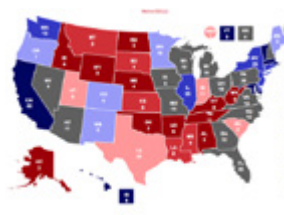

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What will school look like come the fall?

There's a lot of uncertainty about if, how, and when students will return to school in the fall

In the time of Covid, schools are one of the biggest questions about how society will function. Who watches the children of essential workers? As parents return to work, what will become of young

children? There are a variety of options for schools, but no one knows which will be most successful in stopping the pandemic and providing an education.

The option that's probably the least favored is to remain entirely virtual. This

has the benefit of continuing the practice of social distancing, making it the safest, but also requires technology and wifi, which are resources that low-income students may not have access to, especially in districts that don't provide iPads or laptops to all students,

further exacerbating achievement inequalities. "In many cases, their children will not gain educationally at home, because parents will not be able to teach them, or their households might lack access to the high-speed Internet that enables remote instruc-

tion," said Harvard professor of government and sociology Theda Skocpol. Another concern is for special education students, who don't necessarily have access to the same resources at home as they do at school. According to OWL social worker Paige Geck, many students with Individual Education Plans (IEPs) are "struggling to maintain a structure in their routine and keep up with the workload. They become

overwhelmed easily and don't know where to start."

However, continuing with remote learning wouldn't look exactly as it does now. There have been mixed reactions to the change from students, teachers, and parents. Some students are able to work through efficiently, and some struggle to focus, which can be exacerbated by stress from working from home or from

On Monday May 25, George Floyd was murdered by former Minneapolis police officer Derek Chauvin, resulting in protests against police brutality towards Black people

across the country and world.

The murder was captured on video, and showed Chauvin kneeling on Floyd's neck for nearly nine minutes, while the three other officers involved did nothing. All four officers were dismissed from the Min-

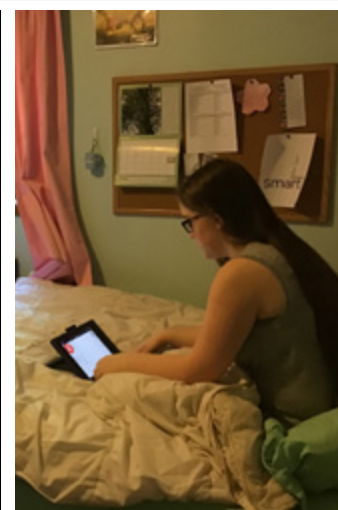
neapolis Police Department. Chauvin was charged with second degree murder, increased since his original charges of third degree murder and second degree manslaughter. The remaining three officers were charged with aiding and abet-

ting second-degree murder and aiding and abetting second-degree manslaughter. The police were called by a store owner who had believed Floyd had used counterfeit currency.

The protests swept the country the week after the

video showing Floyd's murder became public, in what quickly turned violent. There were fires and looting in the Twin Cities, leading governor Tim Walz to instate a curfew and call in the Minnesota National

Fair board members unanimously voted to cancel it, this being the first time it has been canceled since 1946 due to the polio epidemic. Many people agree and push the statement "Safety comes first". It just wasn't possible to have a state fair like the other in the past with its packed walkways and lines upon lines for food and rides. Overall they have started focusing their attention to next year's state fair and how they plan to create new experiences for fairgoers while valuing their safety.

On April 28th, 2020, Vice-President Mike Pence visited the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota without a mask, gaining a lot of criticism from the public for ignoring the Mayo Clinic's policies. After backlash from the public, Vice-President Pence admitted that he should have worn a mask.

"I didn't think it was necessary, but I should have worn a mask at the Mayo Clinic and I wore it when I visited the ven-

tilator plant in Indiana," Pence said at a Fox News virtual town hall on May 3rd.

In this new era of Covid-19, you may be thinking about whether or not to wear a face mask. There are many reports on whether masks are useful, but many scientists are still divided.

A report from a multidisciplinary group assembled by the Royal Society called Delve - Data Evaluation and Learning for Viral Epidemics - weighed up the evidence and came out in favor of the public wearing face masks, this includes homemade cloth coverings.

Since March 13th businesses have been very limited to serving people. Let's find out how Saint Paul businesses Mischief on Grand has responded to this recent outbreak of COVID-19.

Mischief is a small independently owned toy store that sells books, comics, and games. The store itself is family owned, and really focuses on the community. They host game nights, and have a variety of other fun events.

Q: How is Mischief coping with the Governor's emergency orders?

