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What is Title 1?

According to the U.S. Department of Education, the **purpose of Title** 1 funding, "is to ensure that all children have a fair, equal, and significant opportunity to obtain a high quality education and reach, at minimum, proficiency on challenging state academic achievement standards and state academic assessments."



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All schools receiving Title 1, Part A funds are required to convene an Annual Title 1, Part A parent meeting to:

- Inform parents and families of their school's participation
- Explain the requirements of the Title 1, Part A program
- Explain the rights of parents to be involved

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HOW Title I Funds Are Distributed to Schools

The President submits an annual budget request, usually in February.



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By April, Congress files a budget resolution, which sets funding for the next fiscal year which begins October 1st.



State Education Agencies (SEAs) are required to submit a plan to the federal government that describes their state's learning expectations for all students and how they plan to measure progress.

The Federal Government awards Title I funds to SEAs based on various income formulas.



SEAs send Title I funds to school districts, also called Local Education Agencies (LEAs), based on the number of low-income families.





LEAs identify eligible schools and distribute Title I funds accordingly.



Schools are required to use Title I funds to support at-risk students, which can include targeted assistance programs and schoolwide initiatives.

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Targeted Assistance

AGCS receives funding through the Targeted Assistance program (compared to school-wide).

- School identifies students and provides them with supplemental services
- Title I funds directly benefit identified students
- Academic need-meet established criteria
- Rank order of students-those who are most at risk

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Parental Rights & Involvement

- Participate on decision-making committees, such as a school improvement committee, parent advisory committees, and district/building leadership teams.
- Volunteer to review the district parent involvement policy (annually), school parent involvement plan (periodically), School-Parent Compact (annually) and the schoolwide plan (if applicable) (annually);
- Attend and participate in parent-teacher conferences, school events, activities and parent training programs.

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Tier Criteria for Eligibility in the Area of ELA

1st Grade

Three data points are used to determine eligibility of additional reading support. The three measures of reading success are:

FALL: (1) Nonsense Word Fluency (letter sounds read), (2) Phoneme Segmentation Fluency, and (3) Imagine Literacy.

WINTER/SPRING: (1) Nonsense Word Fluency (whole words read), (2) Oral Reading Fluency, and (3) Imagine Literacy.

Points are associated with bands of scores on all assessments. The sum of points from all three assessments allow for students to be placed within a particular tier grouping.

Percentiles	Nonsense Word Fluency	Phoneme Segmentation Fluency/ Oral Reading Fluency	Imagine Literacy
0-25th%ile	2 points	2 points	2 points
26th-49th%ile	1 point	1 point	1 points
50th-99th%ile	0 points	0 points	0 points





5-6 points	Tier 3

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


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What the research says...
