





District Points of Pride

★ Committed to the Whole Child

- There are over 1,100 caring adults serving students in the Ritenour School District. From teachers to principals to counselors to custodians, to staff working for agency partners, Ritenour has added significant resources to reach and teach Every Student, Every Day.
- The Ritenour Co-Care Food Pantry serves hundreds of families each week from its central location in the Husky Support Center.
- Ritenour received federal funding to address the challenges of returning to the classroom after the Covid-19 pandemic. Funds have been allocated to:
 - Academic supports to address learning loss
 - Social-Emotional Learning staff to support Every Student
 - HVAC upgrades
 - Window Replacement

Outstanding Programs and Facilities

- Ritenour High School (RHS) students are focused on the three E's – to enroll in college, to become employed in a career field, or to enlist in the military.
- RHS continues to partner with St. Louis Community
 College to provide opportunities for students to earn
 college credit before they graduate. We currently have
 students graduating with a high school degree and an
 associate's degree at the same time. A total of \$540,000
 in tuition dollars was saved this year by RHS students.
- RHS has a successful work-based learning program.
- · Ritenour launched an Army JROTC Program at RHS
- The RHS Huskies Marching Band received first place in the 2023 Ameren Thanks-for-Giving Parade in downtown St. Louis.
- Ritenour has five recent high school graduates in the Teach and Lead program at the Saint Louis University School of Education working toward their degrees, to return to Ritenour classrooms upon graduation. This program deepens the connection between students and their school and creates a pathway for success.
- The Ritenour International Welcome Center is one of the largest newcomer centers in the region, serving students who are new to the country and have little or no English proficiency.
- Ritenour's Husky Support Center at 9303 Midland Blvd. is the home of the district's award-winning transportation department, technology department, Ritenour Co-Care Food Pantry, and Mathnasium for Ritenour students.

★ Outstanding Programs and Facilities (Continued)

- Ritenour is a 1:1 district for students in grades K-12, meaning every student has access to a learning device in the district. With money from the federal E-Rate program, the district is constantly improving its technology infrastructure.
- Ritenour High School was named a Special Olympics
 Unified Champion School, one of just 12 in Missouri.

 This designation celebrates the district's commitment to inclusivity and creating a welcoming environment for all students.

★ Outstanding and Award-Winning Students

- Ritenour High School (RHS) senior Cailan Wooten, was named the first-ever Ritenour student representative on the Overland City Council. Cailan also became one of just four U.S. students to receive the prestigious Lester B. Pearson International Student Scholarshiop to the University of Toronto.
- The RHS cheerleading squad made it to the state competition after finishing second in the MCCA St. Louis Regional Competition last fall. The squad included Brooklynn Garner, Harmoni Clay, Dalijah Mitchell, Jaliyah Butler, Amya Johnson, Iyana Hunt, Kennedy Beverly, Patrick Pitts, Aniyah Turner, Dejah Nunn, Terriah Sullivan, Kristine Nator-Mundin, Auriela McGinnist, Sh'Mauria Adams, alternates Skye Hernandez and Raylynn Martin, and team manager Lillian Evans.
- RHS freshman Katrina Kesselring was selected as a soprano for the St. Louis Suburban All-District Treble Honors Choir. She is a member of the RHS A Capella Choir and Symphonia Orchestra.
- RHS freshman Samuel Noh's exceptional talent on the cello earned him a spot with the All-Suburban Orchestra Ensemble.
- RHS senior student journalists Kya Merriman and Skylar Powers each had a story published in the Nov. 16 edition of Old Newsboys, an annual printed newspaper that highlights local children's charities in the St. Louis metro area.
- The artistic talents of Iveland and Marvin elementary students were recognized in the St. Louis Symphony's Picture the Music Competition. Six remarkable pieces of artwork made it to the top 100 out of over 550 submissions including pieces by Kai Boyd (second grade, Iveland), Aubrey Carpenter (fifth grade, Iveland), Brianna Bentum (fifth grade, Marvin), Penelope Vaughn (fourth grade, Marvin), Arianna Viney (fifth grade, Marvin), and Yadier Bravo Gonzales (fourth grade, Marvin). - Six outstanding RHS seniors are celebrating early decision acceptances to top-tier universities, earning impressive scholarships. Allison Madrid, An Nguyen, Margaret Susovica, and Exauce Kadima secured a spot at Washington University in St. Louis, Cody Sears received a scholarship at Lafayette University in Easton, Pa., and Johcer Godinez secured a spot at Lehigh University in Bethlehem, Pa.
- Three RHS students were recognized for outstanding artwork at St. Louis Community College-Florissant Valley.
 Malina Rush took home a first-place award for her ceramic sculpture; Chloe Arndt received an honorable mention for her raku sculpture; Gezel Urbina Torres also received an honorable mention for her pencil drawing.
- RHS Student Leadership was named a 2023-2024 Gold All-State Honors Council from the Missouri Association of Student Councils.
- Derrick Smith and Tyson Robinson, 2024 RHS graduates, finished their track careers as Huskies by bringing home medals from the Class 5 Missouri State Class Track Meet. Smith, who signed with Graceland University for football, tied the Husky record in the 100-meter dash with a time of 10.65 seconds and a fifth-place medal. Robinson, who will continue his track career at Maryville University, finished fourth in the 300-meter hurdles with a personal best of 38.59 seconds.
- Rising seniors Ashley Plancarte and Karen Toledo Herrera presented a dynamic session called "Serving and Supporting Heritage Language Students in School" at the regional Cambio de Colores conference in Kansas City, Mo.
- Cadet Major Alba Valenzuela-Castillo received a ROTC college scholarship valued at \$81,000 toward her endeavors at the University of Missouri-St. Louis.
- RHS junior Jocelyn Garrido received a QUEST scholarship to go to Spain during the summer as part of the AFS cultural and language immersion program.
- RHS student Riley Phil Panaligan earned a Gold medal for his flute solo at the State Solo and Ensemble Festival at the University of Missouri-Columbia.

Proposition S Projects

 Proposition S, a \$19.5 million zero tax rate change bond issue, was overwhelmingly passed by Ritenour voters on June 2, 2020. The bond issue funds needed facility improvements at all K-12 Ritenour schools.

★ Proposition S Projects (Continued)

- Since the summer of 2020, many projects have been completed, including a new fitness center at RHS, new cafeteria at RHS, new entryways at schools for improved safety and security, new and resurfaced parking lots, energy-efficient lighting upgrades, much-needed brick tuckpointing, replacement of playground pads and HVAC replacement and updates and more!

★ Electric Bus Grant

In January 2024, Ritenour received a \$9.5 million grant from the EPA to purchase 24 electric buses. The grant also includes the infrastructure needed at the bus depot to charge and maintain the vehicles.

- Ritenour is one of two districts in the state to receive the grant.
- Approximately 3,750 Ritenour students ride school buses daily. The new electric buses will have air conditioning and be much quieter than Ritenour's current fleet. Each electric bus can cover approximately 130 miles on a single charge.
- · Four diesel buses will be retained for longer trips
- We anticipate the new buses will be ready by the fall of 2025.


★ Other Important Grants

- In addition to the \$9.5 million EPA grant for electric buses, Ritenour has also received additional grants totaling \$1.17 million this school year, including:
 - \$400,000 for Safety and Security Upgrades
 - \$380,000 for Competency-Based Education
 - \$300,000 for socio-emotional support
 - \$87,000 for literacy funding


