## 2024-25 COURSE REGISTRATION INFORMATION

The registration process for the 2024-2025 school year will take place between Monday, January 22 and Wednesday, February 26, 2024. The procedure for selecting courses for the following school year is extremely important and can have a profound impact on successful post-secondary education and career options.

- Jan. 22: Counselors conduct classroom visits with current juniors in their social studies classes.
- **Jan. 23:** Counselors conduct classroom visits with current sophomores in their social studies classes.
- Jan. 26: Counselors conduct classroom visits with current freshmen in their social studies classes.

Students will receive their course requests forms in their social studies classes. These forms will be taken to their current class teachers for recommendations for the next level. The course description booklet will be available online on the East webpage.

- **Feb. 5:** Registration Open House for current 9<sup>th</sup>, 10<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> graders 3:30-8:00 p.m.
  - More information will be sent home.
- **Feb. 14:** Finalize East registration during homeroom. Course forms will be collected and entered into
  - Infinite Campus for all students not registered yet.
- **Feb. 21-26:** East Registration Verification. Parents will receive courses selections and sign off on selections for the 2024-2025 school year and return to East.

As always, students will be guided through the registration process by their homeroom teacher and guidance counselor. Please take the time to discuss course selections with your son or daughter and encourage them to select their courses very carefully. Schedule changes will only occur if one or more of the following criteria are met:

- Requested change by teacher
- Failure to meet course prerequisite
- Direct conflict causing student to have less than six classes per semester
- Change needed to fulfill graduation/college requirement

## A NOTE FROM STUDENT SERVICES

Students, know that your second quarter attendance really matters. Students who earn 90% attendance or better for the quarter are eligible for Junior Girls. ## A NOTE FROM THE WAUSAU EAST ATTENDANCE OFFICE

Students NEED to sign IN and OUT at the Attendance Window when they are arriving late to school (after 7:45 a.m.) and leaving early from school (before 3:00 p.m.). This DOES NOT pertain to students with Student Incentive periods on their schedule.

Communication between home and school is of utmost importance for the Attendance Office. The following is a list of acceptable reasons your student may miss school:

- Personal illness
- Funerals and religious services as requested by the parent(s) and/or guardian(s)
- · Serious personal or family crisis
- The student is not in proper physical and/or mental condition to attend school in accordance with Wisconsin Statute 118.15(3)(a)
- Suspension from school

Students will be excused for the above reasons only when the parent/guardian gives an explanation for the absence. Please call the Attendance Office by 9:30 a.m. on the day of the absence. If this is impossible, please call or send a note with your child on the day of his/her return to school.

Parents/guardians are allowed to excuse their child for part of, or the entirety of, ten days per school year without a medical note. If your child is absent from school for more than ten days, you will be asked to furnish a medical excuse. Absences excused with medical notes are excused without using the ten days previously mentioned. Family vacations or activities must be pre-arranged through the Attendance Office prior to leaving. In such cases, the student must complete an Anticipated Absence Form.

If a student needs to leave for any reason within the school day (7:45 a.m.-3:00 p.m.), they should bring a written note from their parent/guardian indicating the time of dismissal/return and reason. That note should be brought to the Attendance Office by the student before school, to obtain a pass. If parents/guardians are unable to send a note, please call 715-261-0690 a day ahead or early in the morning on the day of the appointment and tell their student to check in with the Attendance Office to obtain a pass. We kindly ask that parents/guardians plan ahead and follow this procedure so classes aren't interrupted for last minute student pickups.

## NACHRICHTEN AUS DER DEUTSCHABTEILUNG – NEWS FROM THE GERMAN DEPARTMENT

Remember those warm months of summer? During these colder months, we thought it would be great to think back on those warmer days until we get closer to spring!

Several Wausau East German students certainly look back fondly on summer, 2023, as they spent two weeks in Frankfurt, Germany returning the second half of our exchange visit, this time as the visitors!