A: It's been difficult and we've had to learn to adapt to the new situation. We were closed entirely for 2 weeks and then began offering curbside pickup and local bicycle delivery services. Our customers

have been very responsive to this and even though our sales have been greatly reduced, we've been able to stay afloat and pay bills.

Q: What is Mischief doing to respond to COVID-19?

A: We've closed our store to the public and are now offering purchases only via curbside pickup and delivery. This is a big change for us because we had always emphasized the importance of experiencing our store in person. Because we've been closed, though, we've taken the opportunity to make a number of improvements and repairs to our store which would have been difficult to do while open.

Q: How has COVID-19 impacted your employees?

A: In addition to our family, we have one part time employee, a high school student, who we had to furlough in March

because the store had closed. We are planning to bring them back on June 1.

Q: What is Mischief's plan for reopening? How will you maintain social distance?

We are taking our time to make sure we can safely reopen. Although we are now permitted to reopen, we are not yet ready to do so. When we are ready, we'll start with closing off most of the store and just having a counter up front where we can serve customers and retrieve items for

them. Everyone will be required to wear masks and we'll have masks available for customers who don't have them. We'll also need to limit how many customers can come in at a time. It won't be a normal shopping experience for quite a while but our focus will be protecting our employees and our customers.

Q: Has the outbreak expanded Mischief's online base?

A: We made the decision when we first opened the store that we didn't want to

sell online and just wanted to focus on our local customers. COVID-19 hasn't really changed that, but we are using our website to sell customized Quarantine Care Packages, Easter Baskets, and birthday gifts. We're also using Facebook Live and Instagram stories to feature different products that people can buy online or by giving us a call. Our customers have been super responsive to most of these strategies.

be there, while some places like the YAI summer program where some parents might use the program to get their kids out of the house, don't have the highest professionalism.

of the population on our globe could be infected with COVID-19 or exposed to it. Of these people, around 0.6% will die.

Multiple COVID-19 vaccines are currently being developed. Some of them have moved on to medical trials, however things like these take time. There are no exact dates for how long it takes for an immune system to react to something, and side effects have no time limit when it comes to clinical trials. the pandemic. According to OWL principal Dave Gundale, there would be “much more structure and live interaction,” if distance learning continued into the 2020-21 school year.

The achievement gap isn’t the only thing affected by completely virtual school -- children’s mental health, especially young children, is being negatively affected. One mother in northern California told National Public Radio that her five year old daughter has begun to say things along the lines of “I don’t care if I die.” The mental health of all children is being affected by the crisis. “Many kids really need positive social interactions daily,” said Dave, something difficult to do over Zoom. One study found increased depression and anxiety for Chinese children who are under lockdown. More pediatricians have been favoring opening school due to the mental health risks. Dr. Dimitri Christakis is a pediatrician at the Seattle Children’s Hospital who argued that “play,” and the need to “connect with other children... is immensely important for young children in particular.”

At OWL, students have proven “resilient,” and generally able to cope with the unprecedented changes in school and the world, said Paige. “However, it has been challenging, as it was unexpected and there was no proper transition period (no time to say goodbye or prep for distance learning). It has been very hard for students to be away from their peers, teachers, and friends,” she added.

Another option is a mixture of virtual and in-person learning. This could take a number of forms, including every student being assigned certain in-person days and virtual days, so that schools have half, or less, of their student body

in the building. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has released guidance on this, adding suggestions of staggering when students arrive and leave school, and not allowing students to mingle in common areas, including the cafeteria. This might mean eating lunch in your third hour class or even in crew next year.

One of the biggest debates over how this might play out is how to equitably serve students. The superintendent of Bibb County School District in Georgia, Dr. Curtis Jones, Jr spoke with The Wall Street Journal about it, and said that one way would be to focus on students who are at a disadvantage distance-learning, including low-income students, students experiencing homelessness or food insecurity, and students with disabilities. But he also pointed out that every student should have the chance to interact face-to-face with a teacher, regardless of income. “[b]eing equal is not being equitable. But, I’m not sure some parents are going to say ‘because I am able to do this, why are you putting my child at a disadvantage by not letting my child be in front of the teacher as much as others?’” said Dr. Jones. This is also a question of safety, especially if

the pandemic continues into winter. Families that can’t afford heating may ultimately be safer at school, where there is free heating and food.

Students could also be staged in by age group, an approach both Denmark and Germany are taking, from opposite ends of the spectrum. German schools are beginning

with older students, believing that they will better be able to follow social distancing guidelines than young children. Denmark, on the other hand, is beginning with its youngest students, who are at least risk. This also frees up parents to go back to work. The Danish approach seems to be a more likely route for the economically-minded United States, if we choose to stage by age group.

