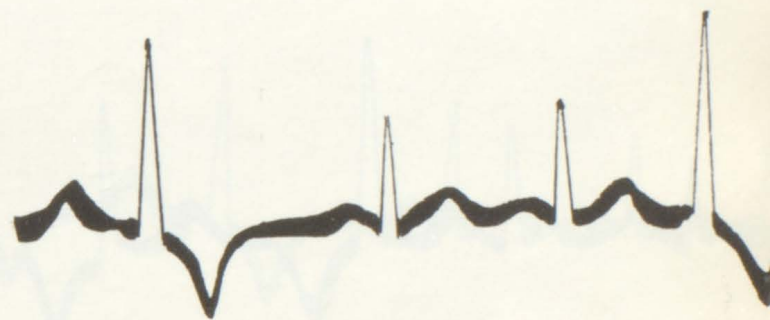


INSIDE THE BRICKS and concrete

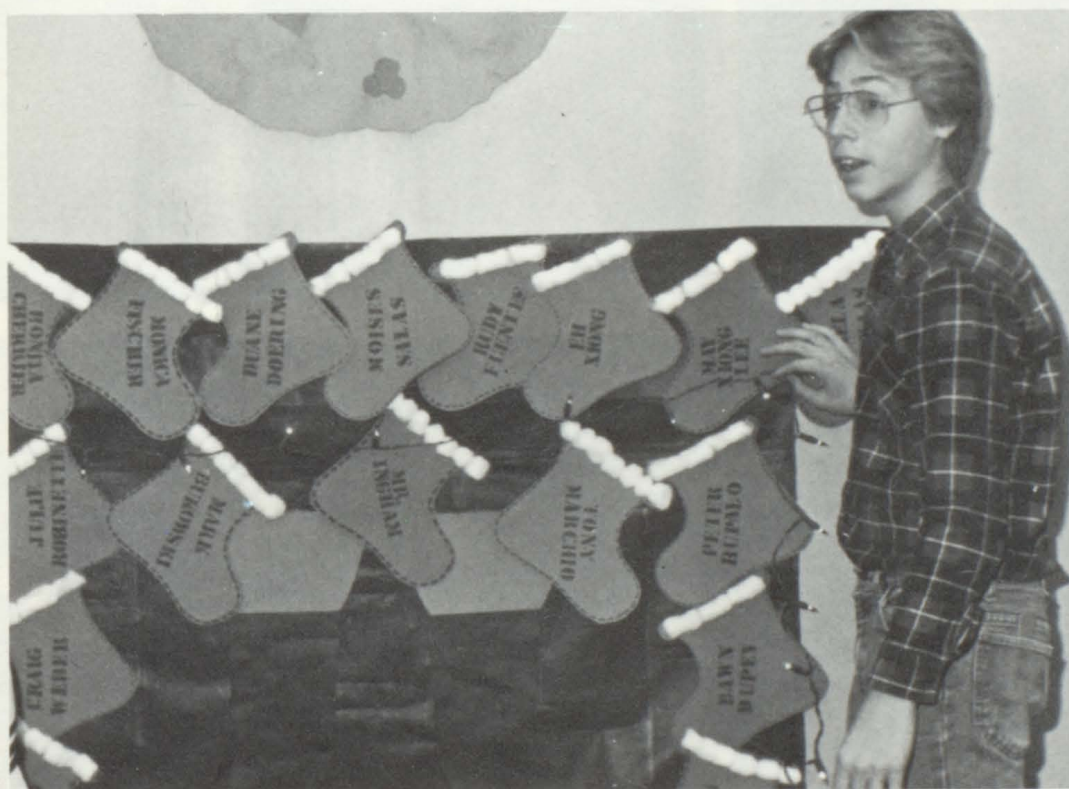
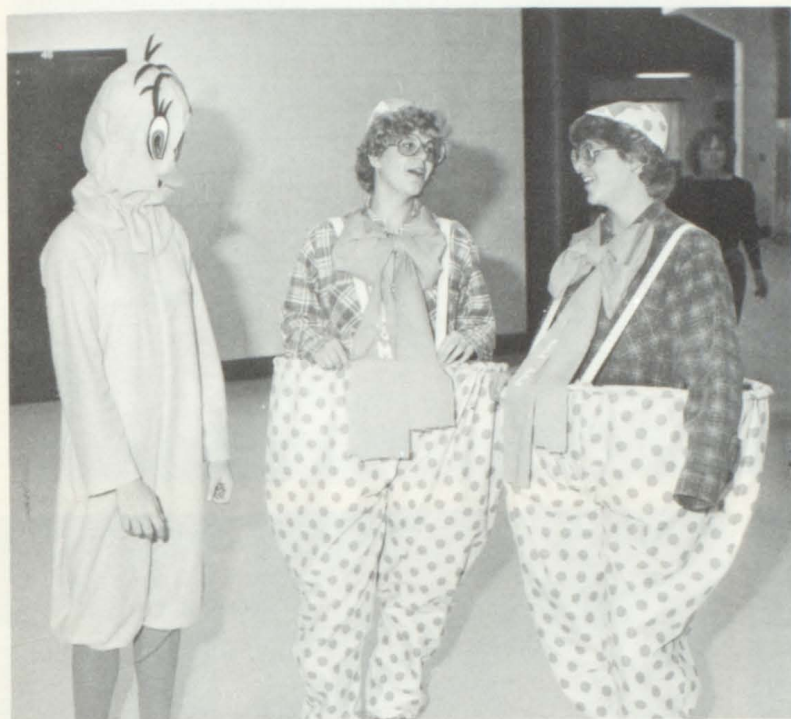

## Team leader stresses input

Stressing the importance of "input" from all members of the Humboldt community, Mr. Don Sonsalla settled into his brown leather chair on a steamy morning in August to assume his new role as chief administrator of the Humboldt Secondary Complex, a name he chose after the School Board ruled that both buildings would be served by only one principal.

While realizing that, as principal, he often had to make the final decision, Mr. Sonsalla stressed that he wanted his decision-making based on the thoughts and opinions of many of the people who had to live and work with those decisions.

Mr. Sonsalla saw the size of the faculty and support staff grow to 130 and the allocation of budget dollars dwindle to 15-20 percent of the previous year's totals.

He moved into his new position after a year as principal of the Humboldt Middle School. His prior assignments as principal were at Highland and Central.

While serving as the school's chief cheerleader, the Winona native worked to establish independent study programs, sought to improve the image of Humboldt and its students in the community, and made certain he did not spend too much time in that brown leather chair.

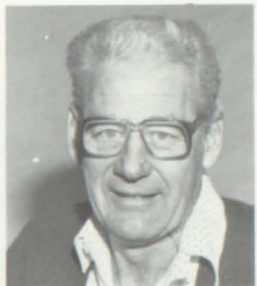

## School becomes new complex

A "new" Humboldt opened to 1400 students in September. There was a new administrative team, including a new principal and assistant principal, new scheduling procedures, new class offerings, new school policies, and even a new name for the school.

The biggest and most obvious change was the combining of the middle school and the senior high into one 7-12 grade complex. The school became known as Humboldt Secondary Complex, and its administrative team was led by Mr. Don Sonsalla, principal, and Mr. John Ettlinger, Dr. Joan Fehlen, and Mr. Don Rosenquist, assistant principals.

