Ways to Get Involved in Your Student's Education

- Keep up to date on your child's progress! Routinely checking how your student is performing will helps your student stays on track with their classwork. Saint Paul Public Schools uses two systems to record student information:
- For any Assignments SCHOOLOGY is the platform where teachers keep classwork and grades. For an overview to Schoology, you can visit: A Guide to Schoology for Parents which has lessons available in five languages. Also, ask your student to give you a Schoology tour on their iPad. This is a great way to start a conversation on what your student is currently working on in their classes.
- Attendance CAMPUS/ PARENT PORTAL stores absences and tardies for classes. To access your Campus account go to: One Stop Website and click login to the right.
- Need help with your parent login information? Want to make sure you receive emails from teachers and counselors? Call the Harding Office: 651-293-4700.
- ▶ **Our Harding website**: Check out the updated Athletics section on the Harding website, complete with a calendar of all athletic events and links to athletic forms! Also, keep an eye on the Harding News feed to keep up with the latest information about the goings-on at our school. All that and more can be found at harding.spps.org.
- ▶ **Parent Teacher Conferences** are a good opportunity to talk with teachers and hear students talk about their progress. Our next conference will be Thursday, March 1, 2018 from 4:00pm to 7:00pm

Harding is celebrating its 24th year as an IB World School! There is so much to celebrate in our diverse, challenging, nurturing and flexible Diploma Program. All of our Harding IB DP students graduate prepared for the academic challenges of university and our 2017 IB DP graduates are currently in colleges all across the USA (Augsburg, Dartmouth, Carleton, Stanford, Century, St. Ben's/St. John's, Hamline, Macalester, Mankato, Metro State, St. Paul College, St. Kate's, St. Cloud, Metro State, UMD, UMTC, UMN – Morris, Pomona and many, many more). Additionally, our IB Middle Years Program was authorized last Spring, which makes Harding a complete IB campus.

Looking back at 2016-2017:

- Congratulations to the 14 students who worked toward earning their IB Diplomas!
- Congratulations to the 288 students who took 1 or more IB DP exams last May!
- Congratulations to the 448 students who took 1 or more IB DP classes last year!

Last year was filled with many, many successes. Harding's IB Diploma Program boasted 288 students taking 658 IB DP exams! These numbers continue to qualify Harding for the Washington Post's renowned "Challenge Index" -- which annually identifies America's best high schools. To find a place on this list, schools must have given at least as many IB DP or AP exams as the school had graduating seniors. Harding has been on this list for the last several years and this recognition raises our profile statewide and nationally.

We are proud to declare that five of our IB Diploma Candidates earned the very challenging IB Diploma last May - the ultimate academic achievement at Harding.

Looking forward to 2017-2018:

- ► Harding's IB Diploma Program continues to grow, with more and more students challenging themselves with IB DP classes. It is our goal that EVERY student who attends Harding takes at least one IB DP class either in 11th or 12th grade (or both!).
- The class of 2018 has 17 students striving to earn the IB Diploma. These students will take at least 3 "Higher Level" and 3 "Standard Level" IB DP classes and exams, as well as complete an Extended Essay (EE), "Creativity, Activity & Service" (CAS) hours and expand their minds with the Theory of Knowledge (ToK) class.

There are many exciting things happening at Harding with MYP. First, the 9th grade students began to learn about service learning, or service as action. Service requires that students are able to build authentic connections between what they learn in the classroom and what they encounter in the community. After learning about possible service activities, advisories voted on service activities in which they would like to participate. We are still in the early planning stages but the idea is to carry out our service learning in early spring.


Second, 10th grade students are working very hard on their personal projects. There is a wide range of topics this year including, learning to play the guitar, making a skateboard, a study of how video games affect the lives of teens, and building a computer to name a few. Students are required to journal their personal project progress. They have written about how their topic relates to the world around them, about the approaches to learning (ATL) skills they will need to use throughout the project, and they have documented their research and the process of putting their project together. They are now working on the final piece which is the paper. The Personal Project Showcase will take place on Wednesday, March 18th.

Finally, teachers are continuing to work on their MYP unit plans paying particular attention to the Approaches to Learning (ATL) Skills. ATL skills are the skills students need to become independent learners and be successful at Harding and beyond. We match the objectives from the unit with the ATL skills students need in order to be successful on the summative assessment (final project or test). We have been using specific strategies (AVID) that align with the ATL skills to help students master the skills. They are learning and having fun in the process!

NJROTC

Since the last newsletter article, the "Knight Navy" - Harding's Naval Junior ROTC unit, has competed in three inter-school competitions.

The first competition was hosted by Harding on Saturday, October 7, the ninth annual "Great Northern All Team Sport (GNATS)" Blowout. JROTC cadets from seven local schools competed in single-elimination tournaments in Basketball, Volleyball, Dodge Ball, Flag Football, Soccer, Kickball, and a Tug-o-War. Of the seven events conducted, Harding took first place in Volleyball and Kickball and regained possession of the coveted **GNATS Busted Ball Traveling** Trophy that resided with Johnson's Air Force unit for the past year. The cadets are glad the trophy is back home, and hope to keep it here at next year's competition.

The 2nd competition was Como's "Devil Dog" Drill Meet on October 27 and 28.
Although our Knight Navy won no first place event trophies, we performed well enough in all events to take the 2nd place overall trophy out of ten schools, behind the host school, Como. The 3rd competition was held at Washington Technology

Magnet on November 17th. Six schools competed. Harding took the 2nd place trophy, and once again the host school came in first.

With the local competitions now completed, the cadets are preparing for the regional NJROTC Area 3 West Drill Meet in Great Lakes, Illinois on February 23rd and 24th, where the cadets will compete against the best 15 to 18 Navy JROTC units from a 10 state region. The Area 3 West drill meet will be the culmination of many months of early morning drill practice and countless pushups and sit-ups.

In addition to the NJROTC teams practicing both before and after school hours, the cadets have been doing considerable fundraising activities, picking up trash at the State Fair, helping with a concession stand at TCF Stadium, bagging groceries for tips at Cub Foods, and performing course marshall duties for the annual Saint Paul Classic Bike Tour.For their hard work, the cadets earned more than \$17,000 in less than three months from these events. The funds are used to offset the cost of hotels, buses, airfare, and meals during summer leadership programs, the Area 3 Drill Meet in Great Lakes, and the annual senior



honorable mention. They are: Chang Yang, Shervy Xiong, Tanyko Peterson and Tanguary Yang.



The big news of course, is the boys' soccer team success! For the first time ever the Harding Boys Soccer Team won the Section 4A Championship Title advancing to the state tournament. Enjoying a home field advantage, the Knights beat former state champions and rival Como Park in a great game at Bakken Field. While the boys lost a tough one to reigning state champs, St. Thomas Academy in the first round, they fought an incredible battle in front of a huge fan base on a frigidly cold night. Congratulations to Chameng Xiong and Sekou Swaray for being named all-conference and to Nurdin Ahmed, Ibrahim Mohammed and Lay Soe for being named all-conference honorable mention. Chameng and Sekou were also named to the all-state team. Chameng was also a Minnesota "Mr. Soccer" finalist. Kudos to Coach Mukwa Ogichida on his excellent leadership. We are so very proud of our Knights.

Winter sports began in November with teams enjoying very large numbers of participants. The wrestling team has been off to an exciting start. We began our season going 5-0 for the first time in recent history. With 34 wrestlers on the roster, we also have one of the larger teams in recent history. The many freshmen and sophomores on the team are learning and getting more experience each week, so there is a bright future ahead.

The Harding cagers opened their 2017 campaign at Mpls. South and dropped tough one on the road. Losing 60-57. They opened their home schedule with a commanding win versus a much-improved South St. Paul winning 82-63. The Knights then returned to the road with a disappointing loss at Simley, 63-81. Although the girls' basketball team is battling a wide array of injuries and setbacks, the Lady Knights have stayed strong and are heading into winter break with a record of 3-3. After a much-needed week off, the girls will tipoff on Thursday, December 28 at 1:00pm in the South St. Paul Tournament.