Participating students hosted students in the fall of 2022 for a two-week Wisconsin adventure that included tours of local business, the Hmong American Museum, Lambeau Field, laser tag at WOW, fall experiences at corn mazes and pumpkin farms, and visits to classrooms to learn more about the American school system. In return our East students visited the students they hosted last summer, 2023, in order to experience the German way of life for teenagers. Our East participants attended classes, answered student questions about the US, learned to navigate public transportation to and from their host families to school in a bustling city, toured towns that dated back to the Middle Ages, visited castles and cathedrals, toured Frankfurt's outskirts on bike, some traveled to the small country of Luxembourg, and everyone went on many other adventures organized individually by their host families. Participants tried new foods, observed differences between our all-inclusive American high school and the university-oriented format of our exchange school, the Heinrich-Gagner Gymnasium, and even had a "heat-free" day one afternoon to go swimming with their host partners instead of attending classes.





Long term relationships were built, students continue to stay in touch with their host partners and families, and their enjoyment of the German language and way of life carries back into our classroom on a daily basis.

We look forward to another round of our long-term exchange partnership, which we will begin organizing in the coming months and weeks for hosting the next visit of

the Germans in fall 2024. We look forward to showcasing our school and community.



## SOCIAL STUDIES...DON'T LEAVE HIGH SCHOOL WITHOUT IT

Do you know?... Research consistently demonstrates that social studies receives the least amount of instructional time in the elementary grades when compared to the amount of time afforded to other core content areas. This small omission of Social Studies curriculum impacts a students future as they prepare for **college, career, and civic life.** 

Courses offered in the Wausau East Social Studies Department will help your student to be prepared for whatever path they choose after high school. Please talk to your student and encourage your child to take as many of the social studies elective classes they can in their junior and senior years at East.

#### SEMESTER SOCIAL STUDIES ELECTIVES:

#### Economics

Economics is a practical, survey course in Macro and Micro Economics with an emphasis on financial literacy. After studying the basic components of our capitalistic system including government, taxes, labor and wages, as they impact the economy, students will participate in a financial literacy unit. Students will set financial goals – invest in the stock market; understand the importance of time value of money and the advantage of investing early. We will also look at credit cards and their proper use, insurance and social security. It is a useful life lesson students never forget. <u>Taking Economics Fulfills district financial literacy requirement.</u>

#### Govenment

Government studies political issues, citizenship, and the origins and structures of our U.S. Government. Curriculum focuses on current political and social issues facing the nation, state, community, school and individuals with an emphasis on civic engagement.

#### Pyschology

Introductory Psychology addresses questions such as:

Do my childhood experiences form my personality?

Does authority shape my behaviors?

Why are my memories inaccurate?

Is my mind different from my brain?

Are my genetics my destiny?

These questions and more are discussed in this semester-long class by exploring classic names in psychology such as Freud, Skinner, Beck, and Milgram.

#### Sociology

Sociology studies different groups and their function and impact within society. Topics such as population, race, gender, and socio economic status are explored in greater detail through sociology. Sociology classes open your eyes to how society works and how just one person changing one thing about their daily interactions can cause a huge difference to make our world a better place for all. Sociology explores the roles various groups play in society but more importantly how our participation in society matters.

#### **IB ELECTIVES**

#### IB Cultural Anthropology

IB Cultural Anthropology analyzes cultures such as the Yanomami of Brazil, Aborigines of Australia, Masai of Kenya, and Haitian Voodoo. Anthropology is taught as a lens through which the student observer employs terms and concepts while noting biases of the research explored in class. This class is a year-long and offers college credit.

#### IB History I

When did Europe become "Modern"? In the process of exploring this question, students will study dramatic changes brought by intellectual and artistic movements including the Renaissance and Enlightenment; game-changing revolutions such as the Scientific, French, and Industrial Revolutions; and cataclysmic wars, including the Thirty Years' War, Napoleonic Wars, and World War I. In addition to offering a deep dive into European history, this course aims to build critical thinking skills through analytical reading/writing activities, Socratic seminars, historical re-enactments, and role-plays.

#### **IB** History II

Contemporary Europe covers Europe from the First World War to the present—arguably the most dynamic time period and region of study in recent history. The year-long course examines the rise of two competing ideologies-fascism in Nazi Germany and communism in Soviet Russia-and then look at how they clashed in World War II. An extended look at how the United States and the Soviet Union competed to dominate the world during the Cold War. In these conflicts, who were the winners and losers? What happened to those who spoke out or resisted authoritarian regimes? How did women play a leading role in these conflicts? What was expected of children?