Also serving as team members were Mr. Steve Sandell, chairman of the Teacher's Advisory Board, and Laurie Munkwitz, Student Council president.

As a result of teacher and budget cut-backs, elective classes in the English and Social Studies Departments gave way to simple titles such as English 11 and Social Studies 12. Class sizes grew, with enrollment in many approaching 35 and no class of fewer than twenty students being offered.

And for those who could not arrive for first hour on time, a new holding room was set up in the cafeteria to prevent unnecessary class interruptions.

## Typing courses are the 'key'

"Hands on homerow, wrists up, eyes on the textbook, sit up straight!" were some tips Ms. Eleanor Kalkes repeated everyday to her typing students.

Ms. Kalkes, along with Ms. Margaret LaVigne, offered courses in beginning typing to learn the keyboard and basic skills and in advanced typing for people who considered careers in typing.

Students' reasons for taking typing differed in many ways. Some took typing in place of a study hall. Others wanted to prepare for college. One student wanted to make extra money typing papers.

"Everyone is going to have to know how to type eventually," said Ms. Kalkes. Most careers today require some typing skills and with the computer age here it was a necessity.

That was also the message Ms. LaVigne tried to instill in students. She was known as a "heavy recruiter" for all the business courses when it was time for students to sign up for classes.

Although typing classes seemed to be most popular, a number of other courses were offered by the Business Department, such as accounting and shorthand.

## Program works in job market

For the past 27 years the Humboldt on-the-job training (OJT) program has been getting seniors into the work force. Over the years the number of students on OJT has slowly increased.

Fifty seniors, two program coordinators, sixteen training stations, and eighteen companies made up the OJT program.

Mr. Joel Arnevik (Trades and Industry) and Mr. James Wirth (Business and Distribution) were the coordinators who assisted students in finding a job.

Students had to take a state required class, Occupational Relations, which served as their social studies credit when they enrolled in the OJT program.

They stayed in school for 3-4 hours to meet all requirements, including English, and worked at their training stations for 15-25 hours a week. They received two credits for going to their jobs plus a pay check.

"I signed up for OJT because I could earn money and credit for furthering my education" said Maureen Deutsch, who worked at Cherokee State Bank.

# General Motors makes donation

The donation to the Humboldt automotive shop this year of a 1982 Pontiac J2000, valued at \$9,384, was made possible by the efforts of Ms. Barbara Brill, former teacher in the school's program for the physically impaired.

It was a 2½-year project in persuasion for Ms. Brill, whose husband is an employee of the Pontiac Division of General Motors. Through her husband she was able to talk to "the right people" and make the donation possible.

Shortly before the car arrived, Ms. Brill's husband was transferred to Chicago, and she resigned from the Humboldt teaching staff.

While Mr. Wert knew of the possibility of receiving the car, the actual delivery came as a "real surprise."

Students in Mr. Wert's automotive class worked on cars as part of their normal routine. Most service was done on vehicles belonging to faculty and staff members who needed cars at the end of the school day. The gift from GM made it possible for students to tear down some part of the car, examine its workings, and not have to worry about getting it back together the same day.

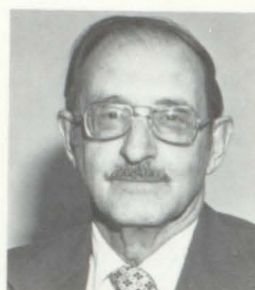

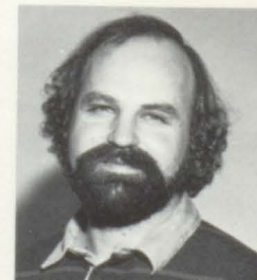

## French visitor enriches class

She said that while her summer "parole" could have lasted longer, it was nice to see everyone again.



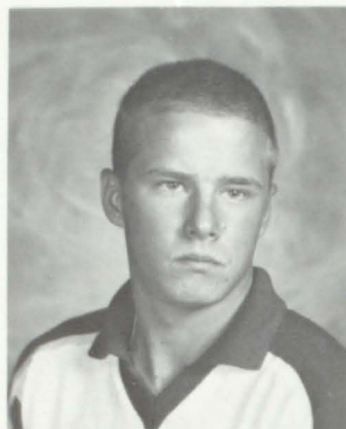

The year's big hit, **E.T., The Extra-Terrestrial**, was

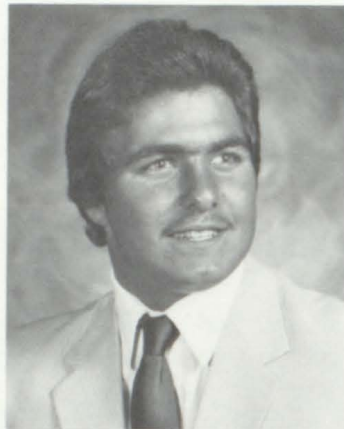
about an alien who lands on earth and a boy who helps him go "home."

rushing home to catch the last minutes of their favorite "addiction."

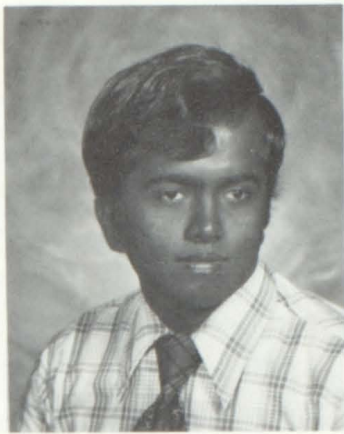
Explained Kim Berg, the shows are "exciting and bring out my fantasies." She added that her viewing habits regularly included 2½ hours of soaps when not in school.

While ABC's **General Hospital** and **All My Children** proved to be the most popular, a few students still maintained that their lives were already enough of a soap opera for them.





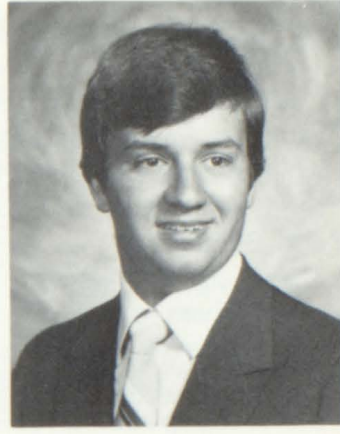

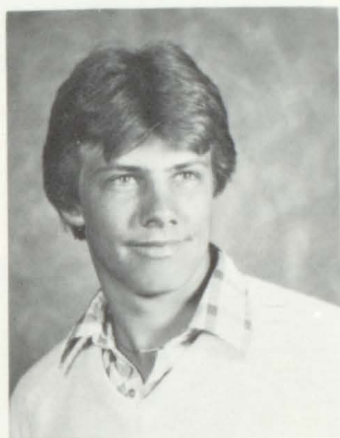

Although everyone needed a daily dose of music, the prescription varied.

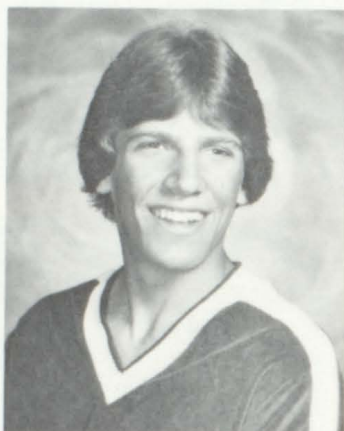
Some preferred country, jazz, and even classical, but the overwhelming favorite was some form of rock and roll.

