

In the Survey of Mothers with Young Children, 17.4 percent of mothers with children ages 12 and under reported that since the pandemic started, "the children in my household were not eating enough because we just couldn't afford enough food." Of those mothers, 3.4 percent reported that it was often the case that their children were not eating enough due to a lack of resources since the coronavirus pandemic began.

Food Distribution & Nutrition Support

- Approximately 225,952 meals distributed at 17 locations in the AAPS during previous 9 weeks to-date (about 25,000 meals per week)
- AAPS launched food distributions on Monday, March 16th (following school closure at mid-day on Friday, March 13th)
- Average approximately 1,700 2,000 students served per distribution day currently, began w/ 800+ in March
- Approximately 59+ families receiving door delivery currently, serving 149 students
- Balanced breakfast & lunch including milk & juice & covers 7 days per week, including during spring break
- School stores, PTOs, & school leaders are donating snacks & the 'treat' bags are always a welcome addition to food distribution days!
- Next Step: Focused work now to plan/ensure funding to support a continuing Summer, 2020 Food & Nutrition
 program goal to extend June July August





Food Distribution & Nutrition Support

Summer Food Program Update

- The State has applied to the USDA requesting a continuation of the emergency feeding program through the summer.

- If approved, this will allow us to continue our current program with no changes which makes it so much easier for families.

- In addition, we are requesting Food Gatherers support with a truck delivery program at Community High School that would cover a 'desert' area in the northern part of the city.

- We hope to hear more information on these efforts soon



Nutrition & Basic Necessities Support

- In coordination with food distribution, AAPS continues to provide basic needs items such as toilet paper, diapers, laundry detergent and toiletries to families.
- Friday is next distribution day; supplies distributed once per week
- Distribution of these items occurs during food delivery and distribution on a rotating basis and directly to AAPS McKinney Vento (homeless) families.
- Distribution of personal care kits & feminine hygiene kits delivery directly to CAN, Peace Neighborhood, and Avalon Housing
- A grant from the Ann Arbor Area Community Foundation \$11,152. & from Comerica \$5,000. & many community donors have made this possible! Thank you!
- Coming to the end of current funding, goal is to continue through the summer, actively investigating options for more funding & donations.

- Purchased 8TB (8 trillion bytes) of shared hotspot data usage & will monitor what is needed for students to complete learning activities.





Update – Spotlight on the numbers

- Phone Call Volume Student & Family Help Desk
 - 3 Virtual Help Desks have responded to 7,548 calls over first 7 weeks
 - How to use devices, how to login, locate district resources, how to use come apps, serves, and how to troubleshoot problems
 - Processed 1,144 help tickets w/ 984 resolved & 160 still in process
 - Team serves 45,000+ end users (staff, students, & families)
- Devices Deployed This Week
 - Have added a FedEx shipping option for special circumstances
 - First week that perhaps are realizing a device saturation point

Tech Team Update

Stabilization of Technology Systems & Services

- District core tools and services continue to perform at a great capacity, i.e., Clever, G Suite for Education (Gmail, Google Drive, Google Classroom Google Meet), Seesaw, Library Databases, VPN access, call masking for staff, etc.
- A few minor outages along the way by our different vendors as they too have scaled up their ability to provide services throughout the US during this pandemic (Seesaw and a few other 3rd party apps).
- A solid process continues for device deployment and continued support of our students & families through their virtual help desk (734-997-1222).
- Staff can see all of the devices in PowerSchool that have been handed out to students/families.

Creation of the ITD Remote Working/Learning Plan

- Offered 106+ PD sessions to support teachers and building admins in their transition to remote teaching & learning.
- Continue to collaborate with both teachers and building leaders to innovate the remote working and teaching & learning environments in small increments to meet the different stakeholders right where they are at.
- Seeking out different groups within the organization to grow their next steps for continued remote working and the next level of specialized training/tech support needed.

Implementing and Improving Key Tech Systems

- With technology systems and networking services turned inside out, we perform weekly security patches and system
 upgrades, and closely monitor how our different systems are performing.
- We continue to dialogue with similar districts in size as well as our local partners (MERIT & Sentinel) to ensure we are keeping our commitment to student privacy and safety as well as our need to keep our district technology systems secure.

Professional Development to Support Transition

- ALL in the organization continue to work sharpen skills to complete work from remote either through facilitating sessions and/or participating
- Approximately 1,800+ 'seats' for training teachers, leaders & staff have engaged in 81 technology skill enhancement sessions
- Including sessions to improve skills with platforms: Seesaw, Moodle, or Google Classroom
- Practical tech sessions such as Using Cell Phone as a Doc Camera, and many others
- Staff are responding extremely well & share they are applying in their work
- Real-time support continues every day
- Appreciate 186+ Teachers, +Principals, Tech Team & others who participated in Schoology orientation sessions this week

Continuity of Learning Plan

- Plan details the transition of in-person learning to an online setting
- Each teacher delivers instruction via one of three platforms: Seesaw, Moodle, or Google Classroom
- Teachers connect w/ daily message of care, maintain office hours
- Social workers, Psychologists, Intervention Specialists & others reach out directly to known vulnerable students & families
- Teachers, leaders & staff are closely monitoring participation of students each week & individual outreach is occurring to ensure students are well, able to access learning, and supported to every extent possible

Focus: Provision of Special Education & Learning Support Services

- AAPS team continues to make a good faith effort to provide connections, supports, & accommodations for our students with specialized needs as is appropriate and reasonable within an online setting, according to section 6, EO 2020-35.
- This includes students with Individual Education Plan, 504, Second Language, Title I (impact of poverty), and others
- Primary focus currently is on the provision of support for students in accessing learning & to support with special services
- AAPS Teachers will continue to work alongside special education professionals to differentiate and support student access to learning
 - Special education professionals in self-contained programs are serving students, similar to General Ed

- Though it is too soon to know our precise reality, we are working diligently now with medical & public health experts to understand, to prepare, & continue to offer a quality AAPS education for our students


