Uniting Mercy Educators


With a wave of the Jamaican flag and Bob Marley's "One Love" resounding through the room, Kimberly Baxter, Associate Director for Programs and Services for Mercy Education, opened the 41st annual Mercy Education Conference, held October 12-13, 2023, in Kingston, Jamaica. Together the 190 representatives from 44 Mercy schools joined in the singing: "Give thanks and praise to the Lord and I will feel alright." (Mercy Education)

Three Lauralton Hall teachers were blessed with the opportunity to travel to Kingston, Jamaica for this annual Mercy Education Conference. Director of Campus Ministry Erin DaCosta, Spanish Teacher Marnory Hawes P'21, and Science Teacher April Kelley '85 spent three days immersed in this year's theme, Earth Justice: Our Mercy Commitment to Care for Creation. The conference was filled with many opportunities to learn, network, and share best practices with other mercy educators from around the world.

Keynote speakers touched upon several important issues including care for the earth, climate change, and environmental racism. The conference also shed light on the environmental realities Jamaica is currently facing. Señora Hawes was delighted for the chance to speak with Sister Tita Lopez, RSM who is currently working with the indigenous people of Panama, saying, "It was wonderful to make connections between the work Lauralton has done in the Chiriqui region of Panama through School the World and the greater mission of the Sisters of Mercy."

The conference also included an evening visiting some of Jamaica's many

Mercy institutions, including Alpha Infant & Primary Schools and Alpha School of Music. Conference attendees were able to participate in a spirited Mass, tour the Mercy schools, enjoy an incredible dinner with many local dishes, and listen to the fantastic talents of the Alpha School of Music. The most amazing part of the evening



was meeting other Mercy students. Despite being raised in a different country and culture, the Mercy charism was palpable in the girls. Says Kelley, "The students encountered in Jamaica were not unlike our own Lauralton students. Their Mercy spirit was truly alive and visible in all they did."

Lauralton Hall faculty and staff will have an opportunity to learn more about this experience as Mrs. Kelley, Mrs. DaCosta, and Señora Hawes will lead a Professional Development Day in the spring to share the knowledge and ideas they brought back from Jamaica.
