



Dual Credit (pg. 6 in CEPG)

- Dual Credit Requirements:
 - Complete college admission application and other required documents (will be provided at start of semester that class is being taken)
 - GPA requirement
 - 11/12th grade 2.5 GPA
 - 10th grade 3.0 GPA
 - Placement test score
 - ACT or Accuplacer
 - o Tuition
 - Pay tuition by due date
- Earn HS credit even if you choose to not pay for the college dual credit

Advanced Placement (pg. 6 in CEPG)

- Advanced Placement courses provide students a rigorous college-level curriculum as defined by the College Entrance Examination Board.
- Students in AP courses will sit for the exam for their course in May.
 - All exams are given the same <u>date/time</u> all across the country Park Hill does not determine those dates.
- Students will register for their AP examinations during their AP course.
- Earn weighted high school credit as long as pass the class.
- Exam scores range between 1-5. Typically a 3 or higher will earn a student college credit depending on the college the choose to attend.

- Grade Point Average 2.5 over 4 years
- 95% attendance average over 4 years
- 50 hours tutoring/mentoring over 4 years
- Score Proficient or Advanced on the Algebra I EOC exam
- Good Citizenship outlined in the Park Hill School District Policy JG in Student/Parent handbook
- Two Years of Consecutive Attendance at a Missouri A+ High School ending with graduation






