




Message from the Superintendent

This vision guides our mission and the outcomes we aim to achieve. Consequently, our teachers, administrators, and staff work tirelessly to ensure we meet two vision objectives in our mission. The first objective is to make sure that every student feels loved in our schools, and the second objective is to ensure that every student has demonstrated academic growth in our schools.



We Love and Grow our Students! - District Vision

Every mission has challenges that present an opportunity for improvement and growth. I was reminded of our mission while elementary students working in a school garden. The students were asked to create an environment that would support the growth of the plants in the garden. From those simple instructions, the students began their work. They enriched the soil with nutrients, watered the roots, and pruned away obstructions that blocked the sunlight. This mirrors the work educators do every day. Just as plants need sun, water, and good soil to grow, our students need knowledge, skills, and good character to grow. These young students helped inspire the theme for the 2023-2024 school year - "The Growing Season." Our teachers, staff, and administrators are committed to creating a healthy environment that supports student growth. To overcome the challenges to our healthy environment, we will pursue three (3) improvement and growth opportunities. Firstly, we will develop a district-wide Social Emotional Learning (SEL) program to address the rise of anxiety, depression. and trauma experienced by our children. SEL programs are proven methods to create a positive school climate by helping students learn skills like


self-regulation, problem-solving, empathy, and impulse control. These skills will not only help reduce negative behaviors like bullying, but will also improve decision-making and increase academic performance. Secondly, we will focus on connecting students with mentors, advisors, coaches, and volunteers to make supportive connections to maximize the potential of all students. We cannot grow our students if we do not know our students. Our third major opportunity involves the 5-Year Master Facilities Plan. This plan will address the growth of student enrollment in the Chapin schools and the growing facility needs of the Dutch Fork and Irmo schools. We are conducting a study of enrollment projections, facility conditions, school capacities, and educational needs to determine capital priorities for all schools. The targeted completion date of the 5-Year Master Facilities Plan will be in 2030. With your help, we will be able to overcome these challenges and take advantage of the improvement and growth opportunities that will allow all students to meet their greatest potential.

Our 2,600 educators work with 17,300 students daily to continue the vision of loving and growing all students. Let's grow until all the children are well. #LetsGrow

About Our District



The District is primarily a residential suburb located to the northwest of the city of Columbia, the capital city of South Carolina. Included in the District are the towns of Irmo and Chapin. The school district has three attendance areas: Chapin, Dutch Fork, and Irmo. District Five operates a total of 13 elementary schools, two intermediate schools, three middle schools, four high schools, one Center for Advanced Technical Studies. one alternative school and a virtual education option called FIVE.




GENERAL FUND OVERVIEW

District Highlights

Celebrating the 2022-2023 School Year in District Five of Lexington & Richland Counties

Niche.com released its 2023 Best Schools in America rankings, and Lexington-Richland School District Five was again named as a top school district in South Carolina and the number one school district in the Midlands.

The district earned an "A" rating by Niche and was ranked as the number one "Best Places to Teach" in South Carolina. The district was also voted the top district in the Midlands with the

"Best Teachers" in South Carolina. School District Five's overall "A" rating is based on categories consisting of academics, teachers, clubs and activities, diversity, college prep and health and safety. The rankings include updated data for 92,743 public schools, 30,112 private schools, and 11,820 school districts nationwide. While traditional rankings rely almost exclusively on metrics like test scores academic performance, Niche's rankings combine user

input — ratings from current students, alumni, and parents — with quantitative data from sources like the U.S. Department of Education to evaluate teachers, resources and facilities, extracurricular activity opportunities and more.

District students begin First Jobs initiatives through internships

The district celebrated the first-ever First Jobs Signing Day on February 28, 2023. The First Jobs Initiative is a unique way to help the district with the nationwide labor shortage, as well as prepare students to be career ready.

"The First Jobs initiative is part of School District's Five vision for loving and growing our students," School District Five's Career and Technical Education Coordinator Charity Simmons said. "The goal is to recognize all students' accomplishments as they move from the classroom to the workplace. We want to highlight our students who are transitioning into the workforce in the same way that we celebrate a future collegiate athlete with a signing day ceremony."

The district students work in jobs in the transportation department, student nutrition department, clerical positions, as well as jobs in basic maintenance and landscaping. The objective of the initiative is to provide students ages 16 and older with state-approved work-based learning experiences in order to increase their career readiness and improve school operations.

