## **CITY NEWS | Property Tax Vote on March 19**

On March 19, Oakwood residents will vote on a 2.41 mill property tax to provide funding for police, fire and EMS services, to maintain the city roadways and other public infrastructure, and to maintain parks and public recreation facilities. This tax issue replaces a 3.75 mill issue that expired last year and that had been in place over the past ten years. The 2.41 mill value is set so

that the tax issue will cost the same to property owners as did the expired issue. The issue will raise about \$1.1 million annually and will cost about \$84 per year for each \$100,000 in residential property valuation.

## **Property Tax Vote on March 19 - Note from City Council**

One of the primary responsibilities of City Council is to ensure that your tax dollars are spent wisely. The five of us, as your elected city officials, take this responsibility very seriously. We spend a significant amount of time overseeing how our city government spends money, and we use a 34-member citizen budget review committee to assist us in this effort. The committee includes residents representing each of our eight voting precincts. These citizens come from a variety of professional backgrounds and have a good understanding of what makes Oakwood special. As representatives of their respective precincts, they bring to our meetings their personal opinions and also the voices and opinions of their neighbors. The citizen budget review committee supports this replacement levy.

The pie chart below shows the five major sources of revenue that are needed to pay for our city services. As you can see, the property tax is a critically important component.

General City Services Revenue



## New Mailing Address for Oakwood Income Tax Returns

The Income Tax Department has contracted with Fifth Third Bank to process tax payments and image tax documents via Fifth Third's Wholesale Lockbox. This will allow tax payments to be processed efficiently and provide added security, eliminating most of our storage needs for paper records.

Fifth Third Bank will scan your documents and process your tax payment. The city will post payments to your account through data transmission and will continue to review all tax returns.



## **2024 Construction and Public Infrastructure Improvement Projects**

Each year, the city of Oakwood engages in and oversees various capital improvement projects to maintain and improve the City's infrastructure. This year, we have several significant and notable projects planned.

## 2024 Far Hills Asphalt Mill and Overlay

As work from multiple projects completed over the past two years leaves Far Hills Avenue with many patches, 2024 will include the removal and replacement of the entire asphalt roadway surface from the south to the north corporation lines in the city of Oakwood. The Ohio Department of Transportation Urban Paving Program will provide 80% of the funding for this resurfacing project. This roadway was last resurfaced in 2011.

### **Gardner Pool Liner**

Last year, the city replaced the entire concrete deck at Gardner Pool. This year, the city will install a pool liner system. The liner system will significantly extend the life of the pool tank, which is about 50 years old.

## **Concrete Street Repairs**

Repairs will be made to several concrete streets around Oakwood. The list of roadways to be included in the 2024 project will be printed in the *April/May Oakwood Scene* newsletter.




## Annual Sidewalk, Curb and Driveway Apron Repair Project

The 2024 Sidewalk, Curb and Driveway Apron Repair Project will take place in the Far Hills Business District. The purpose of the project is to maintain the concrete structures located within the City rights-of-way in a good, safe condition. City staff will inspect the areas and mark sections of concrete requiring repairs. Residents and businesses affected by the work will receive personal notification regarding their responsibilities. Please call Public Works Foreman David Shuey at (937) 298-0777 if you have any questions. For property owners who choose to do the repair work themselves, please remember to obtain a permit in advance and that all work must be inspected and completed by the date in the notification.

## Harman Boulevard Median

A center median is proposed to be constructed in the 400 block of Harman Boulevard to match the center medians in the 200 and 300 blocks of Harman Boulevard.

## Far Hills Avenue, Oakwood Avenue and Thruston Boulevard (Five Points) Intersection

At the December 4, 2023 public meeting, Oakwood City Council voted unanimously to suspend work on a project that considered the conversion of the Far Hills Avenue, Oakwood Avenue and Thruston Boulevard intersection along State Route 48, often referred to as Five Points, from a traditional traffic signal to a roundabout. In 2022, the city of Oakwood commissioned a comprehensive traffic signal study with the purpose to develop a long-range plan for major capital improvements to Oakwood's traffic signal system, which consists of 17 signalized intersections. Last May, the primary focus of the study was directed on the Five Points intersection. The traffic study concluded that a roundabout could function well at Five Points. In June and July 2023, the city showed the citizens of Oakwood and the Dayton region how a roundabout at Five Points could function and obtained extensive public input and feedback. The public reaction was mixed. While there was support for building the roundabout, there was also opposition. A roundabout at Five Points would be a significant change to how the intersection functions. City leaders concluded that there remains enough unfamiliarity with how roundabouts operate which is in large part what compelled the city to no longer advance the project at this time. For the time being, the city will continue to maintain the existing traffic signal. All of the work completed in studying the roundabout option will be very useful in the future when the city may reconsider this matter.