Although the usual cost of lunch at a fast food restaurant was more expensive than a school lunch

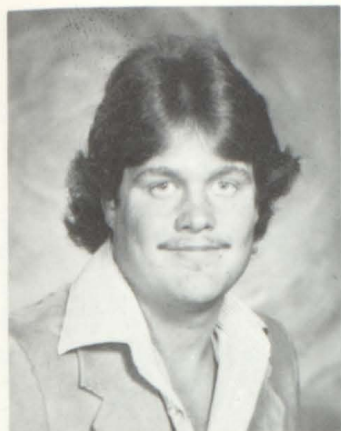
ticket, which sold for \$.85, many preferred to take the daily trip.

As Teresa Wille put it, "I like it better than home cooking, and it sure beats school lunch."

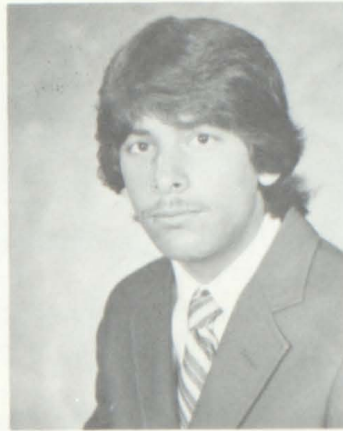

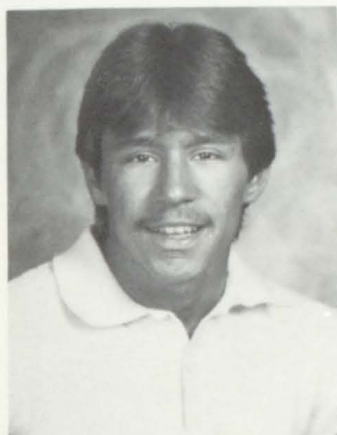

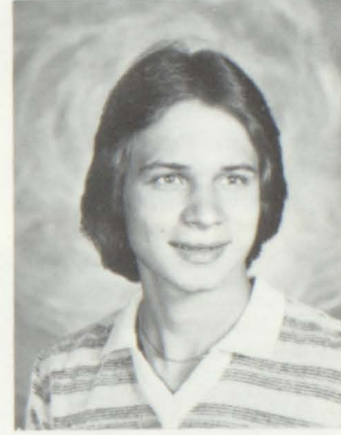

The one thing, according to Kelly Winter, that attracted people to junk food was its "good flavor." She added it was "something ma didn't make."

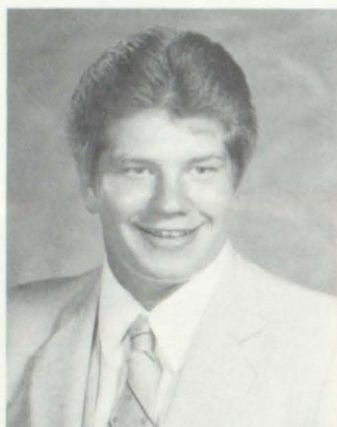
While John Heroff said the reason he ate junk food in school was because it was "the only edible thing around here during the day."

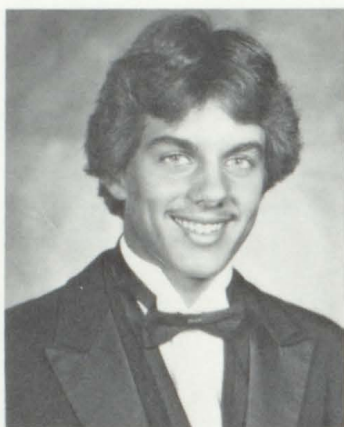
biz Pizza Place offering many specialty trades such as working the counter, doing fries, and handling clean-up chores.

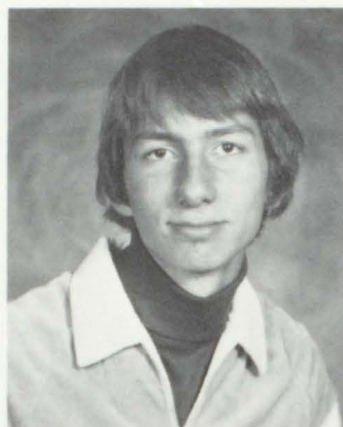
Pay rates usually started at the minimum of \$3.35 per hour, while rumors circulated that some part timers were over the \$5 per hour figure.



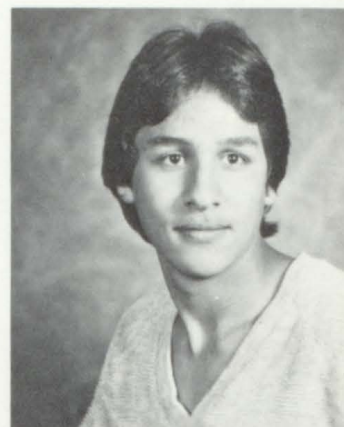

A few hold-outs, though, said they planned on doing "nothing," at least for now.