If you like history and would like to learn more about these topics, IB History II is for you! <u>This course is open to any senior.</u>

#### IB Psychology I and IB Psychology II

IB Psychology introduces students to research methodology and the terms employed in psychological research. Students will understand the purpose of the DSM-V, cultural differences in behaviors, therapeutic approaches, and biological treatments of disorders. This class is a year-long and offers college-credit to those who take IB Psychology I and II.

#### Fun Fact:

Students who receive effective social studies instruction including economics, government, psychology and sociology are

## HEALTH SERVICES NEWS

## Information Regarding Your Child & Illness

IMPORTANT: If your child is feeling ill during the school day,

please have them report to the Health Office.

We will contact you (parent/guardian) to make arrangements for them to be picked up.

Please follow these guidelines from the WSD for illnesses:

Students may be excluded from school for communicable disease control for the following conditions:

- Undiagnosed or untreated skin rash or sores that cannot be covered
- Fever (temperature 100.4°F or greater or if behaviors such as excessive sleepiness or coughing which might be interfering with the student's learning). Child must be fever-free without fever medicine for 24 hours before returning to school
- Vomiting more than once in the previous 24 hours. Child must not have vomited in the past 24 hours before returning to school.
- Diarrhea three times in the previous 24 hours or child is incontinent (has an "accident")
- Upper respiratory illness with frequent cough/drainage
- "Pinkeye" (conjunctivitis) if accompanied by fever, behavioral change or inability to avoid touching eyes. (Antibiotics not required for return).
- Strep throat (until 24 hours after treatment has begun, or health practitioner approval)
- Students whose immunization status is not in compliance with the Wisconsin Immunization Law
- ♦ Students with known suppressed immunity may be excluded, for their protection, when cases of communicable disease (i.e., measles, chickenpox) occur in school

A reminder that all medication, prescription or over-the-counter, (i.e., ibuprofen, Tylenol, Tums, cold medication) must be kept in the Health Office during the school day. Students may carry emergency medication, inhalers, diabetic supplies, and cough drops if needed.

We are no longer tracking Covid cases in school or following any separate protocols for Covid. Please refer to the Wausau School District illness guidelines listed above when choosing to send your child to school with an illness. District absence policies will be followed for any illnesses.

## TREATMENT OPTIONS

TO HELP RELIEVE COLD SYMPTOMS

- Over-the-counter cold medications, such as decongestants and cough medicine

- Rest
- Increased fluid intake
- · Pain relievers for headache or fever
- · Warm, salt water gargling for sore throat
- Petroleum jelly for raw, chapped skin around the nose and lips
- Warm steam for congestion

IF YOU HAVE A FEVER OF 101°

## RISING PHOENIX EARLY COLLEGE HIGH SCHOOL PROGRAM

The Rising Phoenix Early College High School Program is an innovative collaboration between GEAR UP Target School Districts, DPI WEOP, and the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay to provide high school students an opportunity to get a head start on college. Eligible students from the Wisconsin GEAR UP target high schools below will be admitted to the Rising Phoenix Early College High School Program to be enrolled during their junior and senior years.

Students will have an opportunity to earn their high school diploma and a two-year Associate of Arts and Sciences (AAS) degree upon high school graduation by dually enrolling in college credit courses at their high school, virtually through UW-Green Bay. There will be no cost to students, families or school districts as all program costs will be covered by the GEAR UP Grant. Students must meet GEAR UP and Rising Phoenix Program admissions requirements to enroll. The program will also offer educational opportunities and services through DPI WEOP and UW-Green Bay's GEAR UP programming that will support student learning, growth and preparation for post-secondary success.

Eligibility requirements include:

- Currently enrolled in 10th Grade in a GEAR UP target high school
- ONE of the following:
- First generation college student (parents/quardians do not have a bachelor's degree)
- Eligible for free or reduced meals in school
- Racial or ethnic minority
- US citizen or permanent resident (a GEAR UP requirement)
- 3.0 cumulative GPA or above. If a student has a 2.75-2.99 GPA, they may be considered; essay responses addressing the GPA and teacher recommendations speaking to GPA will be critical.
- Strong high school attendance record
- Desire to go to college

Speak with your student's counselor if you are interested in applying. Applications will be open to interested sophomores from January 2 through March 15, 2024.
