community do understand. You cannot begin to compare extra curricular opportunities involving small groups of students who are having a temperature recorded and a list of symptoms discussed each time they report to a building of 700 students and staff members. Unfortunately it is not realistic to record a temperature and discuss symptoms with 700 people. Most of our athletes and extra curricular opportunities are outside at this time, this allows for much easier social distancing compared to being in a building.

Returning to school is unique compared to other businesses opening and returning to their normal. Many businesses have the option to limit attendance; schools do not have this option. Schools are important for so many reasons, without question, academics is the most important reason. Extra curricular opportunities, ALL extra curricular opportunities are often equally important for our students. It is understandable that all opportunities are not going to be possible in the midst of covid-19; but, we can't penalize all of our students by eliminating opportunities that have been deemed safe by those with the required knowledge to make the recommendations. We need to continue to give our students every opportunity that we can give them as safely as we can. It is sometimes these extra curricular opportunities that motivate our students to work for the education that we are providing.

As you move forward in making yet another very big decision, please remember our kids did not ask to get stuck in the middle of covid-19; our kids did not ask the Summit County Public Health Department to make the most recent recommendation regarding returning to school. Our kids have asked and are asking for some sense of normalcy. Just as was discussed Tuesday evening, we are not qualified to make the recommendation regarding school restarting; we have to follow those who are supposed to have the knowledge to make those recommendations. We must do the same with our athletics and extra curricular opportunities. Summit County Public Health has recommended that low risk extra curricular opportunities are allowed to compete. We need to follow this recommendation for our kids' sake.

Thank you for your time and know that your work and time are not going unrecognized.

Dear Superintendent Sincere, Board of Education members and SLACT members:

The teachers of Springfield Local Schools and members of SLACT (Springfield Local Association of Classroom Teachers) desire to be back in our classrooms teaching the students in our school district. However, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, we are unable to engage students with in-person education. This is because safety measures for students and teachers are compromised due to the increased risk of contracting the virus. As you know, the recent data from the Summit County Department of Public Health shows the percentage of cases in Summit County for children under 17 years of age, has continued to increase.

We acknowledge that there has been a lot of hard work this Summer by the Administration, the Return to School Committee, Mrs. Meadows, and Mr. Beun working on a plan to make our school district safe. We thank you for your time, dedication and efforts.

SLACT believes we are unable to return to in-person learning at this time. A return to in-person learning will not be what was normal. There will be difficulty with social distancing due to class size demands. Due to demands of new cleaning protocols, instructional time will be reduced. This is also true for handwashing hygiene practices, resulting in a loss in instructional time.

We applaud Superintendent Sincere's decision for remote learning with emphasis on the safety and social-emotional concerns for all students. We thank the Board of Education maintaining the health and safety of all students as a number one priority.

SLACT is committed to meeting the he needs of students in any option (in-person, hybrid, remote learning) that focuses on safety first and consistency throughout the district. Let us work together for a successful school year.

Dear Board Members,

My name is Kevin Hanna. I am a resident of Springfield Township, teacher at the Jr High, the 8th grade boys basketball coach, and the high school girls golf coach. First I want to thank you all for the countless hours of work you have been putting forth in your service to our school district. On Tuesday, I watched the school board meeting and listen to some great discussion. I would like to address the idea that sports and extra curriculums should be shut down if school goes remote.

Specifically, golf has implemented multiple safety precaution that just can not be implemented at the school building site. When a student/athlete arrives at the course or bus, temperatures are taken and logged and a series of health based questioned are asked. When buses are boarded, the 6 student athletes board, wearing masks, and stay spread out. They board back to front and unload front to back to maintain social distancing. When arriving, course rules then apply. They warm up on the practice green with masks while maintaining social distancing. Once they tee off we are sending 6 student/athletes out onto 200 acres of land vs. 700 students into a two story building. Comparing the occupation of a school building with 700 students to 6 student/athletes on 200 acres is comparing apples to oranges. While playing, golfers can not use rakes for the bunkers or even use ball washers. The courses have removed those items. In additions the pins are not to be touched or removed.