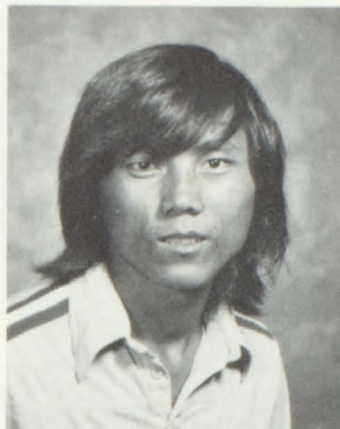

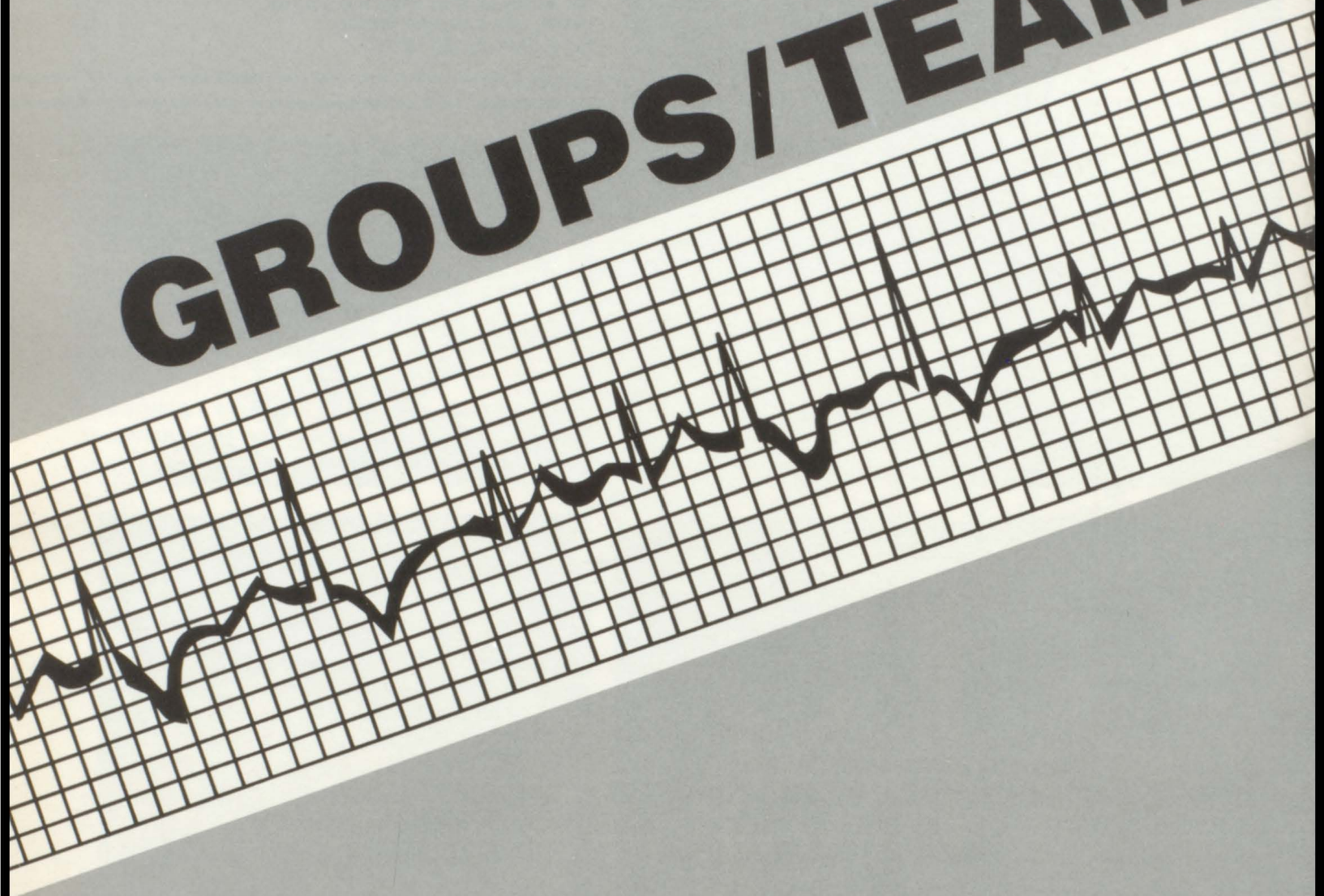

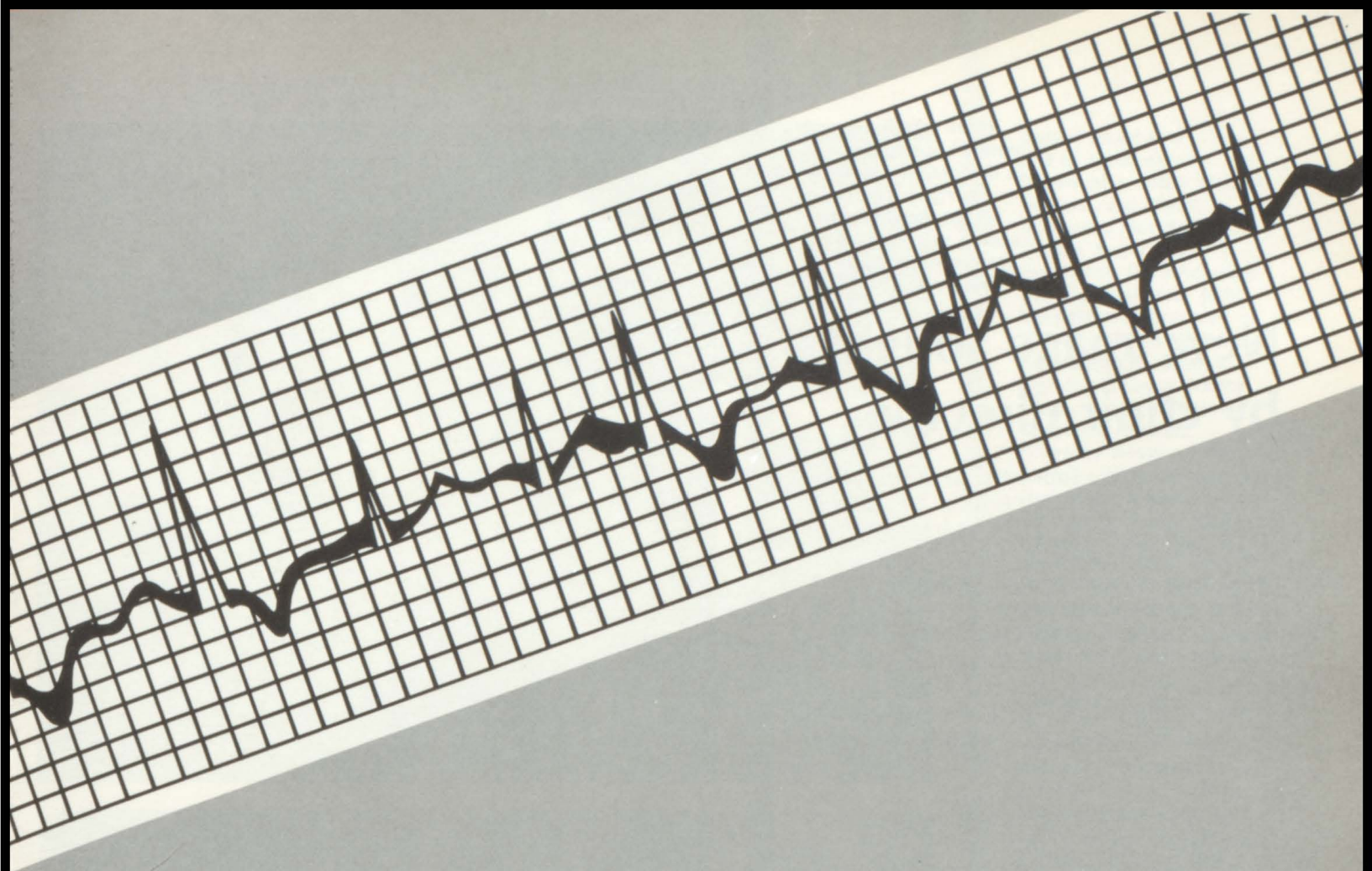

"Band is fun for me. Every time I learn something new I prove to myself that I can do it," said Corinne Budziszewski, two-year member of the band.

