


Band

Chrisopher Marley Pulchra Prism






Christopher Marley: A Nature And Science Artist. By: Mary Raverty, 5th Grade

Christopher Marley is an artist from Rural Oregon. As a child Christopher Marley had ADHD, so he had a hard time making friends. So instead, he liked to go outside and explore nature; he especially liked reptiles. As he got older, Christopher Marley figured out how to combine his love of nature and his love of art. Through his work he showed the relationship between art, nature and science.

At the exhibit I saw art that was very pretty and interesting at the same time. My favorite piece is called Cerulean Genesis. It is made of blue, purple, and white metallic butterflies. Another piece that I like is called Pulchra Prism, which used metallic beetles of different sizes to create a kaleidoscope image. Christopher Marley works with institutions and individuals to find things to make his art with. (He does not kill any animals).
