# **RIGHTS & ELIGIBILITY OF CHILDREN & YOUTHS** **EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS**



## **DEFINITION OF HOMELESS**

The McKinney-Vento Act states that children and youths who lack "a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence" will be considered homeless.

If your family is experiencing any of these situations, please contact your school district or the district's homeless liaison:

- Sharing the housing of other persons due to loss of housing, economic hardship, and/or a similar reason
- Living in motels, hotels, trailer parks, or camping grounds due to lack of alternative adequate accommodations
- Living in emergency, transitional shelters or were abandoned in hospitals
- Have a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not designated for, or ordinarily used as, regular sleeping accommodations for human beings
- Living in cars, parks, public spaces, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, bus or train stations, and/or similar settings
- Migratory children who qualify as homeless because they are living in the circumstances described above

## **HOMELESS STUDENTS' RIGHTS**

Any student who qualifies as homeless under the McKinney-Vento Act has the following rights regarding their education:

- Right to continue at school of origin, the school they attended before becoming homeless, or the school in which they were last enrolled
- Right to immediate enrollment even if they lack normally required documents, such as immunization records or proof of residence
- Right to receive transportation to and from their school of origin, if it is in the child's or youth's best interest
- Free school breakfast and lunch
- Assistance with school fees, including field trips, physical education fees, lab fees, and other school fees
- Assistance in obtaining extra school supplies
- Assistance with connections to social service agencies in the community

*The Fox Chapel Area School District believes that homeless students should have access to free and appropriate public education. Our goal is to limit the barriers that our homeless students may face and have the educational process continue as uninterrupted as possible for students in a homeless situation.*

## **BEST INTEREST DETERMINATION**

In determining the best interest of a child or youth, the Fox Chapel Area School District shall:

- Presume that keeping the child or youth in the school of origin is in their best interest, except when doing so is contrary to the request of the parent/guardian or unaccompanied youth
- Consider student-centered factors related to the impact of mobility on achievement, education, and/or health and safety, giving priority to the request of the parent/guardian or unaccompanied youth
- If, after such consideration, the district determines that it is not in the child's or youth's best interest to attend the school of origin or the school requested by the parent/guardian or unaccompanied youth, the district shall provide the parent/guardian or unaccompanied youth with a written explanation of the reasons for its determination. The explanation shall be in a manner and form understandable to the parent/guardian or unaccompanied youth and shall include information regarding the right to appeal.
