THE OCEAN SPRINGS BAND PROGRAM

The Ocean Springs High School Band Program is recognized as one of the finest high school band programs in Mississippi. The program is made up of the Wind Symphony, Symphonic Winds, Concert Band, Blue-Grey Pride Marching Band, Pep Band, Jazz Band, as well as a variety of student chamber ensembles. Ocean Springs High School operates on a 4x4 block schedule. As a result, students enrolled in the band program receive approximately 90 minutes of daily band instruction.

The Ocean Springs Blue-Grey Pride Marching Band is composed of all student members of the three concert ensembles with additional membership from the Varsity Dance Team and Color Guard. Annual participation in this group typically ranges from 250-300 students, making it one of the largest high school marching bands in the state of Mississippi. The Blue Grey Pride provides rousing entertainment at all home and away football games and serves as our marching ambassadors for all City of Ocean Springs parade events. The Ocean Springs Blue-Grey Pride Marching Band consistently scores superior ratings in every category of marching band performance. While this has been the standard for quite some time, significant improvement in marching band performance quality has taken place in recent years. This was especially evident during the 2019 fall semester as the marching band attained two Grand Championship titles as well as additional class and over-all caption awards. In the spring of 2020, Ocean Springs High School Band Program received the Program of Excellence award from the American School Band Directors Association. This year the Blue-Grey Pride earned straight Superiors at State Marching Festival as well as took another Grand Championship title at the 2023 South Alabama Marching Band Championships.

The strength of the Blue-Grey Pride Marching Band has a direct relation to the quality of the concert bands at Ocean Springs High School, for they are the cornerstone of the program. Students audition for placement into one of three concert ensembles including the Wind Symphony, Symphonic Winds, Concert Band 1, and Concert Band 2. The Wind Symphony is the premier performing organization of the Ocean Springs Band Program and has a rich history of being identified as one of the truly outstanding high school concert bands in the state. The Wind Symphony consistently receives superior ratings in concert and sight-reading performance and has been honored, through invitation, to perform at many significant events. Past performance appearances include the All South Honor Band Conference at The University of Southern Mississippi, the 44th Annual Southeastern United States Honor Band Clinic at Troy University, the 80th Annual Mississippi Bandmasters Association State Convention, the 6th Annual William Carey University Honor Band Clinic, 2021 CBDNA/NBA Southern Division Conference, the 2020 American Bandmasters Convention in Biloxi, MS, the 2022 Tri- State Honor Band Festival, held on the campus of the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga, and the 2023 Western International Band Clinic held in Seattle Washington.

Individual musical development and achievement are critical to the success of the Ocean Springs Band Program. Numerous students are selected every year for various clinics and honor bands throughout the region. The Ocean Springs High School Band continues to have the highest number of students selected for membership in both the Mississippi All-State Concert Band and the Mississippi Lions State Band.

While great attention is dedicated to developing musical excellence, additional efforts are provided to foster a true sense of band family. Through embodying respect, caring, compassion, understanding, acceptance, teamwork, and leadership; a higher level of musical artistry may be achieved by all members of the Ocean Springs band program.

CONDUCTOR



Kevin Shira is currently in his seventh year on staff at Ocean Springs High School, serving in his third year as the Director of Bands. His teaching responsibilities include directing the Blue-Grey Pride marching band, conducting the Ocean Springs High School Wind Symphony, and instructing the double reeds at Ocean Springs Upper Elementary. Prior to joining Ocean Springs High School, Mr. Shira spent two years as the Assistant Director of Bands for the Pass Christian School District. His concert ensembles earned consistent superior ratings both at local and state evaluations. In the Fall of 2016, he assisted the award winning Pride of the Pass Marching Band as they won the Class 4A silver medal, placing first in music.