Over a week ago I personally spoke with Tonia Berford, The Director of Environmental Heath in Summit County. She explained to me and then sent a follow up email to Mr. Sincere that golf is a low risk sport and that it was their recommendaton that the low risk sports continue with the above reference safety precautions. This is still currently the departments position. These experts have now recommended that schools begin remote. They understand that a building full of students is a much higher risk then allowing teams to move forward with a low risk golf season.

I understand the position some of you are taking. On the surface, it would only make sense to shut down extra-curriculums if school goes remote. However when you look at and understand all the logistics that make the sport of golf much safer then going back to school then I believe a logical conclusion would be the same conclusion the Summit County Health Department reached. That conclusion is golf is a low risk activity and is recommended to continue.

Please understand that these golfers have already started their season. They have set goals for the season and set goals to play at the next level. Removing this opportunity only puts them at a disadvantage as other schools in the area continue with their golf seasons. I love what I do and I genuinely care for the health and well being of my players, students, and fellow coaches. I ask you to look at all the information before you make your decision about the future of a program that means so much to these student/athletes, their parents, and the community.

Dear Springfield Board of Education member,

As the parents of a 2020 Springfield graduate and another student who will be a sophomore at the high school this fall, we would like to ask the school board to please consider continuing the high school golf schedules as currently planned.

There is no doubt that COVID-19 has brought with it changes that we never, in a million years, could have anticipated. As a family, as a school district and as a society, we have been forced to adapt and make changes for the good of everyone involved. But as parents to two children who have been involved in Springfield varsity sports, we have witnessed firsthand the numerous benefits that high school sports have provided. Our daughter is currently a member of the girls varsity golf team, which has been practicing and playing for almost a month and a half. The team has numerous safety measures in place - temperatures are taken, health questions are asked, masks are worn on the bus, they use their own equipment at all times, they don't rake the bunkers or even pull the pins, but most importantly, the girls are OUTSIDE with no need or requirement to be in each other's space. Golf is such a low risk, no-contact sport that it was one of the few activities allowed even when a sizable chunk of the U.S. was shut down earlier this year. In addition to the low risk involved with golfing, the program gives our daughter the desperately needed social interaction that is crucial to the mental well-being of teenagers and provides a much-needed sense of normalcy in these crazy times.

Additionally, we ask you to consider how the cancelation of the golf season would affect the future for the students who are considering playing after high school. I know there are many of our golfers who would like to continue playing while in college. With the cost of a college education being almost prohibitively high these days, students need scholarships more than ever. If you haven't had a chance to look at the kids who are currently golfing for Springfield, it would be well worth your time to check out a match or two. They're an extremely bright and talented group of kids who have tremendous potential. But they may not get that chance if their season is cut short.

Aside from the personal aspects of why we ask you to allow golf to continue, we would also be willing to provide you with information from studies that indicate that participation in sports is positively linked to higher grades, higher test scores and a lower likelihood that students will drop out of school. As parents and educators, isn't it our job to encourage them to give it their all and be the best they can be? High school sports does all of that and more.

We know that this is an extremely difficult time for everyone, but we ask that you please allow the golf season to continue as planned. Not just because of the many reasons mentioned above, but because the students desperately need some good news in what's been a year of nothing but the opposite.

As of right now, the girls on the Springfield High School golf team are very unsure if we are going to have a season. The pandemic has taken a toll on everyone the past couple of months. I feel, along with many others, that our golf season should continue on.

To start, I would like to bring a key point to your attention. Golf is a low contact sport and we have made adjustments to keep ourselves safe while playing. For example, when using the putting greens we wear a mask and keep at least six feet apart. We are no longer passing score cards and have our own which helps to eliminate the spread of germs. These are just two of the many ways we have changed how we play to keep ourselves, along with others, safe.

Another way we are eliminating the spread is by having our temperatures taken before every golf match and practice. Along with getting our temperatures taken, each girl is asked multiple questions about symptoms that we are required to answer truthfully to. Every coach is required to wear a mask during every match and practice which is also eliminating the spread. It is easy to make adjustments when needed if it means being able to keep our season.

