*FBLA visited the Tennessee Titans stadium to learn what goes on behind the scenes.





What a fun-filled, busy semester of learning at Bonnieville School! Our students continue to make progress in literacy, refine their communication skills, and consider diverse perspectives through reading and writing. We added a school news broadcast to our enrichment program. Students talked about books on our newscast as part of the November Reading Challenge. Students continue to enjoy earning book machine tokens. Teachers put the high quality training received to practice and students are thriving.

Our Winter Festival was held on December 1st and it was a very successful event raising over 10,000! The PTO worked tirelessly to raise funds for our students and school. They offered a family painting night and a gingerbread night in conjunction with our FRYSC. We are so thankful for the time and effort they invest as well as the love they have for our students and staff. Most recently, they helped us receive \$1000 worth of school supplies from Sammie Jo Falk with Modern Woodmen of America.

Cub Run

***Preschool** students started the Christmas season off by making ornaments for the classroom tree. They cut and pasted their Santa lists and were ready when he visited on



December 11th. Students created a photo frame for their Santa photo to take home to family. They have been enjoying decorating a variety of stockings, trees, reindeer, etc. Currently, they are mastering the Gingerbread Cookie dance and singing lots of Christmas carols.

*Kindergarten classes have been learning about Christmas traditions around the world. They discussed similarities and differences in Christmas books compared to their movies.

In math, they are learning 2D shapes and moving into addition. They are reading multiple sentences independently and learning how to correctly write sentences with capital letters and punctuation. ***First Graders** are excited for Santa's arrival! In language arts, they are enjoying daily Heggerty and UFLI routines! The students are making strong gains in reading and writing! Students are learning advanced vocabulary such as probe, prone, and glean! In math, they have been working on building skills and strategies in subtraction. Students are learning to use different strategies such as using pictures, using a number line, counting back, counting on from the smallest number, and selecting the appropriate strategy for different 2- and 3-digit subtraction equations. We are getting ready to begin regrouping!

*Second Graders have been working very hard this semester and have shown great gains in reading and math.

*Third Graders are learning multiplication facts and applying strategies to solve problems. Students have also been working on word problems using multiplication and division! In language arts, students are learning about the solar system and working on their writing skills with the use of writing prompts! Students are also working to finish the December reading challenge.

*Fourth Grade students have been studying realistic fiction in reading. They have focused on ways to help the community, through our text "Aguinaldo." In math, we have been working on number patterns, prime, and composite numbers. We have finished the month by reading *The Best Christmas Pageant Ever* and working on character traits.

*The **Fifth Grade** class has been busy with decimals. Their last lesson was about exponents and the powers of 10. They are now moving on to a new topic of fractions. In social studies, students have covered many parts of the American Revolution, including focusing on the Declaration of Independence. Students were able to visually express what the pursuit of happiness looks like for them. We have moved on to the United States Constitution and are learning the parts of the Preamble. In science, students are learning about the parts of the water cycle by becoming a molecule and traveling throughout the water cycle.

*Sixth Grade has been working on solving and writing expressions and equations in math. In science, they have been working on learning about the solar system and are currently doing projects. In social studies, they are finishing up on Ancient India. Lastly, in ELA we have been working on finding text evidence and using that to answer questions using the RACE strategy.

*Seventh Grade students completed Poetry In Your Pocket: they researched and chose a poem that spoke to them, wrote it down onto a piece of paper with which they folded to fit into their pockets and chose someone in school to give the poem to. They have been learning about the legacy of the Roman Empire and how their legacy influences modern society.

*Eighth Grade students have shown tremendous resilience and dedication and we look forward to seeing how they meet their goals in the spring. They finished their capstone project of performing a mock trial based upon a poem entitled "The Death of Julius Caesar." They had to break down the poem to find meaning and elements, and use the poem as evidence. In social studies they have learned that the founding of this country was a little more complex and not very peaceful when it came to encounters with Indigenous People. *In **Physical Education**, students will begin Fitness Testing and the Mileage Club. They have been very busy playing games and staying healthy.

*Reading intervention students have been working hard at blending and segmenting sounds to make words. They have been using tools to help them determine how many sounds are in a word and what those sounds are.