## **February/March City Council Meetings**

City Council will meet in regular public sessions at 7:30 p.m. on Monday, February 5 and Monday, March 4. Both meetings will take place at the city building, 30 Park Avenue. The regular sessions are preceded by an open work session scheduled to begin at 6:30 p.m. The regular sessions are televised live on the City website at www.oakwoodohio.gov, and on cable TV (Spectrum Ch. 6, TV Tuner Ch. 5.203 and AT&T U-verse Ch. 99). The meetings are also accessible via the Zoom remote meeting platform. Links to the meeting will be posted to the City website at 4 p.m. on the meeting date. Meeting videos will be rebroadcast on television for a week or so afterwards. Please check your cable guide or www.mvcc.net for broadcast times. Meeting videos can also be viewed on the City website at any time.

## **Summer Employment Opportunities**

Applications for summer employment with the city of Oakwood are now available at the OCC, the city building and on the City's website. Students 16 years of age and older are eligible for lifeguard and concession positions at Gardner Pool. ## **Residential Fire Inspections**

Home fires can happen at any time, but they generally increase during the winter months. You can make your home a safer place by requesting a Residential Fire and Safety Inspection from the Oakwood Safety Department. These inspections are conducted by request only. Home inspections provide an opportunity for residents to learn about fire safety issues and for Oakwood Safety Department inspectors to provide recommendations on measures to improve the safety of home occupants. If you would like to arrange for a fire inspection, please contact the Oakwood Safety Department at (937) 298-2122 and speak with one of our certified Fire Inspectors.



## 2024 City Budget

On December 4, 2023, Oakwood City Council approved a 2024 budget that provides the financial resources needed to continue providing comprehensive city services and maintain the city public infrastructure. The budget was prepared with review, input and endorsement of the 34-member citizen budget committee and is accessible on the City website (search: 2024 Budget). Near the beginning of the document is the City Manager's Budget Message. It provides a summary of the budget and explains how the budget is structured within the five major categories shown below:

- General City Services
- Refuse Program
- Water Service
- Sanitary Sewer Service
- Stormwater Management

- Although most of our housing stock is over 75 years old, our citizens maintain their homes and properties in very good condition and our home values prove it.
- Our city parks, public pool, community center and public natural areas are wonderful community assets.
- · Our overall community ambience is second to none.

## 2023 Oakwood Income Tax Returns Due April 15

The city of Oakwood has a mandatory filing requirement for all residents. Every individual, 18 years of age or older, who resides in Oakwood, must file an Oakwood City income tax return, whether or not there is any taxable income to report. Retired residents who have income derived exclusively from non-taxable sources (interest, dividend, social security and/or pension income, etc.) must first file a final return in order to be exempt from the filing requirement.

If you have filed for an extension of time to file your federal return, you will automatically receive an Oakwood extension. You should attach a copy of your federal extension to your return when filing so that you will not be charged a late filing penalty. Your extended Oakwood return is due the same date as your extended federal return — October 15, 2024. If you do not have a federal extension, you may still obtain an Oakwood extension. Simply complete an extension request form, located on the city's web site, and submit your request by April 15, 2024. As always, an extension of time to file your returns does not extend the time to pay your taxes. All taxes paid after April 15, 2024 will be subject to a 15% late payment penalty and interest.



The 2023 Oakwood income tax return is available on the city's website at www. oakwoodohio.gov. If you do not have internet access, forms will be made available at the City administrative offices, Wright Memorial Public Library and the Oakwood Community Center. Full-year residents with W-2 wage income only will be able to file their 2023 City of Oakwood ome tax return online. Visit the City's website for

If you need assistance with the preparation of your Oakwood return, please contact the Tax Department at (937) 298-0531. Normal business hours for the tax office are from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. Extended hours will be provided April 12 and 15, when the office will be open until 6:00 p.m.



