SPRINGFIELD HIGH TO ENTERTAIN COUNTY MUSIC FESTIVAL

JUNIORS PRESENT PLAY

Plans for holding the southern section of the County Music Festival at Springfield High auditorium next Saturday, December 16 have been completed.

The northern group will meet at Peninsula high tomorrow night, Dec. 9.

The all-county orchestra, composed of pupils from practically all of the Co. high schools with a few from the seventh and eighth grades, will play at both the sectional meetings.

Springfield's representatives in the orchestra are Joe Kime, trombone, Edith Shoemaker, saxophone, Eileen App, trumpet, Paul Marsh, trumpet, and Pauline Jarrell, bass violin.

Each of the eight high schools in the southern half will present one special musical number. In addition to the three numbers by the county orchestra, the program at Springfield will consist of the following:

A TIMELY WARNING

Squad Members, Take Heed----

Certain Rules of the C.H.S.A.A. must be observed or else----you may find yourself ineligible for high school athletics.

For Instance:

1. After becoming a member of a high school squad you cannot play on an independent team.

2. After a season closes, you cannot play on an independent team. The penalty is disqualification for one complete season in that sport. A senior is ineligible for all athletics during the remainder of his last semester in school.

3. To be eligible any semester you must have passed in at least three full-time subjects at the end of the last semester. Special exams, and summer work cannot make up any deficiency.

4. To be eligible for any game, your standing in at least three subjects must be passing from the beginning of the semester.

5. Local Rule: Perfect attendance is required during the week of the contest--unless illness prevents.