Many people feel that if the school chooses to go online, sports should be canceled as well. Going into school, hundreds of children are close to each other. Whereas a golf match places seven girls on two hundred acres. This is the main reason as to why golf should remain in season. It is easy to keep our distance from other people when on the golf course, unlike in the school building.

In conclusion, everyone is entitled to an opinion. All anyone can do is look at the facts. All I ask is that you consider how taking our golf season away would affect every single one of us players.

Dear Springfield High School Board Members,

I completely understand how difficult it is to make decisions at this point in time. Trying to keep everyone safe and healthy is everyone's biggest priority right now. In the event that we students do not go back to school, I wanted to express the thoughts I have on continuing the golf season. Personally, I had my sophomore season in softball canceled because of the school closing last spring. The effect that this had on my mental health was very negative. Having to stay home inside, even though it's what is best, is very hard for teenage kids to do. Some teenagers already struggle very badly at home with the family they are with and the only escape they have is activities with the school. While some sports are at high-risk, golf is a low-risk sport and I would like you to have an open mind on continuing our golf season.

Although you may ask, how is it possible to have a sports competition if it is not safe to have school? This is a very good question but during golf, we are on 200 acres of land outside, rather than cooped up in a building, allowing us to ensure farther than six feet distance between one another. During the golf season, our coaches take our temperatures and ask us questions in regards to the virus before every practice and before we get on the bus ride for away matches, which is something the schools would not be able to do. This ensures we do not have symptoms and we always stay six feet apart from one another, even on the bus. We also heavily enforce masks on bus rides as well as on the practice putting greens. These factors not only keep us safe but also allow us to be able to see others socially distanced and be outside instead of inside, improving what our mental health could lead to if we had to stay at home with no activities. Being outside and walking the course also brings a sense of normalcy and calmness to us. After all, we are spread out more outside on a golf course than in a school building, we get our temperatures taken, wear masks, and more to ensure our safety during the golf season.

Not only is golf helpful for our mental health, but for me personally, I want to play sports in college and this junior season is the most important season for college coaches to look at us golf. In the event that golf was to be canceled, I along with multiple others on our golf team would miss our opportunity to play in college. Although you may say we still have our senior year to have a chance for college scouts to look at us, we would have missed our junior year and would not be the best golfers we could have been if we do not play this year. Canceling golf this year would risk any chance we have at scholarships, which most of us golfers want to achieve.

In the end, golf, as the Summit County Health Department states, is a low-risk sport. Being out on the golf course is safer than being in a school building because we are spread out over hundreds of acres and each girls' temperature is taken before beginning anything. There are also only around twelve golfers, rather than several hundred students which makes golf very easy to social distance. We also do not share our scorecards with opponents to ensure we have as little contact with other people as possible. I thank you for your time and I hope you consider continuing the golf season regardless of if we go back to school or not

I beg you to consider not cancelling my golf season. As a three year member on the team I have learned many life lessons and met many new people. By cancelling our season you would not only be taking away our chances to meet new people but also our chances to better ourselves through this challenging time. Golf provides us with an important outlet during this stressful period of our lives.

Golf is the one sport that you can truly social distance the entire time. There are only 6 of us in an outside setting, and on over 200 acres of land. We do not exchange scorecards or share any equipment, we are screened before every practice and match, there is a set golf course protocol that we follow. The Summit County Health Department and the CDC have already declared our sport low risk. So please, I beg of you to think about your decision.

Our season has already started and as a junior this upcoming year it is extremely important for college scouting. I am depending on a golf scholarship in order to go to college. As a junior, this season is very important because scouts look at the growth between your junior and senior year. I understand where the board is coming from and your concerns but this season truly means a lot for my team and I.

I also understand the concern of having 700 students going inside of a school building but there is a huge difference between that and sending six girls outside on a golf course to compete. Golf and Why It Needs to Stay

As a returning member of the Springfield Girls Golf team, I find it incredibly upsetting that the entirety of my season could be taken away when it's not necessary. While anyone could make an argument either way, I don't believe that cancelling or postponing the golf season should have to be done due to safety or health concerns. There are many protocols and precautions we follow on an everyday basis as a team, as well as many taken by the courses we play at and by the teams we play against that go above and beyond typical standards most follow.

