







The above tables show that student growth was higher between the fall and winter tests than it was between the fall and spring tests. One explanation for this is "testing fatigue" due to our scheduling of back to back MAP and AMP testing within the spring testing window.

# **LLI Benchmarking Data for 8th grade**

Based on data from previous years (and backed up by this year's MAP scores) we have begun full implementation of the Leveled Literacy Intervention Program in the Junior High. Implementation has already shown significant increases across all participating student cohorts. The following graph shows growth among one cohort of 8th graders. (M=male, F=female)

## 2016/2017 School Goals

- 1. EKCS will strive to improve the school-wide attendance rate to 90% or higher. Results: EKCS currently has a high school attendance rate of 86.77% and a Jr. High attendance rate of 89.99%.
- Ninth Graders will make a successful transition to HS and increase their chances of graduating by earning a minimum of 5 credits during their freshman year.
   Results: 9<sup>th</sup> graders earned an average of 5.9 credits after completing their freshman year.
- 3. Teachers will receive training and begin implementation of Leveled Literacy Intervention (LLI) in the Junior High.

  Results: One teacher attended the Level Literacy Institute in August. Lisa Meath

  (Parnette) lead a 1/2 day training demonstrating bandwarding students and

(Barnette) lead a 1/2-day training demonstrating benchmarking students and incorporating running records. Molly Sherman (Teaching and Learning coach) spent multiple hours with individual Effie teachers.

- 4. Effie Kokrine staff will develop the Native Cultural Components of the school.

  Results: Staff used the Alaska Cultural Standards for Educators to assess integration of Cultural Components throughout the school. Teachers used the National History Day Competition for the first time to incorporate specific Cultural Components into History classes across the school.
- 5. EKCS staff will develop a referral system for students seeking mental health services.

  Results: EKCS partnered with Fairbanks Native Association to fund a Family Services
  Coordinator who assists students and families with social services issues. Teachers
  utilize bi-monthly team meetings and weekly Student Support Team meetings to
  identify students requiring support from the Family Services Coordinator.



## **First Quarter**

Ten junior high and high school students helped organizers prepare welcome gift bags and fold programs for the event. In return the students were invited to attend the three-day Elders and Youth Convention free of charge!

#### Alaska Federation of Natives Welcome Potlatch-

Students and staff volunteered as servers, assisting the Fairbanks Native Association (FNA) and Doyon Limited at a Potlatch for out of town visitors at the Big Dipper.

#### **Alaska Federation of Natives Annual Convention-**

The entire EKCS student body attended a full day of the convention (which was held in Fairbanks this year) interviewing delegates and taking notes on speeches delivered by the AK Congressional Delegation and other important dignitaries.

#### **Holiday Bazaar**

The Effie Booster Club sponsored the annual Holiday Bazaar. Students volunteered to raise funds for FFA and as well as athletic teams.

## Honor Roll Assembly and Breakfast-

Effie staff recognized honor roll students in a school-wide assembly and later hosted a breakfast for students and family members.

#### Native Regalia Parade and Holiday Cultural Play-

Seventh graders designed and completed beading projects that were later displayed in a Native Regalia Parade for parents and elders. Eighth graders wrote and performed a culturally relevant holiday play.

Seventh and eighth graders students participated in the local elder luncheon at the Morris Thompson Center.

#### Gaalyee'ah Culture Camp-

Seventh and eighth graders completed a winter campout at Howard Luke's Gaalyee'ah Spirit Camp on the Tanana River.

#### **Cultural Science Fair-**

The 8<sup>th</sup> grade held the annual Cultural Science Fair. Volunteer judges from a variety of organizations throughout the community participated. Several projects were selected for entry in the Interior Alaska Science Fair.

# Section VI: Changes

## **Distance Education Capacity-**

EKCS installed video conferencing hardware over the course of the 2016/17 school year. An initial attempt to offer our Gwich'in language class distance delivery was unsuccessful but we plan to continue with these efforts.

#### JH Schedule-

The JH team is experimenting with class schedule changes allowing for increased movement between classrooms/teachers in an effort to improve successful transition to high school.

## Leveled Literacy Intervention (LLI) Implementation-

The HS team will begin implementation of LLI in the 9th and 10th grades. Teachers will learn to benchmark test students and utilize LLI in 9th and 10th grade English classes.

#### On Site Mental Health Clinician-

EKCS continues to work with FNA Behavioral Health to secure funding to provide on-site counseling services. Currently we are awaiting release of carry-over funding which will be used to contract with a counselor for the 2017/18 school year.

#### On Site Social Worker-

In partnership with the Fairbanks Native Association, a Family Services Coordinator was placed at the EKCS for the duration of the school year. This position is grant funded to continue for four more years.
