The **Student Potential Youth Advisory Council (SPYAC)** is a program launched last year that aims to gather, support, and center the voices of students with disabilities in Washington education policy and advocacy work. Members will help shape coalition priorities, participate in the legislative session, and have opportunities to speak up about issues that matter to them.
