


After Christmas we awarded Ruth Poucher the DAR award and Mary Barbata the Girls' State award. In Washington the name Joe McCarthy continued to stir strong feeling, both for and against.

We went through the winter naming Miss Print, the Prince and Princess of Hearts, and the Prince and Princess of Courtesy. The comedy, Dear Ruth, was presented to enthusiastic audiences on March 18 and 19. At the same time a mid-March snowstorm broke the record being set for a dry, mild, snowless winter.

Easter vacation in mid-April preceded an early Prom, May 7, at the St. Paul Hotel.

St. Paul had springtime election fever with a new council and mayor to be voted on in late April. Dillon and Daubney were chosen by the people in a heavy primary turnout as mayoralty candidates. The people chose Dillon.

Late spring events at school included the chorus and band concerts, final exams for most, and then graduation for the seniors.

These seniors will be a memory with their graduation, but the world, yes, and Humboldt, will go on . . . to record another year and yet another year much like this one has been.




### Theater







#### **SWIMMING**




