Utilizing this approach, population projections were collected from the CMCOG age-cohort component model, Woods and Poole Economics, Inc., and the SC Budget and Control Board, Office of Research and Statistics. Population forecasts were available from other sources other than the Cohort - component model CMCOG utilized in developing future projections to the year 2050. The Office of Research and Statistics at the S. C. Budget and Control Board (ORSS) also calculated five-year projections from 2000 to 2030." CMCOG

The National Center for Educational Statistics (NCES) using the Census Bureau American Community Survey for 2014, estimated that District 2 houses 38% of the total population of Richland County. Based on their estimates approximately 20.2 per cent of the population of District 2 are enrolled in K – 12 schools.

Staff at CMCOG are preparing census tract level estimates for their projections, however, they do not expect any major change in the distribution of the population between the two school districts.
