

Mr. Lackner acted as an advisor to the students who worked on the program for the homecoming game and he helped them plan the activities for between the halves.






#### Skill and Speed



Many thanks to the board for their valuable contributions to Humboldt athletics.






The squad was made up of approximately sixteen freshmen and sophomore boys, who practiced and improved as the season progressed.