Another option is the “Spike n’ Squash,” where schools return to a pre-pandemic normal, or close to it, and Covid cases spike, resulting in a return to social distancing measures. This back and forth continues until a vaccine is made or herd immunity is reached. This is something that might happen regardless in states reopening before public health experts say they are ready to do so. It’s also the most jarring version of reopening, one that wouldn’t allow for time to readjust before things change again. For reference, it’s estimated to take five or six weeks to know how a reopening impacts the amount of Covid

cases, according to Crystal Watkins at the Johns Hopkins Center for Health Security. It would be a period of “normal,” for about a month and a half, then two weeks to a month of virtual school, likely until herd immunity is reached. No one knows how long this process could take, making it an unlikely option, especially in

Democratic states like Minnesota.

Saint Paul Public Schools (SPPS) is waiting to see what the numbers look like before making a decision about next fall. They are looking at models, data, and listening to public health guidance. The current guidance in Minnesota is a “stay safe” order, that encourages staying at home, or close to it, and allows gatherings of up to ten people. It also encourages social distancing of six feet or more, and wearing a mask or other cloth face covering. We don’t know how long this will last, and, if cases spike, another stay home order could be put in place. Ultimately, there is a lot of uncertainty around what society will look like in the next few months and into the fall. Until a vaccine is produced and widely available, the main thing we can do is to limit the spread. Dave however, has hope for the future: “OWL educators are Teachers, Researchers, Scholars, and Leaders. When we are back to ‘normal’ we will have learned a lot that I hope can advance our program even more!”

Dr. Simon Clarke, associate professor in cellular microbiology at the University of Reading, states the report, “falls short of delivering new evidence and too casually dismisses precautionary principle when addressing the possibility that masks and coverings could have negative effects on people’s behaviors. Until more evidence is delivered in either direction, that’s all advice can be based on – opinions.”

Some wonder, what are the pros? And what are the cons? The pros are, masks help prevent you from spreading the disease if you have the virus, brings meaningful reduction if

tially, authorities in the West encouraged the public not to use masks, probably driven by the predicted shortage of masks for medical staff. This is changing now that we include the perspective that while the mask is not even close to 100% effective, in emergency situations even a small reduction of risk is better than no reduction.”

Although many stores are suggesting the use of face masks a few are requiring shoppers to wear masks. With this rule in place, we have seen pushback and some have led to extreme confrontation between workers and customers. A Family Dollar store security

endanger a fake sense of security, and accumulated virus on mask surface may increase exposure when improperly handled or insufficiently cleaned.

Those are a few of the pros and cons, however, the Centers for Disease and Control Prevention (CDC) recommends everyone wears a cloth face mask when going out in public. Everyone should maintain social distancing and other preventive measures even when wearing a mask. Obviously, you have a choice in most cases, although there are many stores that require the use of face masks.

First off, let’s talk about

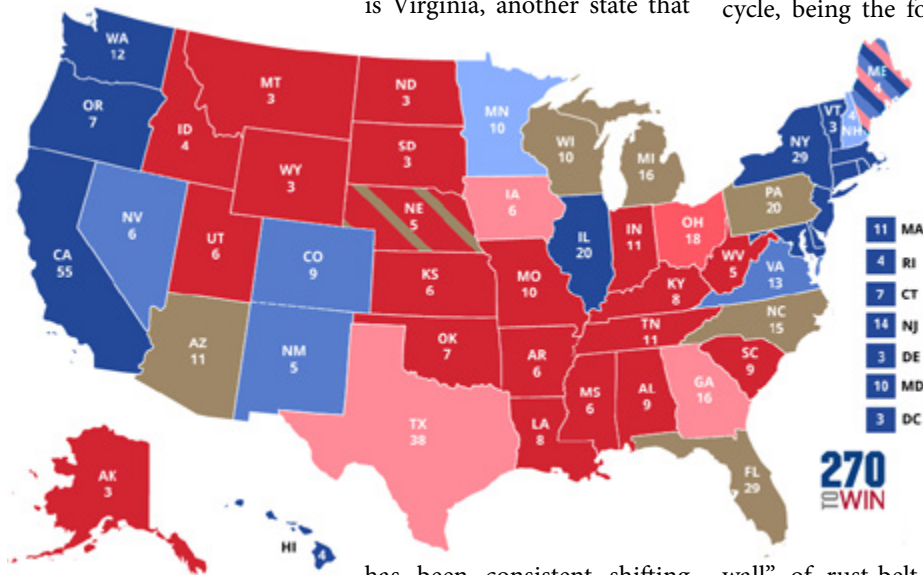
some older swing states, beginning with Colorado. Surprisingly enough, Colorado has gone three times for democrats and three times for republicans in the last six pres-

Is MN reopening too early?

