





BUILDING PROJECT UPDATE Robert Tennell, Project Manager



Does construction stop in winter?

While traditional wisdom might make you think that construction stops, work does continue, though the conditions are not ideal. When most of us are huddled up to the closest source of heat, construction workers are completing vital portions of the project that keep the building on schedule. The amount and the type of work they are able to complete depends on the stage of the project. Interior work can continue throughout the winter season, while exterior work is limited by the weather conditions.

What about our projects?

Kirkersville Elementary, a nearly 60,000 square foot renovation plus a small office area addition, is protected from the wintery conditions by being fully enclosed. As a result, interior work such as mechanical, electrical, plumbing, painting, drywall installation, cabinetry work and the installation of the ceiling grid continues full speed ahead. Since most of the remaining exterior work is finishing work (landscaping, concrete walkways and an asphalt topcoat), much of the work has been moved to the spring before being completed. This ability to work during the winter months places the building on schedule to open in August of 2024.

Unlike Kirkersville, Pataskala South Fork Elementary is a new 76,000 square foot building that has not been fully enclosed under a waterproof canopy. Therefore, work at this site is extremely weather dependent. However, since the December temperatures remained relatively mild, exterior work was able to continue. If you drive by the site, you will notice that winter construction work has included storm line installation, the pouring of all major building slabs, the start of truss installation, ongoing masonry work with door frame installations, and some electrical and plumbing installation. If the conditions continue to allow for winter construction, the new Pataskala South Fork Elementary will remain on schedule to open in August of 2025.








TRANSPORTATION UPDATE Ryan Brown. Director of Logistics

The Transportation Department has had a successful first semester. We continue to appreciate everyone's patience as we deal with occasional bus driver and bus monitor shortages. We are currently transporting 2,724 students daily and travel approximately 3,705 miles each day. In addition to transporting students safely to and from school each day, we have also completed 500 additional trips such as field trips or extracurricular trips so far this school year.

With the weather changing, please make sure students are dressed appropriately, preferably with colors that can be seen easily during the dark mornings. Also, monitor the local news and our District website and social media accounts for school announcements, such as school closings and delays.

We continue to need your help. We have had a significant increase in the number of motorists driving past our buses when they are stopped to pick-up and/or drop-off students. Obviously, this is very unsafe, and we are turning those motorists into the Ohio State Highway Patrol for those violations. However, we want to remind everyone that as the bus approaches a stop, their yellow (amber) lights begin to flash. This is to alert drivers to begin slowing down for a stop. Once the bus comes to a stop and opens the door, the red stop lights begin flashing and the stop arm extends. When the red lights are flashing, no one should be moving until they stop flashing. Help us keep our students safe by spreading the word to drive more cautiously around school buses.



General Guidelines for Keeping Children Home From School Due to Illness

It's that time of the year where bad weather--snow, slush, freezing temperatures--can present challenges to getting children to school, just like the illnesses such as colds, flu, fevers, and earaches that often come with the winter months. Here are some ideas to help students miss less school:

- 1. Develop back up plans for getting your children to school in bad weather.
- 2. Keep your children healthy, including strategies such as:
 - a. Maintain a regular bedtime and morning routine.
 - b.Ensure your children eat a good breakfast every morning.
 - c.Stress hand washing.
 - d. Reinforce the importance of avoiding close contact with individuals who are sick.
 - e.If your children seem anxious about going to school, ask teachers, school counselors for advice on how to make your children feel more comfortable.
- 3. Keep your children engaged in learning if they cannot attend school in person.
 - a. Ask your teacher for work that they can do while at home.
 - b.Encourage your children to log into Google Classroom, call classmates, and stay connected to the teacher to find out about what they have missed.

We understand that students will miss school but there are lot of things you can do at home to keep them from falling further behind in work.

The second semester has started at the SWL Digital Academy. We currently have 76 students enrolled, but it is not too late. If you have a student that would thrive learning at their own pace and own time, I encourage you to consider enrolling them in the Digital Academy. You can do that by going to the SWL school district website, choosing SWL Digital Academy, and then clicking the link for the 2nd Semester Application link on the right hand side of the website. Another option is to use the QR code below to jump to the application.

For our students and their families that are enrolled, we encourage you to establish daily routines to make sure you stay on track with both your coursework and the state-required hours. Remember that each school day, students must login to Edmentum and be working on their coursework and submitting guided notes. Students should also be using IXL each day to review core content. If you need assistance, reach out to Mr. Brown, the Director, at <u>rbrownelaca.org</u>; he is able to unlock posttests, reset tests, and answer any other questions that you might have.

