# Important Term 2/Semester 1 Dates:

On Wednesday, **January 17**, Term 2 grades close. Report Cards will be distributed during Bulldog Block on Monday, **January 29**.

#### **INCOMPLETE GRADES:**

The deadline to make-up Incomplete Grades for Term 2 is Wednesday, January 31. Handbook language is as follows:

- Students have two weeks from the day grades close to make up any Incomplete Grades issued by teachers, including 4th term and the summer.
- All work not completed within the specified period will be given no credit and averaged with the completed work to determine a grade.
- In the case of extenuating circumstances, any extension of this policy must be arranged with the Principal before the end of the two-week time period.

## Free Massachusetts State College & University Application Day: January 12



In partnership with Reach Higher Massachusetts, and for the first time, the nine MA state universities and colleges are waiving their application fees for **one day only** - **Friday, January 12, 2024**.

This initiative continues the equity and access to higher education effort by encouraging students to apply to the state universities at **no cost**. Students can apply using the colleges' application on their website or via the students' Common Application account. The waiver code is REACHFREE.

Schools include Bridgewater, Fitchburg, Framingham, MassArt, Mass Maritime, Mass College of Liberal Arts, Salem, Westfield, and Worcester.

# Upcoming ON THE SPOT ACCEPTANCE event for Seniors, January 18.

A representative from **Bristol Community College** will be here on Thursday, January 18, for an "On-the-Spot College Acceptance Day". Senior students are offered **same day admittance and the application fee is waived**. To take advantage of this one-time opportunity, **you must contact your guidance counselor to sign up by Thursday, January 11.** On **Friday, January 12,** during Bulldog Block, students who have registered for this opportunity will meet in the Guidance conference room to pre-register online. # Waitlist or Deferred, Now What?

You've sent out all of your applications and are waiting patiently for answers. You have your top choice and can see yourself on campus. You open your mail and see that you have been deferred or placed on the waitlist. Now what?

#### Deferred:

If you are "deferred" it is typically, when applying early action. This is done when an application is close, but the admissions office may want to compare with the larger regular decision pool. If this happens to you, and the school is a strong interest of yours', be sure to follow all instructions. Each school may have a different process, but the situation is the same; confirm your interest following their instructions, keep focused on all grades, and submit any additional material supporting your application. When the admissions process is complete after the regular admissions process, applicants are notified as before whether admitted or denied. This will be the final answer.

#### Waitlist:

Applicants can be "waitlisted" when all decisions have been released. The school will admit their incoming class and look to see how many of those turn into actual students. This can be somewhat of a numbers game. Knowing that not every admitted student will attend; for example they will admit 2000 students building an actual class of 1500 anticipating 500 do not submit deposits. Schools refer to this process as "melt." If, let's say 700 students decide to go elsewhere (instead of the 500 anticipated), admissions would utilize the waitlist to rebound back to 1500 from 1300. Typically waitlists are not prioritized or ranked. If you are put on the waitlist and it is a school you are interested in, again, follow their instructions. However, you will not need or be able to submit additional material. The decision has been made, the process for admitted students has to play out. At this point, unfortunately do not plan on the waitlist working in your favor. Be sure you move forward with your own college plan, and if the waitlist school comes back to you, then consider. Also, be aware that any financial aid or scholarships will be limited. If you are deferred or waitlisted, let your guidance counselor know. We can sit and talk though the different scenarios and make a plan that works for you.
