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January is School Board Appreciation Month, and we want to take this time to highlight one of our amazing school board members, Melody Killens.


A resident of Columbia County for 58 years, Melody Killens, has been a St. Helens School District Board Member for twenty-two years.


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SAVE THE DATE: SHSD Listening Session 2.1.2024
