


Superintendent's Bulletin

On January 9, Midland School played host to a special visitor: New York Deputy Secretary for Education Maria Fernandez. Ms. Fernandez visited Midland to learn about the District's Grades K-2 literacy program on the recommendation of State Senator Shelley Mayer, who is Chairperson of the New York State Senate Education Committee. Senator Mayer had visited Midland in early November to learn about the District's reading program and was so impressed by what she saw that she reached out to Ms. Fernandez to recommend she come visit, too. After her visit, Ms. Fernandez told us that she felt like very high quality reading instruction was taking place in our schools.



"Why the RCSD?" you might ask. The District's phonics-based elementary reading program has attracted the State's notice because it has been so effective, and administrators from the State are interested in learning from our process to see if parts of it could be replicated at other schools. Governor Kathy Hochul discussed childhood literacy recently in her State of the State address, so it's clearly a focus at the highest levels in New York State.

When these visitors come to tour the school, administrators have taken them around to a variety of Kindergarten, first, and second grade classrooms so they can see real live lessons from our comprehensive literacy program which focuses on instilling skills in phonemic awareness, phonics, fluency, vocabulary, and comprehension. They see a variety of types of reading instruction taking place from our K-2 units of study. These new reading and writing units have a strong focus on phonics and phonological awareness. Our visitors have seen whole group lessons, small group lessons, and students working with partners. They've also seen students reading independently with decodable books -- books that help students practice phonics skills -- we've added a lot of decodable books to our classrooms in all of our elementary schools.

After the classroom visits, we spent some time with our visitors talking about how our reading instruction has evolved and how it has resulted in dramatic improvements in our individualized reading assessments, and in our test scores. We told them about our own robust assessment system, including the Heggerty Phonological Awareness Assessment, which helps us track our students' reading progress in real time. We have also talked with them about the many benefits of our 4-year partnership with Haskins Lab at Yale University. Haskins is one of the premier research facilities in the science of reading and a leader in research involving language-based learning disabilities. They provide both our general education and special education teachers with critical professional learning.

In early April, New York State Education Department Commissioner of Education Betty Rosa and New York State Regent Fran Wills will be visiting



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
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Midland School together. We look forward to welcoming them and showing off our instructional chops! I am so pleased to say that we are being called upon by educational experts and other school districts because we are leading the way with high-quality reading instruction. YMCA Safe Driving and Walking Poster Contest

Capital Bond Construction Update

At the January 23 Board of Education meeting, the Board of Education got an update on the next steps in the capital bond construction projects. We are now in Phase III of construction, with just one more Phase (Phase IIIA) to go. As with previous construction, much of the work takes place over school breaks, particularly the summer break.

Phase III began in December 2023 and is anticipated to wrap up in time for the start of school in September 2024. It includes several important projects, all at the High School/Middle School:

- The renovation of the shared HS/MS media center (library) and the construction of the High School iLab. While
 the bulk of the work to this space will take place over the summer, we will begin transferring books onto mobile
 carts over the February break so they can be easily taken out of the media center while construction is underway
 from April onwards to be ready in September 2024
- The **High School Innovation Lab** (iLab) classroom space is directly across the hall from the existing HS/MS media center. It will serve as the temporary storage base for the media center's books, and then construction on this space will be under construction beginning in April 2024 and will be ready in September 2024
- The **Performing Arts Center** (PAC) is in almost continual use, so work on this space must wait until summertime. The work on the PAC will take place over two summers. In 2024, the space will have walls and ceiling painted, lighting replaced, and the curtains will be removed and blinds installed. Some leveling of the auditorium stairs will also take place

Phase IIIA is due to last from December 2024 to September 2025:

- At the **HS/MS**, we will be finishing the renovations to the **PAC**, including removing the old auditorium seating, regrading and epoxying the floor, and installing new seating
- At the **High School**, we will be completing the **Art, Design & Engineering Center**. As part of that work, we will be renovating the school's **art classrooms** to ensure they are code-compliant
- We will decommission the Midland School and Osborn School portable trailer classrooms and replace them
 with connected building additions. We are anticipating that these new wings will be ready for use in September
 2025

As always, when we touch any space, we will be bringing the interior up to New York State code. In addition, in spaces where we have access to ventilation systems, we will be adding A/C if it's not already present.