On May 18th, Governor Tim Walz ended Minnesota’s stay-at-home order; now allowing groups of ten people to gather, as well as opening malls and retail stores. I think Walz ending the order this early was premature, as we are still seeing an influx of cases across the state and this will only allow for more spread of the virus.

Minnesota’s Stay-at-home order, decided by Governor Walz, began on March 27th 2020. This action asked Minnesotans to stay at home and self-isolate unless essentials, such as groceries are needed; or you have a job that requires your physical presence. Many workplaces have shut down offices, asking employees to work from home. Restaurants and cafes have turned to delivery and curbside pickup options. Schools have been closed for the remainder of the school year and moved to online learning. Social distancing is highly encouraged as well as wearing masks whenever you are in public.

The order was first set to end on May 4th, but was extended an additional two weeks. As we enter May, we are set to

see certain businesses opening back up as some aspects of the lockdown are lifted. I work in a market full of different businesses on West 7th, and my boss already is planning to reopen this month. Personally, I think reopening businesses and restaurants as early as May 18th would be completely irresponsible.

Minnesota’s cases are still growing rapidly, and as a state our growth rates are some of the highest in the country (during the week of April 27th-May 4th, according to John Hopkins University.) On top of this, we haven’t reached our projected ‘peak’ yet. I believe it would be unsafe to reopen the state as drastically as Walz is expecting to. Releasing hoards of stir-crazy to mix and mingle in public places with the false belief that there is way less risk could be very dangerous and rather than flatten the curve of cases, we could see another surge; and in turn another longer, stricter lockdown and more economic suffering.

I also believe Governor Walz is going against better judgement due to the backlash he is receiving for wanting to keep the state closed for longer. There have been multiple protests outside of his house

with rocket-jumps. The final class is the Pyro. Pyro is an odd character and is good for players who want to transition between support and offense, as pyro can create and extinguish fires, as well as reflecting certain objects away from your teammates.

The second class of characters is defense, which is where

you'll find the Demoman, Engineer, and the game's mascot, the Heavy. The Demoman is a good class for people who want a more defensive-minded Soldier style of gameplay, wrapped in all the charm that a drunk scottish cyclops can give. Engineer is the most laid-back Texan tech guy I know, and for good reason, as 'Engie' gameplay involves building support equipment like a powerful sentry, lifesaving dispenser, and terrific teleporter system, which makes gameplay slower than most, if not all other classes' gameplay. Then we have the Heavy, the ripped russian beast with the highest health in the game and his minigun which can tear anyone and anything to shreds. If tank classes are what you like, then Heavy is for you.

Finally, we can move onto the support classes, which have the most self explanatory names of the classes. These classes include Spy, Sniper, and Medic. The Spy is a class that specializes in infiltrating enemy lines through deception, then murdering your teammates and/or all of the Engie's buildings, all despite his unfortunate disability of being French. Medic is pretty self explanatory, he heals the team, but he can also provide some pretty serious buffs like Ubercharge, which makes himself, and whoever he's healing, invincible for a short time. The last of the classes, the Sniper, is even more self

explanatory, you have a sniper-rifle, and you shoot people from a long way off, it's pretty standard stuff.

With the classes out of the way, how do all the classes interact together when playing TF2? Well, as with all multiplayer games, it's a mixed bag because of how good your teammates are or aren't, but overall this is a higher quality mixed bag than most. For example, one game that I played had almost my entire team playing as heavies, which almost worked if the enemy team hadn't started using engineers. While we lost that game, it was one of the best experiences I've had in a multiplayer game, which really speaks to how satisfying playing the game is.

To wrap all this up, TF2 is a good game for people who like casual or competitive FPS gameplay, which comes from the class-based nature of the game, as well as the fairly relaxed community that surrounds the game. Overall, I'd give the game an 8.5/10, with my only real criticisms with the game being the slow update speed and somewhat dated graphics, though these are mitigated by the smaller team and age of the game. This is where I'd typically tell you to buy the game, but it's been free-to-play since 2009, so what I will tell you to do is boot up Steam, download TF2, and give it a whirl.

Pro tag is fun and intense

The classic playground game is revamped for a fun and internationally competitive viewing experience

Are you looking for something to watch during quarantine? Something thrilling, competitive and intense. Look no further than World Chase Tag, a professional version of the game you know and love. This sport takes tag and gives it a twist. It's a 1v1 on a small arena with lots of obstacles. There aren't any sports to watch right now and this is a great one.