### **Electric Scooter Use in Oakwood**

Electric scooters are a lot of fun and a great way to get around, but they can also present challenges in a walking community like Oakwood. As we see more of them in use around the city, please remember the rules for safe and legal operation on public streets and sidewalks:

- 1. When used on sidewalks, electric scooters are subject to the same rules that apply to bicycles. This means that scooter operators must always yield the right of way to pedestrians on foot. Reckless operation which includes erratic riding, hand-held cell phone use or other distracted riding, unsafe speeds, or other careless behavior is prohibited. When crossing a street, riders should cross with the appropriate light or walk/don't walk signal if one is present. Otherwise, they have the right of way as long as they are in a crosswalk and exercise due caution not to enter the street in front of oncoming traffic.
- 2. When used in the streets, the law treats electric scooters the same as a jogger or pedestrian using the street. This means users must ride on the left side of the road to ensure that they can see oncoming vehicular traffic. In addition, while scooters are permitted on most residential streets, they are prohibited on busier thoroughfares including Far Hills Avenue, Shroyer Road, Patterson Road, West Schantz Avenue, and the section of Oakwood Avenue between Far Hills and Irving Avenues.

## **Credit Card Security**

Credit card security continues to be a challenge, particularly with the very heavy use of credit cards for online purchasing. There are several steps that you, as the cardholder, can take to improve the security of your credit cards.



## GENERAL TIPS REGARDING CREDIT CARDS:

- Handle with care It is never a good idea to carry a credit card on its own outside of your wallet or purse. A credit card can easily get misplaced or stolen, yet they tend to stay put when placed within a slot in your wallet or purse.
- Limit the number of cards you possess. Only carry those cards that you use regularly.
- Shred your credit card statements and any other paperwork that contains information regarding your personal identity before putting it in the trash.
- Check your monthly statements, for sure, but also get in the habit
  of routinely checking your purchases online. It is the cardholder's
  responsibility to spot fraudulent charges and report them to the bank.
- Set up purchase notification alerts through your credit card company so you are immediately informed of activity on your account.

## When making online purchases, adhere to the following tips to protect yourself and your identity:

- Try to use the same credit card for all online purchases so if it is stolen, you will only have to deal with one credit card company.
- Never use debit cards for online purchases credit cards typically offer better protections to the cardholder.
- Never save credit card information on shopping sites. While this may speed up the process, it puts you at greater risk of becoming a victim of fraud or theft.
- Change your passwords regularly. This should include your email accounts. Use a combination of letters, numbers, symbols, and capital letters to make yourself less vulnerable.
- Don't use public Wi-Fi to make online purchases. Most public Wi-Fi spots offer little to no security protection and your personal information could be easily compromised.

It is imperative that you report the loss or theft of your credit cards, ATM cards, or debit cards to the card issuer as soon as you become aware of loss, theft, or misuse of your account information. The vast majority of credit card companies have toll-free numbers and 24-hour service to deal with such emergencies. In most cases, the credit card company will request that you contact your local police agency to file a report. If your credit card company makes this request, please contact the Oakwood Public Safety Department at (937) 298-2122 to file the report.



## Do Not Place Yard Debris in the Street or in Center Medians

The city of Oakwood offers several options for disposal of yard debris. Residents may place piles of yard debris – brush and branches – into the tree lawn area at their property frontage just behind the curb or edge of pavement for pickup by the city. Residents should not place yard debris in front of other properties, nor should they place yard debris in any roadway center medians.

Under no circumstance should residents place anything in the street or roadway gutter (except leaves in the fall during the posted 10-week leaf collection schedule). Any amount of debris in the street is an obstruction and disrupts the stormwater collection system by diverting water away from the intended storm drains. Debris in the street can be dangerous to vehicles and is hard to see at night. Debris in the street also interferes with on-street parking and is a danger to pedestrians, joggers, and bicyclists.

Placing anything in the street is a violation of Oakwood Codified Ordinance 901.01 (A)(3). The city's code enforcement officer responds to yard debris piles placed in the gutter or street by leaving a doorhanger notice at the property affording two business days to remove the obstruction from the street. After two days, the city will remove the obstruction and will charge the property owner \$150.

Property owners who routinely use the city's monthly collection program and wish to construct a hard surface pad (e.g., concrete, brick, paver) for debris placement should contact the code enforcement officer at (937) 297-2920 or see the city website for permitting information.

In addition to the monthly pick-up, the city offers other options for disposing of yard debris, such as the 24/7 Recycling and Yard Waste Drop-off Facility at the J.D. Foell Public Works Center. Also, residents are provided two free special pickups per year, which can be used for yard debris. Additionally, dumpsters are available to be delivered free of charge for large amounts of green waste. # Meet the Newly Elected Members of the Board of Education







2023 initiatives included a lending collection of Roku devices with subscription streaming services, performing arts tickets, picnic tables in Katharine Wright Park, and programs such as the Falconry demonstration, Teen Exam Breaks, and a River City Puppets show.