Shira attended Colonial Forge High School in his hometown of Stafford, Virginia. His Bachelors in Music Education was earned at The University of Southern Mississippi where he was actively involved in promoting the School of Music. At USM, Shira performed with the Symphonic Winds, Symphony Orchestra and in numerous chamber ensembles under

the direction of Dr. Mohamad Schuman, Dr. Jay Dean, and Dr. Kimberly Woolly. Shira was a four-year drum major of The Pride of Mississippi, leading them in performance at the 84th annual Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade, the 2011 Conference USA championship Game, and several other bowl game appearances. In 2019, Mr. Shira received his Masters of Music Education degree at William Carey University studying with Dr. Wes Dykes and Dr. Jeremy Morgan. In December 2019, Mr. Shira was awarded the prestigious A.E. McClain Outstanding Young Band Director Award from the Mississippi Bandmasters Association. In his short tenure as Director of Bands, the Wind Symphony has performed at the 2022 Tri-States Honor Band Weekend on the campus of the University Tennessee Chattanooga and The 2022 Western International Band Clinic in Seattle Washington. In 2024, the Wind Symphony will perform at the Mississippi State Honor Band Clinic in Starkville Mississippi and the Music For All National Concert Band Festival in Indianapolis Indiana. On January 1, 2025, the Blue Grey Pride will have the honor to march in the London New Year's Day Parade in London England

Mr. Shira is a member of the National Band Association, Phi Beta Mu International Bandmasters Fraternity, the National Association for Music Education, The Mississippi Bandmasters Association, and the Gulf Coast Band Directors Association where he currently serves as 1st Vice President. Mr. Shira resides in Pascagoula Mississippi with his husband Patrick and their dog Benji.

GUEST CONDUCTORS



Randall Coleman is currently the Director of Bands and Professor of Music at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga where he serves as the conductor of the UTC Wind Ensemble and Director of the Marching Mocs. He also teaches undergraduate conducting and wind band organization classes. Prior to his July 2021 appointment at UTC, Professor Coleman served as the Associate Director of Bands and Professor of Music at the University of Alabama. Additionally, Professor Coleman serves as Conductor and Artistic Director of the Alabama Winds, an all-adult community wind band based in Birmingham, Alabama. Prior to his appointment to the faculty at the University of Alabama in 2007, Mr. Coleman enjoyed a successful 25-year career as a high school band director and supervisor in metropolitan Atlanta, Georgia. He received his Bachelor of Science Degree in Music Education at Jacksonville State University in Jacksonville, Alabama, and the Masters of Music Education degree from Georgia State University in Atlanta, Georgia.

Professor Coleman has been published seven times as a Research Associate to the Teaching Music Through Performance in Band book series published by GIA publications. He has conducted the University of Alabama Million Dollar Band in performances at the Southeastern Conference Football Championships, and in the Sugar Bowl in New Orleans, Louisiana, the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, California, the Orange Bowl in Miami, Florida, and the Fiesta Bowl in Glendale, Arizona where the Crimson Tide won the 2009, 2011, 2012, 2015, 2017 and 2020 National Championships. Under his direction, the Alabama Winds has given invitational performances at the 2015 and 2019 Alabama Music Educators' Association Inservice Conference and at the 2016 University of Alabama Honor Band Festival, and the 2020 Samford University Honor Band Festival. Alabama Winds also was a featured performer at the 2017 Midwest Clinic International Band and Orchestra Clinic in Chicago, Illinois.

Professor Coleman is an elected member in the prestigious American Bandmasters Association and is currently serving the National Band Association as national President. Professor Coleman also holds membership in the National Association for Music Education, the Tennessee Music Educators' Association, the Georgia Music Educators' Association, and the Tennessee Bandmasters Association. He also holds membership in Phi Beta Mu International Bandmasters' Fraternity, and honorary memberships in Phi Mu Alpha and Kappa Kappa Psi.