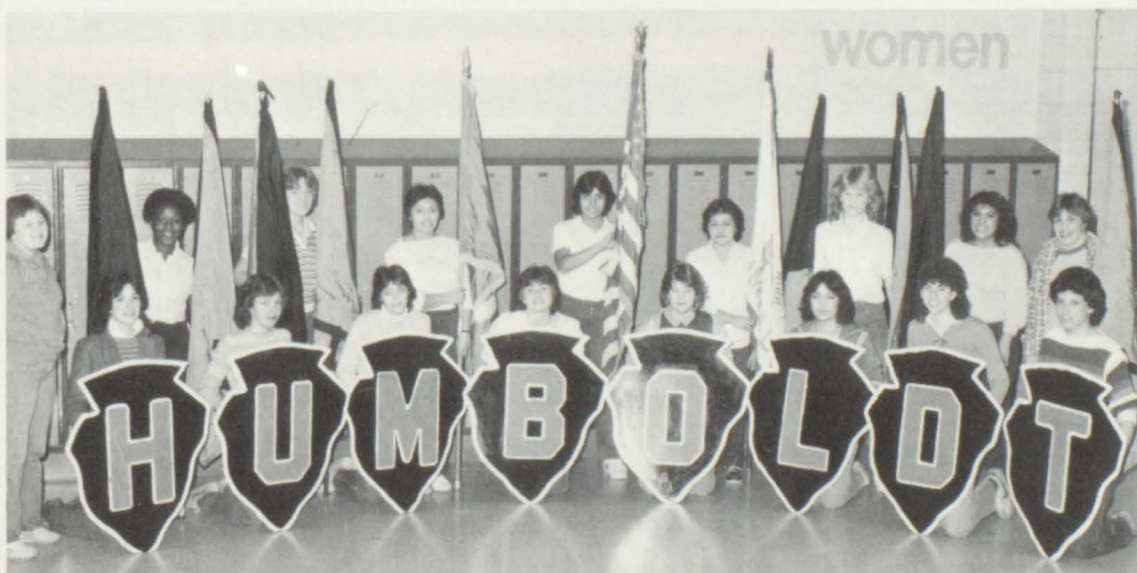

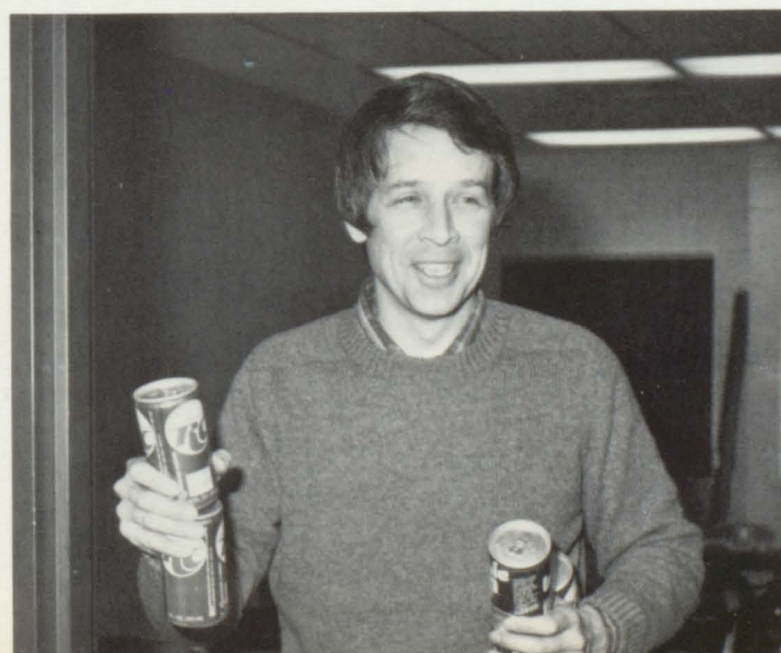
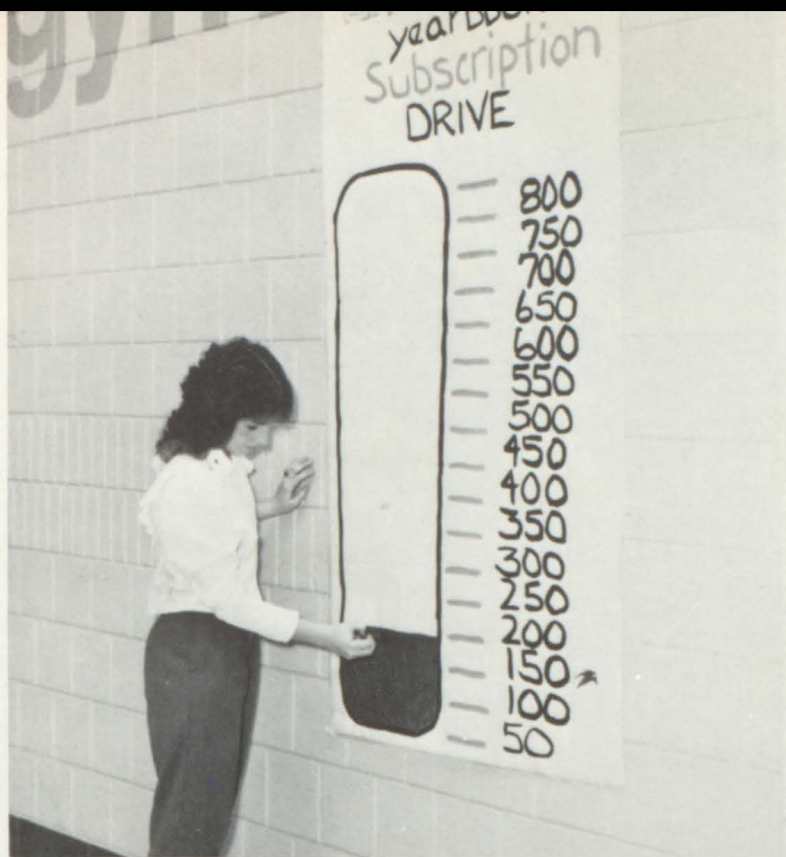

## Lively reporters chronicle 1983

At 6:30 p.m. not many people are left in the school building. Most of the corridors and classrooms are dark, except for the journalism room. Inside, students type copy, write headlines, and select pictures — all the tasks that were necessary to publish the **Life** yearbook and the **Arrow** newspaper.

The nine staff members were busier than normal, since both publications expanded to include grades 7 and 8.

In October the annual subscription drive began. During the seven-day promotion students were told to give "Your money for Your **Life**." Of the 575 books ordered from the Delmar Printing Company of North Carolina, 165 were sold on the first day, a recent record.

The last yearbook deadline was completed in February but two other deadlines (which were met early) kept the journalists working. The 128-page publication was delivered to students on May 27.

The **Arrow** was published six times. Reporters covered such stories as the conflict surrounding the Indian symbol on the Homecoming button ("Button fuels new controversy," February 4) and did some investigative reporting ("Holding room secrets revealed," November 12).

The newspaper staff also took editorial stands, in one issue supporting the football team ("Winless?", September 30) and in the next calling for the reinstatement of an after-school bus for students who stay late ("Activity bus essential," November 12).

The group was also responsible for publishing five issues of the principal's newsletter, **What's NEW(S) at Humboldt.**

Yearbook-newspaper editor Travis Kaminski was aided by the special contributions of Kari and Kelly Bortz and Penny Schuldt in completing the many deadlines on time.

## Victory saves football program

Described by some as the win that saved the football program at Humboldt, Coach Bob Ryan's team broke a two-year losing streak with a 22-18 victory over Harding in the final game of the year to add a positive note to a season with eight straight losses.

This was the first victory for Humboldt over Harding since 1967 and brought a real sense of satisfaction to a team which struggled through the season with 25 players (which was 25 fewer than some city squads), was ridiculed by some community members, and was the subject of a St. Paul **Dispatch** story which suggested that Humboldt give up its football program because the school could no longer field a competitive team.