On top of daily self checks at home prior to meeting, when we get together as a team coach Hanna, as well as coach Murphy, immediately check us. When we arrive wherever our practice or match is, we get our temperatures taken and get asked the routine questions one by one. On top of that, the

coaches constantly have masks on and us players do when we aren't hitting. Additionally, we all maintain social distancing, sanitize regularly, and don't share any items between one another. All of this is enforced not only as a team but also by the courses we play at. The courses have all individually made guidelines to ensure a comfortable and safe match for all.

In addition to all of the safety guidelines we follow, golf was already deemed a low-risk sport by the Summit County Health Department. Logically this was partly done due to the surplus of space we have on a golf course. Adding on to the topic of space, as a team we take a maximum of six players per match. While to some, transportation may seem like a hazard, but in actuality there's plenty of space for all players to properly distance themselves from one another during bussing. Not only are we able to spread out, while on the bus we wear face masks and each of us were kindly provided our own individual bottle of sanitizer we frequently use.

Admittedly, I can see where some could make the argument that if it's not safe enough to attend school, then it couldn't possibly be safe enough to participate in after school activities. Although this could be true for some sports, golf isn't one of them. If we were to go back to school, there would likely be several hundreds of students and staff all in one building. Ideally everyone should be six feet apart, which simply wouldn't be possible constantly on a daily basis. On top of that, at school it would be immensely difficult and time consuming to check everyone daily the way we do at golf. I don't believe that a school day and a golf match are comparable because of the previously discussed precautions, the two simply aren't the same.

I as well as so many others would greatly appreciate some well deserved thought on this topic. Life has drastically changed since the 13th of March when all normalcy went out the window. By allowing us golfers to have a season, we could feel a bit more at ease considering all that's going on. Not to mention that some of us are relying on our four short years of high school eligibility in order to land in a strong spot for college. By cancelling this season, we'll be even more time pressed for opportunities to come our way. I strongly believe that golf is in no way a safety concern for us players and our coaches, and I urge you to consider all of this as well.

Dear Springfield Board of Education,

I am one of the eleven Springfield ladies golfers. I have a great love for golf and would be devastated if it were to be canceled due to COVID-19. I know we are all trying to figure out what is best for the school and the others around us, but it is very important to me and the other golfers that golf remains a sport during all of this. It is understandable for other high-risk sports to be canceled but golf is considered a low-risk sport by the Summit County Health Department. On top of that, golf is played over a very large playing field. 200 acres of land is what we play on and the distance between us when we play is at least six feet at all times. The only time that would be considered a minimal risk is when we are warming up.

Assuming that we do start school online, I think golf should still be kept up and running. To ensure that we don't have any symptoms before we get on a bus or play, our JV coach Mrs. Murphy asks a list of

questions of possible symptoms and takes our temperature. If it is an "away" match and we have to ride the bus, we all wear masks on the bus at all times. When we are out on the course playing, we couldn't even get within six feet of each other because of our bags. We will hit each other with our bags if we walk too close, so being six feet apart isn't a problem. Some precautions on the golf course include us not using rakes, no ball washers, we leave the pins in, and don't trade scorecards. We make sure that we do everything we can to stay as safe as possible while still playing.

Trying to figure out what the best thing to do in this situation is hard and I understand why. A lot of factors go into staying safe. If one person somehow ends up with the virus it can put a lot of people at risk. But because golf is a low-risk sport, it is the safest sport that is able to continue considering the pandemic that is going on right now.

I would really appreciate you taking all of this into consideration. The team is having a great season already and has already made so much improvement. I strive to get better at golf because I love the sport and would like to play in college. The more I play, the more experience I have and the greater chance I have at getting better. I have worked very hard this year to have a great golf season and I would hate for it to be canceled over a virus that is manageable when golfing.

