Episcopal Collegiate School's Honor Code promotes an atmosphere of integrity. At the beginning of each school year, students and faculty sign the Episcopal Collegiate School Honor Pledge:

Our Faculty

There are 84 teaching faculty with 72% holding advanced degrees. Students learn in an intimate environment with a student-to-faculty ratio of 10:1 and average class size of 15.

Grading Scale

Both the failed course and the remediated course will display on the transcript, but only the original course will calculate in the GPA. *Advanced and AP classes receive an additional .5 weighting.*

- Extracurricular commitments



Writing Center

The Writing Center is a student-led, student-run organization which offers individualized tutoring, embedded tutoring, workshops, guest speakers, and special events to students in grades 6-12. The Episcopal Writing Fellows program is a leadership and service opportunity for sophomores, juniors, and seniors that focuses on writing and peer tutoring. Writing Fellows are selected through a rigorous application process and volunteer a minimum of two hours per week through the school year.

Senior Peer Leaders

Rising seniors are selected for their leadership, commitment to excellence, and visible demonstration of Respect, Reverence, and Responsibility to mentor incoming freshmen as they grapple with academic, social, and emotional challenges in their transition to Upper School. Peer leaders meet bi-weekly with their groups, as well as leading activities on Shadow Day and assisting chaperones with the Freshman Class trip.

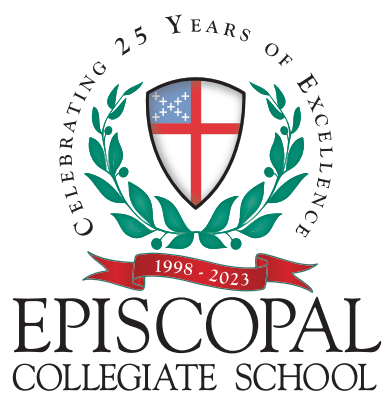