Two touchdowns by Jerry Zigan, one on a 56-yard run and the other on a pass from quarterback John Heroff, and a TD by Mike Pizzuti on a 67-yard pass from Heroff plus points-after by Eddie Zepeda and Zigan gave Humboldt its margin of victory.

Although Humboldt was shut out in four games, the squad put 22 points on the board in a loss to city champion St. Thomas. Two touchdown passes from Heroff to Zigan led the offense, while the overworked defense could brag that it held the Tommies scoreless in the third quarter. The final was 42-22.

Zigan was named to the All-City team and was also voted MVP, most dedicated, and top offensive back. Others recognized were: Greg Sabin, top offensive lineman; Bob Zimmerman, top defensive lineman; and Zepeda, top defensive back.

"Even though I knew we couldn't win a meet because of our team's size, I tried to do my best in each race," Lanoux said.

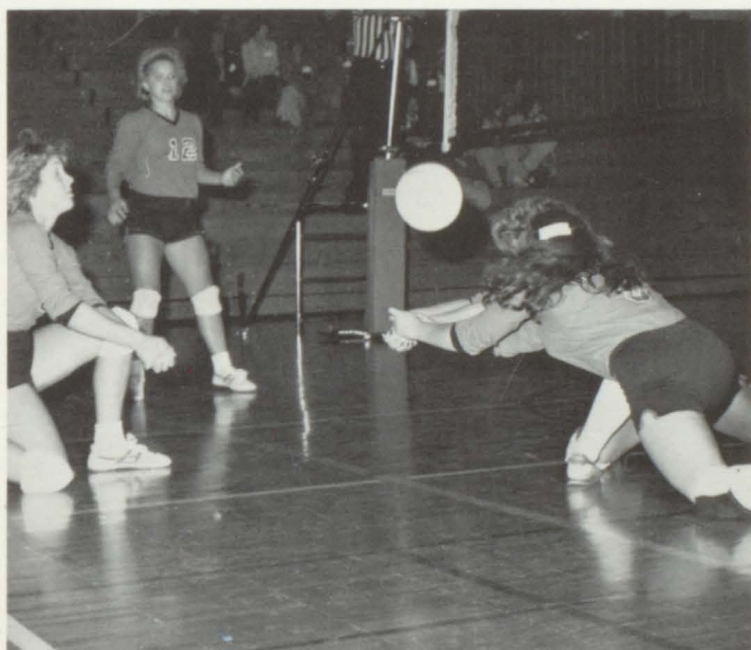

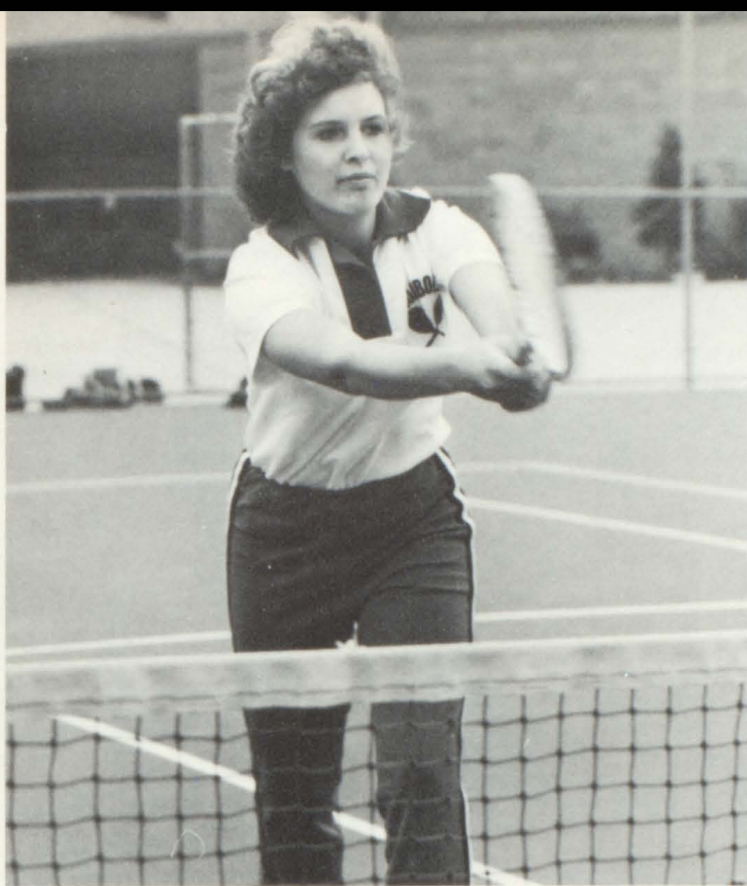

Although the Indians were defeated, 74-50, Central had to beat Humboldt's best times to score the win.

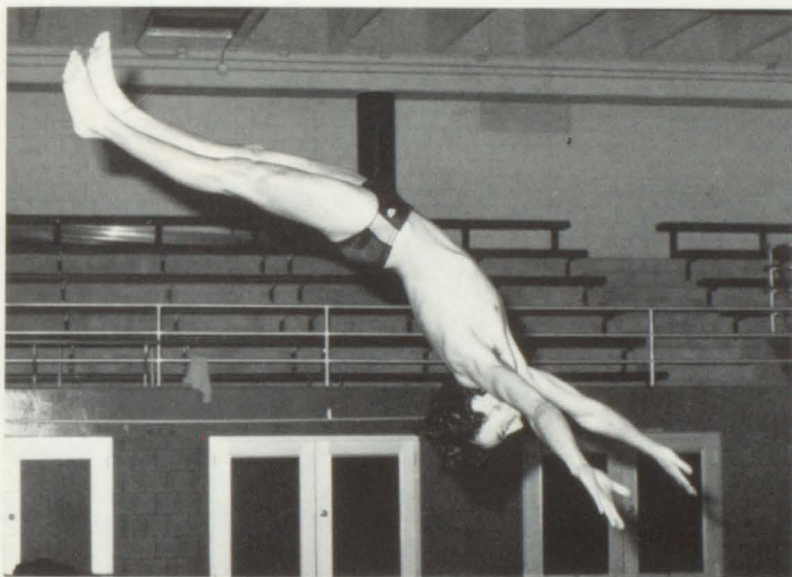
In the closest meet, against Harding, the Indians took three first places but lost, 71-52.

Special recognition went to Lisa Ramirez, most dedicated; Schuldts, MVP; and Tracy Vasquez, most improved.

