Early Registration Information & Dates

District 155 is offering early registration to current students for summer school elective courses. Students must reside in District 155 and meet other requirements to be eligible for enrollment in summer school.

Early registration begins on January 23 for selected courses. Registration for other summer school courses, remedial and special education courses will begin in spring 2024. Each summer school course listed here will meet at Crystal Lake South High School located at 1200 McHenry Avenue, Crystal Lake, IL 60014. The main office number is (815) 455-3860. 





- For early elective registration, all fees must be paid by **February 23, 2024**, to secure a student's spot in a class.
- The completed registration form should be turned in to your school's student services department. Once the form is processed, the fee will be added to skyward. An email will then be sent indicating that the fee can now be paid on-line in skyward. If you need to pay in another way, please contact your school's student services department.
- · Students will not be enrolled until payment is received.
- A waiver of fees for summer school coursework may be available for students who qualify. Please contact your child's counselor for fee waiver paperwork.

Course Descriptions

Consumer Education (Online Course)

This 1/4-credit course is presented in a non-traditional manner with all of coursework done in an online learning environment with only three mandatory in-person meetings. The content of the course provides students an understanding of their role as consumers in the global economy. Students will learn how to make financial and consumer-related decisions, manage money, comparison shop, bank, budget, save, and invest for their future needs and wants. Real-world simulations are used in combination with project- based activities. Students are required to have access to a computer and the Internet outside of school. Students in grades 11 and 12 may enroll, but availability is limited, and priority will be awarded to 12th graders. Seniors will have first priority, followed by juniors if registered by February 23.

The dates below are mandatory in-person dates that students must attend class sessions from 7:30 a.m. - 12:20 p.m. Students who cannot meet during these times will be dropped from the class without reimbursement.

Micro Internship

Mirco Internship is a 1/4 credit online course in an asynchronous format that allows students to explore career interests and participate in an experiential learning opportunity. There will be internship preparation including career exploration, resume and cover letter writing, preparing for interviews, and exit activities. The student must have their own transportation and availability to complete 20 internship hours over a four week period.

U.S. History

This course is a survey of our nation's history from Colonial America through the Civil War (semester one) and Imperialism through the Cold War (semester two). Emphasis is placed on relating what is learned to the present. Primary goals include an appreciation of our nation's heritage, an understanding of our system of government, and a knowledge of our country's changing role in a changing world. Participants in the first semester of this course will complete the State of Illinois requirement for passing the Illinois and United States Constitution tests. This course meets the American History graduation requirement.

Visual Art & Technology

Students will use a combination of digital technology and creative art making to examine their world, identity, and possible careers. No previous experience is necessary and everyone creates at their own level. This course serves as one of two prerequisite options for students whether they are progressing through the four-year art program or are interested in a creative experience. This 1/2-credit course fulfills the computer credit requirement for graduation and is appropriate for students in any grade level.

Enrichment Course- Geometry

To enroll in this class, students must have a B or better in Algebra and commit to taking three or more years of math classes.

Attendance

Attendance is extremely important, therefore, it is critical to plan ahead when considering enrollment in summer school. Most courses meet for 5 periods per day and are approximately the same total number of minutes as regular year courses. Each class period during the summer school day corresponds to one and one-sixth days' work during the regular school year. As a result, it is imperative that students be present each period on every day. Attendance is taken each class period (5 times per day). Any student who misses more than one full day of classes (5 periods) will be dropped from the class on the 6th period of absence. All absences need to be reported to the summer school office prior to 7:30 a.m. Failure to do so will result in a phone call to home or work. Instances of tardiness are addressed similarly. Students are expected to be punctual to each class period. Teachers will record tardies for each period. The third tardy to any class will be considered an absence from class. Each tardy after the third will count as an additional class absence. Therefore, a student could be dropped from class for a combination of absences and tardies, or a total of eight tardies.

Student Conduct

Students are required to abide by the same rules during summer school as they would during the school year. This information is contained in Board Policy 7:190, Student Behavior, and the student handbook available at www.d155.org. Students will adhere to behavior expectations in Board Policy 7:190 and follow the established school rules as published in the student handbook, as well as summer school rules contained in this packet. Disruptive behaviors during summer school may result in disciplinary consequences, including but not limited to, suspension from summer school and removal from the summer school program. Specifically, the use, possession, and/or distribution of any alcohol, drugs, vaping devices, or other drug-related paraphernalia on school property during summer school may result in the student being dropped from a class, an out-of-school suspension, or expulsion from the District. Suspensions from summer school will count towards the student's total number of absences for the summer session. As stated previously, once a student accumulates 6 periods of absences, s/he will be dropped from the class for the summer session. If a student is dropped from a summer school class, the parents/guardians may submit a written appeal of that disciplinary measure to the Assistant Superintendent of Educational Services, or his/her designee. The Assistant Superintendent's decision on the student's appeal is final.

- Dress: Students are expected to dress as they do during the regular school year. The facility is air-conditioned, so layering is recommended. Any clothing deemed inappropriate by summer school personnel are not to be worn in the building.
- Electronic Devices: Calculators are allowed and music devices are allowed during breaks. Electronic games are not allowed. Cell phones are to be turned off during summer school hours except during designated break times.
- · Food: Open food and beverages are not allowed in classrooms but may be consumed during breaks in the designated area.
- · Leaving Campus: Students are not allowed to go to the parking lot or to leave campus during summer school hours. Students leaving campus or going to the parking lot without permission will receive a multi-period suspension.

Class Credit for Summer School Courses

Unless otherwise noted, a ½-credit may be earned from successful completion of each semester of summer school coursework. Students may repeat courses they have previously passed, with the higher of the two grades entered on their permanent record. However, the student will only receive credit for the course once. Regardless of the course, all students must be present for the final exams.

Transportation

Bus service to Crystal Lake South High School is provided at no charge to students from Cary-Grove High School, Crystal Lake Central High School, and Prairie Ridge High School. The bus schedule is as follows:
