THE SCHOOL

The Birch Wathen Lenox School (BWL) is a traditional, coeducational independent school which offers a rigorous college preparatory curriculum within an encouraging, responsive, and collaborative environment. The school was created in 1991 as a result of the consolidation of The Birch Wathen School, founded in 1921, and The Lenox School, founded in 1916. In 2017, BWL proudly celebrated its centennial.

ABOUT OUR PROGRAM

- BWL cultivates the strengths of each student through close connections with faculty members and advisors. Within this strengths-based education, students learn the skills essential to becoming resourceful and independent citizens.
- Our students take at least six major courses every year. Required classes for each academic discipline are fulfilled in sequence through junior year, when students are allowed to choose between options including Honors, AP courses and elective courses such as Rhetoric and Media Analysis. Independent studies are also available with faculty mentorship.
- During the fourth academic quarter, non-AP courses do not meet, and seniors taking fewer than three AP courses are required to complete a Senior Project that takes them off-campus for an internship, employment, research, or service learning opportunity. With the help of a faculty advisor, students are expected to commit 20 hours per week to their project, which gives them access to a variety of internships in areas of their interest during the spring before graduation.
- Beginning March 2020, BWL conducted remote learning with a modified schedule due to COVID-19. Some extracurricular activities continued to convene online, but the BWL Athletics program was canceled. After a brief hybrid schedule in early 2021, BWL fully resumed in-person learning in May 2021, and the BWL Athletics program restarted in September 2021.