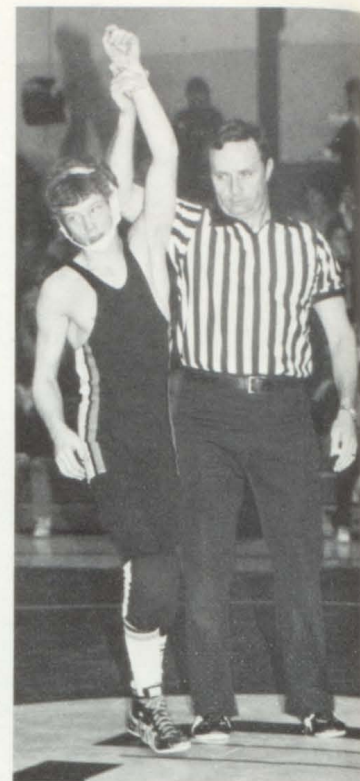
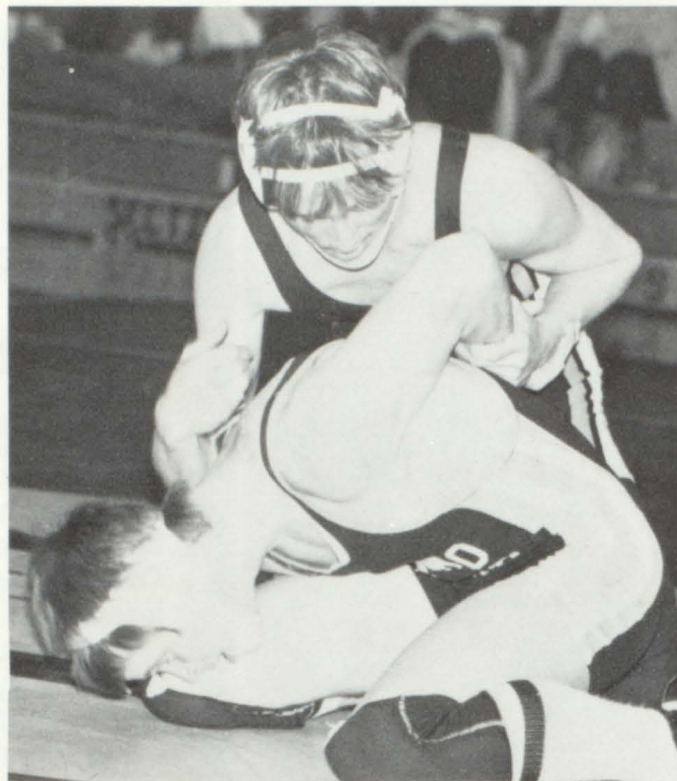

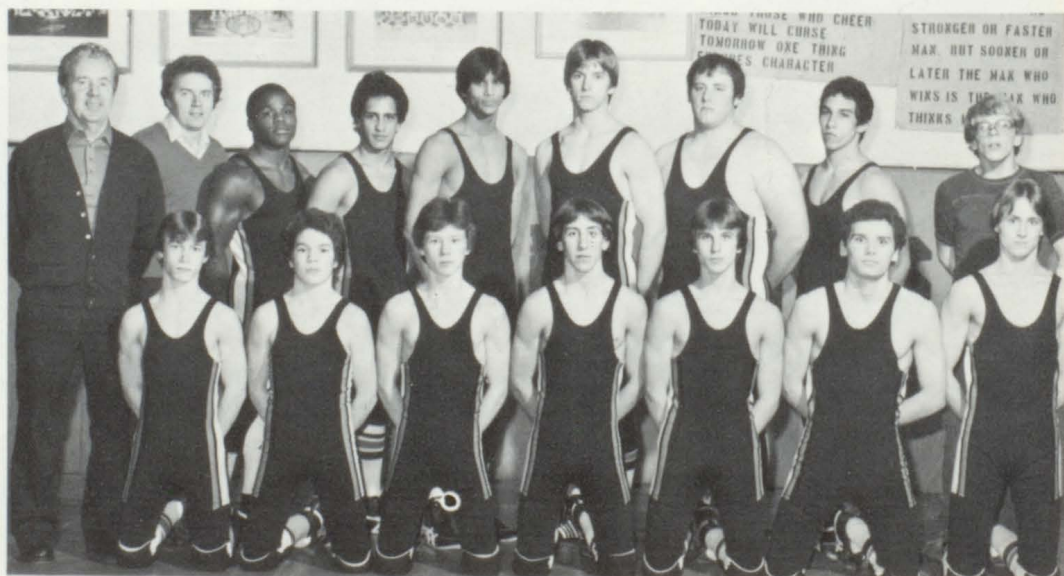

Tim Newbauer was 7-0-1, with three of his wins being pins. He captured a first at Burnsville, second at Fridley, and third at Ellsworth.

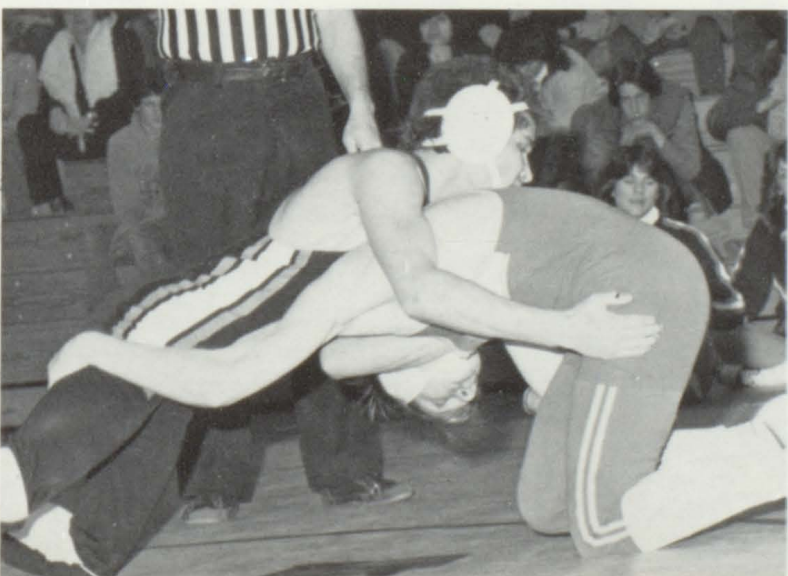

Chris Brewer, eighth grader Scott Munos, and Mark Ziertman were among those who made significant contributions to both the JV and varsity teams.