Dear Board Members,

My daughter is a sophomore this year and she plays golf, basketball, and softball. She was able to play golf and basketball last year but not softball because of the Coronavirus outbreak. This was devastating to her and her sister, a senior last year, who also played the same sports. They were looking forward to playing softball together since they were little but couldn't. This was heartbreaking not only to the oldest but to my youngest daughter who now might miss her golf season as well. This is something we never thought would happen because, out of all the sports, golf is the sport with the least amount of contact. Out of all the sports in high school golf is the only one with the least amount to find players too. There's also no passing catching or sharing a ball or bat or the same huge water jug. They don't use a locker room or the school for that matter. They don't touch locker room doors, light switches, balls, hands or share equipment like football or volleyball. In golf there are no sharing of equipment like of balls, tees, bags, water bottles, no water jugs, or even golf carts. There are no golf carts used in high school golf. There are no parents or spectators in golf to congregate or congratulate. The golf students do not linger around before or after meets to chat with each other or their parents. They are checked for a temperature regularly by the coaches, provided with face coverings, provided hand sanitizers on their rides to and from the school. This is more precaution than they would get in the school as a student and certainly a larger space to social distance than they would get in any sport or classroom. The space for 6 students to play and practice is approximately 200 yards per 6 golfers versus a school trying to separate 100, 200, or 500 students in one building. There is also no better therapy for a girl that is home alone all day getting more and more depressed as the days go on without seeing their friends or socializing. This is a safe and fun outlet for these girls at a time when they need it most. There's not a better way to keep these girls' spirits up than playing a sport they love in a healthy way. This is an essential part of high school life and at this point it may be the ONLY sport these girls will get to participate in because it's a no contact sport. Please, don't take this away. The guidelines are being followed and then some.

My daughter was lost and depressed and acting out until this golf season started. Please don't take this positive experience from her let her and her teammates keep playing and continue getting better and better so they can go onto college and Possibly make this a career.

It would be terrible to cancel something so positive in their life. Please reconsider taking something safe and positive away from these girls. There's not much left for them in this struggling community without high school golf and the amazing roll models and leadership they get from these teachers/coaches like Mr. Hannah and Mrs. Murphy, two of the most influential and powerful coaches Springfield has ever had the privilege of having. There's no two better coaches than Mr. Hanna and Mrs. Murphy! Look at the golf program they built and their record It speaks for itself. Springfield needs more dedicated knowledgeable coaches like them. They are already doing so much more to prevent the spread of the Coronavirus than required. They are exactly the coaches this community needs. They keep our kids out of trouble in school and out. This program has such potential. In the classrooms they cannot effectively social distance as good as they can on the golf course.

I am a concerned and supportive parent of two girls who play 3 sports each at Springfield High School, both at the varsity level, past and current. Madison and Morgan represent Springfield sports with great pride and the golf program has made them better athletes, students, friends and better prepared them for college.

I hope you will reconsider cancelling this sport after reading my letter.

Golf During a Pandemic

I am a senior at Springfield High School this year and seeing as this is my last year of highschool I have been looking forward to my final season of golf. This global pandemic has made us unsure if we will get our season. I, along with my teammates and coaches, believe that our season should continue on even if school goes back to remote learning. First off, at the beginning of summer when practices started we had new protocols to make sure we were staying safe and healthy. Six students on 200 acres compared to 700 students in a building is a huge difference and we would be much safer on 200 acres. Some believe that we should not continue with our season if we go back to online learning. This is understandable because we still have a chance of getting sick if we don't follow protocol. If we keep up with what we have been doing then I believe we should be able to maintain a safe season for our coaches and students on the golf team. Lastly, I would like to thank everyone who is fighting for our season. Like I said before, I am a senior this year so I am fighting for my last chance to play my high school sport. As we are all entitled to our own opinion I hope everyone can be open minded and understand how we are feeling.

Also we can wear our masks on putting greens even though we are almost never within six feet of each other. And to be extra safe every day before we practice and play, our temperature is taken by our coaches and we are asked a series of questions to see if we are experiencing any symptoms of COVID-19 and if we are, we are sent home. Lastly, golf is an escape for almost all of us, it takes our minds off of the bad things that are happening in our lives and the world in general.