World chase tag is a professional sport played by teams all over the world. There are various ways to play, but by far the most popular is called chase tag. This is played by two teams and each team has a maximum of five athletes. Each match consists of 16 rounds where they take turns having a 1v1 game of tag. However, the stage is set up like a jungle gym with there being many obstacles in the way such as bars and platforms that the players must maneuver. There is one chaser and one is the chased.

The chased gets 20 seconds to try to outrun or juke the chaser in order to win. If the chase lasts 20 seconds without being tagged their team gets a point. The winner of the round

stays and becomes the chased in the next round. Whichever team at the end of 16 rounds has the most points wins. The chaser must tag with their hands and not any other part of their body. If the chased steps out of the arena they forfeit the point.

This sport was formed in 2011 when two brothers, Christian and Damien Devaux, played a game of tag in their back garden. They loved the idea of tag but in a small arena with obstacles. They went to work on creating courses with obstacles to balance the chase between the Evader & Tagger. The playing arena is called the Quad.

The brothers held extensive testing sessions to see how even the course was between the chased and chaser. They were able to create what they called the "EQ" calculation which, by adding or removing certain elements of any Quad design, could tweak the level of difficulty. This has helped them to create multiple Quad designs at a variety of sizes. In 2014 they submitted a patent for the sport, then arranged its first event that summer.

There are 20 teams that

compete with each other around the world. They had their first world championship in 2016 in the United Kingdom. They had 10 teams compete in this. World chase tag has hosted events and meetups all around the world and the events have over 350 million views online. They have been shown on many TV networks such as ESPN, NBC and FOX sports. Some of the athletes that play consist of some of the biggest names in parkour and American Ninja Warrior. They have said the people that excel

at the sport have very good agility, speed, and have the ability to navigate obstacles. The players train year round in their own versions of the quad, either in their teams or their own gym.

If you are interested in watching this sport all of their world championships and highlights are on their YouTube. There are tons of tournaments to watch and they are all very exciting. I find it's a very enjoyable sport to watch because the rounds are very short but can be very intense.

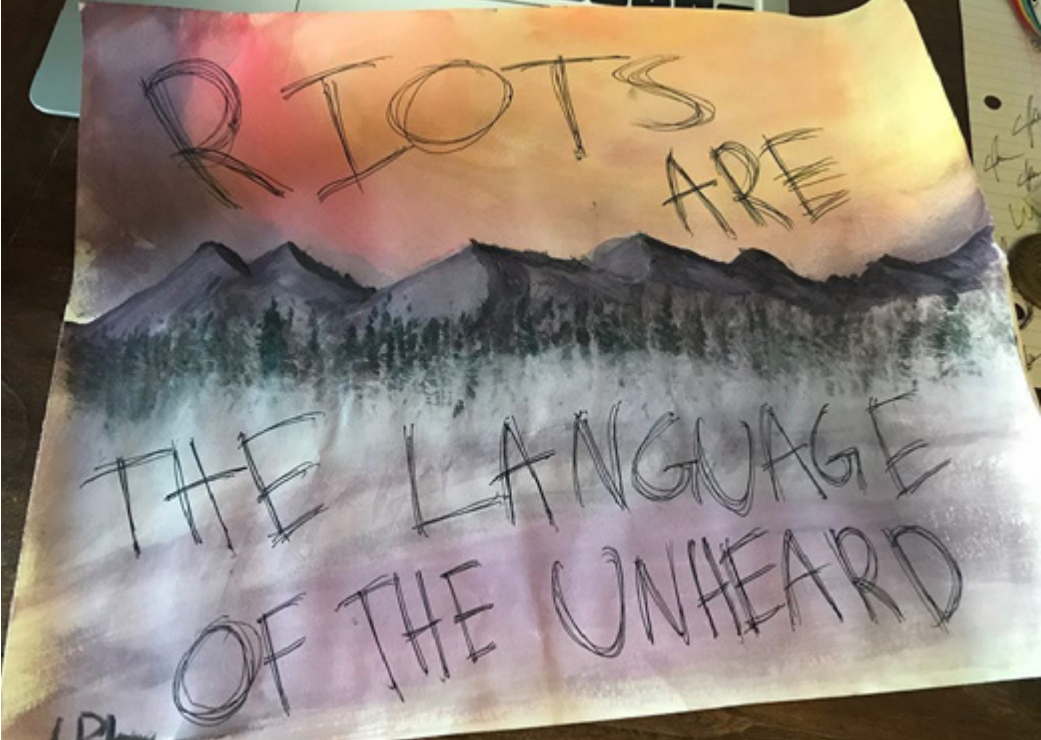