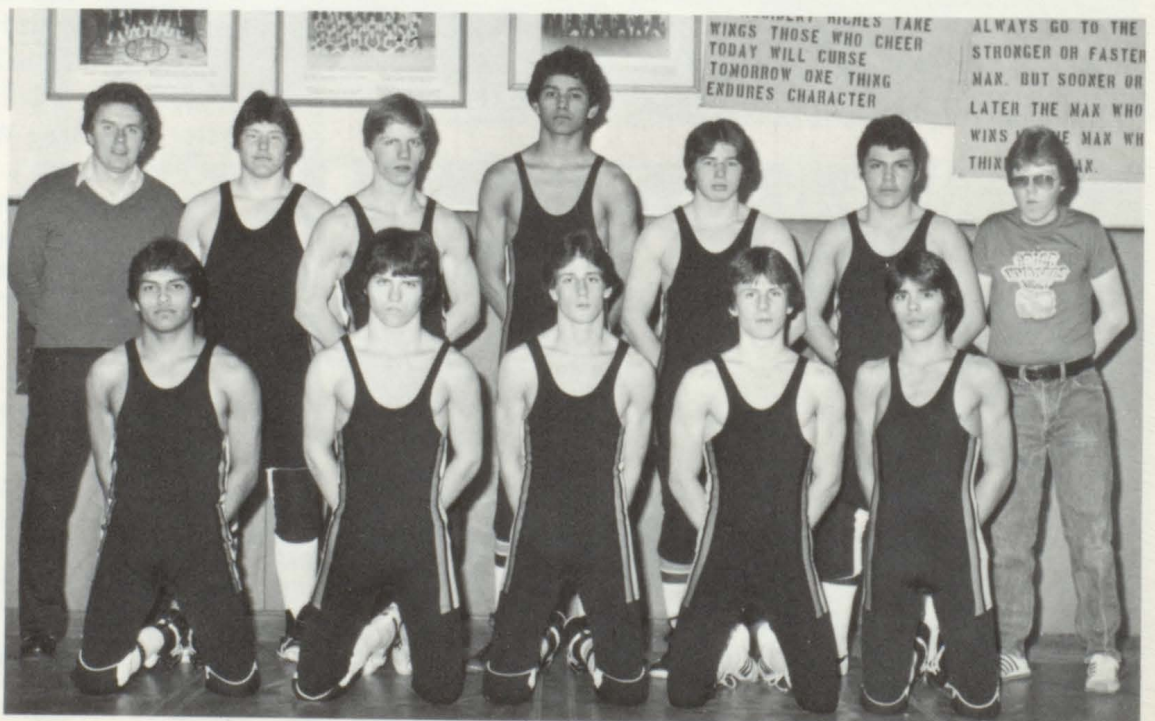
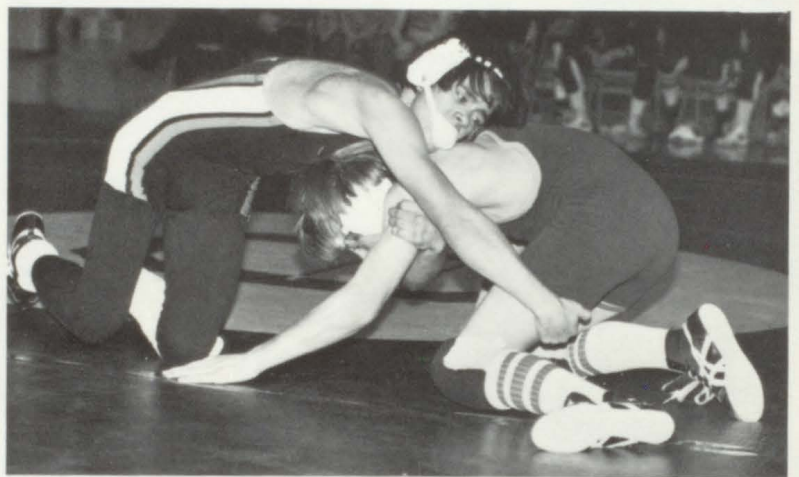
Tom Cardenas, an eleventh grader competing at 119 pounds, led the way with seven conference match wins against one loss.

## Over the summer

In June the St. Paul Public School Board combined Humboldt Senior and Junior Highs under one administration, laid off hundreds of teachers, and eliminated most field trips.

Central Park in New York City was the site of the largest-ever Nuclear arms protest. Seven-hundred thousand people attended the demonstration.

The ten-year fight for the passage of the Equal Rights Amendment failed, three states short of ratification to the U.S. Constitution.

## In the fall

The Census Bureau reported the United States' population was 232 million.

The Vietnam Veterans' Memorial was dedicated. Commented **Life** magazine, "A black granite slab in a city of alabaster white? A list of names carved in a hillside while other tributes soar heavenward?"

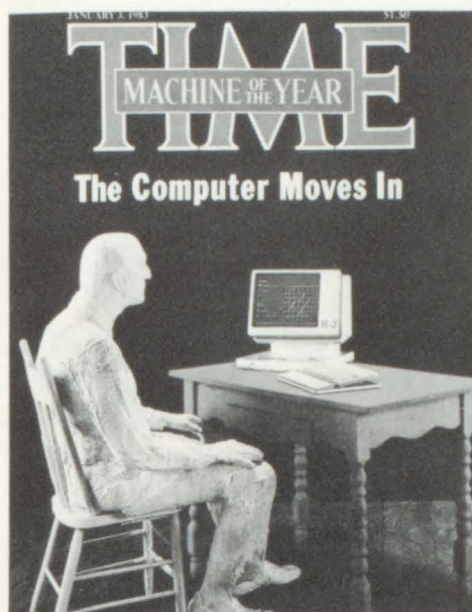
## During winter

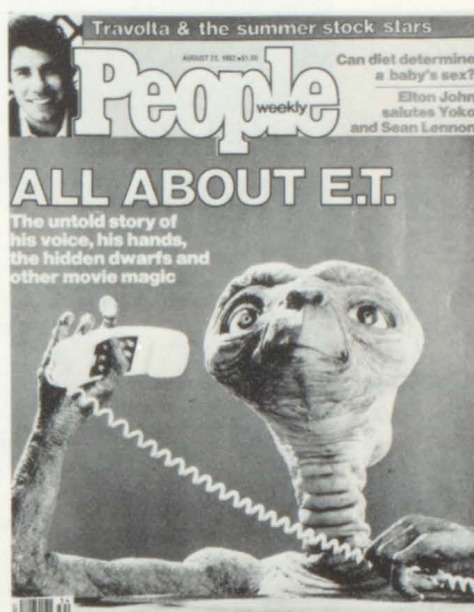

After eleven years and 251 episodes the television show **M\*A\*S\*H** went off the air in February.





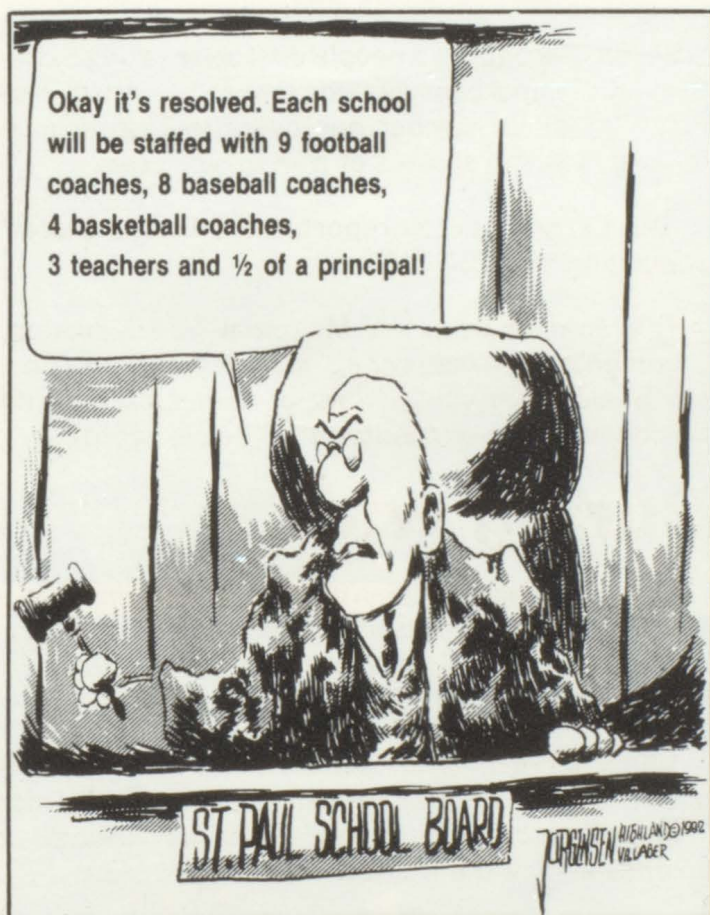
