

### SCHOOL DISTRICT FIVE OF LEXINGTON AND RICHLAND COUNTIES – REUNIFICATION OVERVIEW

#### WHAT IS REUNIFICATION?

- Definition: to <u>unify</u> again: to bring (people or things) or to be brought into a unit or a coherent whole after a period of separation [Merriam Webster]
- In terms of reunification at LexRich5:
  - A critical incident has occurred on a district owned campus and individuals on that campus will need to be relocated to safety
    - Students need to be reunited with their guardians
    - Staff need to be relocated from danger
  - Reunification requires logistics from all sectors of the school district to include – Transportation, Communication, Facilities, Nutrition, District Office personnel, and Safety Office

### WHAT INCIDENTS COULD CAUSE A REUNIFICATION?

- Violent Critical Incident
- Gas Leak
- Hazardous Material Spill

#### WHO INITIATES A REUNIFICATION?

- No golden answer or set of criteria as to when a reunification is implemented.
- Totality of the circumstances will dictate when a reunification is needed.
- The Safety Officer that is stationed at incident command post will make decision based on law enforcement/fire service command actions/recommendations
  - Law enforcement owns the shooter/crime scene
  - School District owns the students/staff
  - Fire service owns the building

#### Overview

- The state assigns each school a report card rating based on key statistics.
- Report card ratings are determined by a school's performance on metrics in the following categories:
  - Academic Achievement
  - College or Career Readiness (high school)
  - English Learners' Progress
  - ► Graduation Rate (high school)
  - Preparing for Success
  - School Climate
  - ▶ Student Progress (elementary, intermediate, and middle schools)

### A Note about EL Progress

This measure accounts for 10% of a school's rating when the school has 20 or more English Learners.

If a school has **less than 20 English Learners**, the **points are redistributed** to other measures.

More schools have this factor on 2022 report cards because the denominator **now includes students who have progressed to monitoring status**. As the students on monitoring status are already proficient, these students were designated as having **met their goal** for the year.

On the 18-19 report cards, 8 out of 21 schools had the English Learners' Progress measure. On the 21-22 report cards, 17 of 22 schools have the English Learners' Progress measure.

### Report Card Rating

### Measurements in the Accountability Model – K-8

Student Progress on SC READY & SC-Alt ELA and Math (35-40%)

1/2 of the points come from the "All Students" group.
1/2 of the points come from the group of students at the school identified as being in the lowest 20% based on prior achievement.

A growth index is calculated for each student.

The growth indices are averaged and a formula is applied to create the Student Progress score/rating.



- As a whole, District 5's schools received **higher overall ratings** in 2022 than other schools around the state.
- Our schools' ratings on the Academic Achievement, School Climate, Preparing for Success, Graduation Rate, and College or Career Readiness indicators were generally higher than the ratings of other schools around the state.
- District 5's 2022-23 to 2026-27 strategic plan directly addresses each indicator in the report card rating system.
