Welcome and approval of minutes:

Edie Barfield called the meeting to order and welcomed everyone. It was noted that there was no meeting in December and this is the first meeting for the 2014 calendar year. Minutes from the November 12, 2013 were read and approved.

Child and Family Support Team (CFST reporting):

Lindsey Reaves reported CFST positions are filled and staffing for the program is at 100%. Vonda Grady and Amanda Kennedy filled 2 vacant school nurse positions and Tierra Newton filled a social worker position for CFST. CFST staff from DCS attended its regional meeting last Friday and the topic for discussion was "School as a Haven for Struggling Students". CFST data collection continues for end of year reporting.

School Health Collaborative Memorandum of Agreement:

Dr. Ben Thigpen presented information on the partnership agreement that Duplin County Schools has entered into with the NC Dept. of Public Instruction (NCDPI), the NC Division of Public Health (NCDPH) and the Adolescent Pregnancy Prevention Campaign of NC (APPCNC). The agreement will include review and updating of current LEA policy related to sexual health education for alignment with (ESHE) Exemplary Sexual Health Education best practices and state and national education standards. The collaboration will also provide an opportunity for teachers and staff to receive professional development. Duplin County Schools will be contacted regarding a site visit with representative from the state team between February and April. Additionally, monthly conference calls including representatives from the School Health Collaborative Organizations will be held to hear updates, share progress, etc.

Gang Prevention Grant:

Beth Lanier reported that Mr. Scott Kennedy will be providing gang prevention education sessions this year to all 6th graders throughout the county. Each 6th grade class school countywide will receive five health lessons which will address gang prevention strategies for young people.

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