While at the ELC students decorated and devoured yummy sugar cookies and shared their biggest Christmas wishes with Santa. The high school choir came over to sing carols for the preschool students. The Fall Scholastic Book Fair was a resounding success, fostering a love for reading and exploration among our students. We concluded the first semester of our WIS Clubs, providing students with various avenues for exploration and skill-building. Looking ahead, students are eagerly anticipating choosing new clubs for the upcoming semester.

Our school community embraced a spirit of generosity and kindness through various initiatives. The Warrior Leader Club organized a successful Soctober drive, collecting socks for those in need, while our Winter Clothing/Toy drive brought immense support, displaying the generosity of our school community. In honor of our veterans, we raised funds for Honor Flights, demonstrating our gratitude for their service and sacrifice. Bringing families together, the Mother-Student Dodgeball brought competition but lots of laughter after school hours. Our students were treated to a Holiday Choir Concert and Orchestra performance at the WMHS auditorium, providing cultural exposure and musical enrichment. As we celebrate the achievements and collective efforts of our school community this quarter, we are grateful for the dedication and support that continue to make Watkins Intermediate School a hub of learning, compassion, and growth.





WATKINS MIDDLE SCHOOL

As we approach the midpoint of the school year, the students and staff of WMS are excited to celebrate our accomplishments from the first half of the year, while preparing for the future. Our building goals have been steadfast in focusing on academic growth and achievement through targeted interventions during our FOCUS block periods. We've also looked to reinforce both academic and behavioral success through our PBIS (Positive Behavior Intervention Systems) during our monthly class meetings.



One part of the WMS mission statement involves helping our students become contributing members of our community. Seventh grade students are exposed to many career-based skills as a part of our career tech coursework. During October and November, all 400 of our seventh graders visited OSU Newark where they received college enrollment exposure through the enrollment offices of OSU Newark and COTC (Central Ohio Technical College). Eighth graders students will take spring visits to C-TEC to learn about career-based education opportunities for high school. This will ensure that every student in Southwest Licking Schools will have both career exploration and college exploration opportunities prior to entering high school.

Monthly class meetings give teachers and administrators an opportunity to celebrate the great things that students have accomplished during the previous month. Teacher nominations for "On a roll" (growth awards) and "Ultimate Warrior" (above and beyond awards) are recognized, along with any quarterly attendance, academic, and athletic achievements. Academic, attendance, and discipline data are shared out with students to maintain transparency and to address goals and course corrections for the month. Our PBIS committee organizes student recognition programs and special incentive events. Recently, students were able to use their PBIS tickets to purchase items from Porters Coffee. These incentives are vital in reinforcing academic and behavioral expectations by recognizing students for doing the right thing.





In order to continue to reinforce high school readiness, we build upon student depth of knowledge through the development of project based learning initiatives. Students in select 8th grade ELA and social studies classes collaboratively developed PBL lessons focused on resilience. PBL exposure is consistently utilized throughout our STEM and art programming and reinforced throughout the core in select lessons. The picture below depicts a PBL lesson utilized in the Environmental Sustainability classes where students competed in "Food Truck Wars", where they designed a prototype truck, food menu, and business plan with select sustainability models. Students also prepared sample food items for judging during the competition.

The third quarter will bring about several exciting ventures prior to spring break. Sixth and seventh graders will participate in a much-anticipated Valentines Dance. March will bring about our community favorite 'Math Night', and our eighth graders will take their yearly trip to C-TEC. It's going to be a great spring at WMS!

WATKINS MEMORIAL HIGH SCHOOL

Mrs. Elder's Calculus classes participated Pancake Pandemonium. Students in poured pancakes, measured the radius by the second, and found the volume. Students used these measurements to calculate the actual average velocity of the radius of the pancake at different intervals and then used calculus to determine the theoretical velocity of the radius at the end of each interval. They compared the two, identified sources of discussed strategies error, and for improving accuracy.







Freshmen took part in "Life in the Real World," a budgeting activity to help them practice for adulthood. Community volunteers provided scenarios to



students who "paid their bills" and made budgetary decisions as they circulated from station to station.



Mrs. Rahm's Physics students created water bottle rockets and shot them off using air pressure. They evaluated the projectile motion by measuring angle, range, and hang time to calculate velocity. Students also had to design successful fins and find the center of gravity for their rocket. Students will continue to use their rocket data as they move through the force and energy units.
