
1886

Construction is completed on Public School 7 at 272 West 10th Street. Designed by architect David L. Stagg, the vibrant, eye-catching structure would someday become VCS's first school building.

After 20 years leading VCS, Sheila Sadler retires and Jeff Wallis is appointed VCS's second Head of School. Formerly the Head of Middle School at Calhoun, Jeff serves as Head of School at VCS for the next seven years.



Eve K. Kleger joins VCS as the new Head of School, beginning a 20+ year tenure that would reveal her as a compassionate and inspirational leader, respected and beloved by generations of VCS students, families, and staff.

The first major expansion of VCS's campus is undertaken. Designed by Leo Blackman, this additional five-story building, designed to blend seamlessly with the original 1886 structure, contained additional classrooms and a proper Gym and Auditorium.

For the first time, 8th Grade students at VCS are offered the opportunity to travel internationally with the school when Mandarin Teacher Helen Huang and Upper School Director Jessica Romero lead the first VCS Beyond the Classroom trip to China!

VCS establishes a partnership with OceansWide Science Camp in Acadia National Park, and the first group of Upper School students travel to Maine for two-weeks of hands-on marine research and exploration over Summer Break.






Beloved, long-time Head of School Eve K. Kleger passes away. Interim Head of School Denise and other long-standing school leaders are instrumental in ensuring VCS remains a joyful environment despite the community's grief, and the nationwide search for VCS's next Head of School begins.

After a nationwide search that attracted over 200 applicants, Jen Mitchell is unanimously elected by the Board of Trustees to serve as VCS's fifth Head of School. In her introductory letter to the community, Jen writes that it was VCS's K-8 model and Mission and Diversity Statements that first drew her to the school.





Designed by Marvel Architects, VCS's new building officially opens to students, doubling the school's square footage. Named in honor of the former Head of School, the Eve K. Kleger Wing contains VCS's second Gymnasium, Woodshop, rooftop Sky Yard, and numerous specialized classrooms—and places the sunlit Library at the heart of the school.