The job openings at the school district also provide students with a good alternative to other jobs in the area, which may require them to work late night shifts, weekends, and holidays.

District Adult Education Program receives statewide recognition

The District's Adult Education Program was recognized by the South Carolina Office of Adult Education for outstanding performance in response to the pandemic.

School District Five's Adult Education Program received a "Stepped Up to the Plate" award during the South Carolina Office of Adult Education's Fall Institute Celebration of Success Luncheon. The award category is presented to Adult Education programs that have developed innovative solutions to address the many challenges that arose during the coronavirus pandemic.

"This award is an acknowledgement of the hard work and dedication of the School District Five Adult Education team," said Paula Wright, School District Five Adult Education Director. "The award itself represents our prioritization of student needs, our creativity in providing student support, and the compassion that guides how we educate our students. I am very proud to be a member of the District Five Adult Education Family!"

School District Five's program was spotlighted for recognizing the need to provide better access to instruction, enrollment and record keeping by moving to digital onboarding processes as well as digital teacher and student folders. This process began as a response to the program's normal operations being disrupted by the evolving COVID-19 protocols in the 2020-2021 school year.

However, because of the ability to provide greater access to current and future students as well as staff, and due to the efficiency of the new processes, the digitization of registration and record keeping has become standard operating procedure.

"As a STEAM magnet, we seek to reimagine how materials can be used in an unconventional way. Through our engineering design process, we re-use recycle materials and almost daily. Being selected as the Conserve School of the Year shows that our green STEAM efforts are making an impact!" Leaphart won for their projects in Reuse, Recycling and Green Purchasing (harvesting and selling seeds from the sunflowers they grew).



International Science Fair Winners

Two District Five students received top awards at the Regeneron International Science and Engineering Fair (Regeneron ISEF). A program of the Society for Science for over 70 years, Regeneron ISEF is the world's largest global science competition for high schoolers.

Carlynn Rychener (Chapin High) and Andy Yang (Dutch Fork High) competed at the world's largest global high school competition in Dallas, Texas, on May 13-19. These youth were chosen based on their outstanding research projects at the South Carolina Regional II Science & Engineering Fair.

Rychener is a senior at Chapin High. She placed 3rd at ISEF in the Earth & Environmental Sciences Category with her project on the creation of microplastics in the environment due to abiotic and environmental factors.

Yang is a junior in the STEM Program at Dutch Fork High. He placed 4th in the Robotics and Intellectual Machines Category. Yang is interested in innovation with machine learning, specifically developing algorithms to enhance objection recognition for fuzzy natured images.

"Our teachers encourage us to strive for curiosity and Mr. Barry Lindler has helped to inspire a passion in computer science," Yang said. "I just wanted to delve more deeply into code and coding languages. Our teachers encourage us to go past the content and encourage us to look for things you can apply to real life and search for innovation."

National Poster Contest Winner

Caroline Chorey, a fourth grader at Leaphart Elementary School STEAM Magnet, received second place in the elementary school level in the 2023 Magnet Schools of America Poster Contest.

The contest highlights and promotes magnet schools across the country. This year, students had the option to express or interpret one of the magnet school pillars or all five. The pillars are: diversity, innovative curriculum & professional development, academic excellence, high-quality instructional systems, family and community partnerships.

"I am so excited my poster placed in the contest. When it comes to drawing, first my ideas come from the heart and then the creativity comes from the head," Chorey said.

Students compete in one three of levels: elementary, middle or high school level. Online voting took place in March. Voters selected the top five posters from each level. They also voted on originality organization as well as the use of color and design. Students had to adhere to the theme as well as provide a clear and concise message. •

ACADEMIC 2022-2023 K-12 HIGHLIGHTS



Irmo High School New Wing

In February 2022, the School Board approved LS3P Associates to begin the planning for a new wing at Irmo High School. The new wing will be built at the site of the current student parking lot and will match the front of the school tying into the west wing. Design ideas were received from staff and community members and a history wall will be incorporated to reflect the Irmo High School Community.



Chapin High School Press Box

Construction of the stadium seating and press box at Chapin High School is near completion by Edcon General Contractors. The additional seating will allow Chapin to compete in 5A playoff events. In January 2022, the School Board approved Jumper Carter Sease Architects to design stadium seating for both the home and visitor sides.

This project also included the construction of a new press box that allows coaches and staff to call the games for our home field crowd, as well as a new concession stand and multipurpose room all in one builiding.