John C. Taylor is in his second year as Assistant Director of Bands at Ocean Springs High School. His teaching responsibilities include assisting with the Blue-Grey Pride Marching Band, conducting the Ocean Springs Symphonic Winds, leading the OSHS Jazz Band, and starting all high brass beginners at Ocean Springs Upper Elementary School. Taylor has twenty-seven years of experience ranging from sixth grade through college band. Among his previous positions, he has served as Coordinator of Instrumental Music and Director of Bands for the Biloxi Public School District, Assistant Director of Bands at Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College, and as the Director of Bands at Pascagoula High School. After earning his Associate of Arts degree in music from Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College in 1993, Taylor went on to earn both his bachelor's and master's degrees in music education from The University of Southern Mississippi. (1996, 2002) While there he was

fortunate to study conducting under Dr. Steven Moser, Dr. Gary Adam and Dr. Thomas V.

Fraschillo. In 1993 the band department at USM awarded him Bandsman of the Year, and in 1995 he was named Most Outstanding Musician of the Pride of Mississippi Marching Band.

In 2022, Taylor was awarded a Citation of Excellence from the National Band Association in recognition of his service to bands and band students while the Director of Bands at Pascagoula. During his tenure there he served at the assistant concert director for the Mississippi Lions All State Band (2012) and was twice named High School Band Director of the Year by the Gulf Coast Band Directors Association (2017, 2023).

Taylor holds memberships in the Mississippi Bandmasters Association, the National Band Association, Phi Beta Mu International Bandmasters Fraternity, and the American School Band Directors Association. Taylor has lived in Ocean Springs with his wife Stacey since 1998 and has two children, Wesley and Jacey. Since 2000 he has played lead trumpet with the Mississippi Gulf Coast rock band Dr. Rock and the Interns, and he was a member of the Gulf Coast Symphony Orchestra from 2002 until 2014. While teaching Taylor has been active as an arranger for high school and community college bands across the southeast.



Elva Kaye Lance is Director of Bands at Mississippi State University. Her current responsibilities include conducting the Wind Ensemble, providing leadership for the Famous Maroon Band, and administering all aspects of the band program. Ms. Lance also teaches Advanced Conducting and Secondary Methods in the Department of Music. A veteran music educator of more than forty years, she previously taught instrumental music in the public schools of Mississippi.

Now in her 32nd year at Mississippi State, Ms. Lance has guided the band program through the completion of a multimillion-dollar rehearsal facility and construction of a new synthetic turf practice field. Under her leadership, the band program has seen the expansion of the band staff and a student enrollment that now includes four concert bands, jazz band, two basketball pep bands, and a marching band with an enrollment of approximately 400 students.

As a conductor, she has led the Wind Ensemble in performances for international concert audiences during a 2008 tour of the British Isles, a 2011 tour in Austria and Germany, and an Italian tour in 2014 which included a performance at the International Music Meeting in Padova, Italy. In addition to an annual regional performance tour in the fall semester, in May of 2019 the Wind Ensemble performed in Germany, Austria, and the Czech Republic, and in early 2020 for the American Bandmasters Association Convention.

Ms. Lance maintains an active schedule as a clinician and adjudicator for both concert and marching band events throughout the country. Additionally, she has been a contributor to the Teaching Music Through Performance in Band series.

In 2011, she received the "State Pride" award from the College of Education for excellence in teaching, research, and service and the Edythe M. McArthur Outstanding Woman Band Director Award for the state of Mississippi. She was named Outstanding Bandmaster for Mississippi in 2015, and in 2017 was named Outstanding Contributor to Bands in Mississippi by the Delta Chapter of Phi Beta Mu. She was elected to membership in the prestigious American Bandmasters Association in 2018.

Ms. Lance has served as the state chair for the College Band Directors National Association and is presently the state chair for the National Band Association. She is Past President of the International Bandmasters Fraternity Phi Beta Mu. Additional professional memberships include the Mississippi Bandmasters Association, Kappa Kappa Psi, Sigma Alpha Iota, and the National Association for Music Education.
