2024 is off to a great start at KES. We have been very lucky with the snow so far, but as we all know, that can change quickly in Connecticut. Although I suspect we still have more winter ahead, the Super Bowl is a sign that spring is not too far away. February brings much excitement as we closely monitor whether the groundhog sees his shadow, and we eagerly await the 100th day of school. Barring any snow days, the 100th day of school will be Thursday February 8th. Our math department is planning a fun 100th day of school.

I want to provide an update on our attendance data so far this year. As I mentioned in a previous newsletter, chronic absenteeism is defined as the percentage of students missing ten percent or greater of the total number of days enrolled in the school year for any reason. In RSD 17, we have 180 days of school which means anyone who is absent for 18 days or more is considered chronically absent when the state department collects our attendance data at the end of the year. At the halfway point of the year, our attendance data is trending toward about 90% of our students meeting the threshold of less than 18 days. While 90% is an improvement over last year, I am looking to improve those numbers even more. We appreciate your efforts in ensuring that your children attend school on a regular basis, and we want to continue to support your efforts. If you have any questions about student attendance, please reach out to your child's teacher, our school nurse, or me at any time.



Many parents have reported feeling that their families have had little reprieve in between maladies this school year. You are not alone! There is a high incidence of GI and respiratory viruses circulating, especially at this time of year. If your child has had an episode of vomiting or diarrhea in the previous 24 hours before returning to school, they need to remain at home to recover. Send along BRAT diet items for snack

and lunch (the more mild, the better) when he/she does return to help promote a more successful school day. When returning to school after fever, students should be fever free without fever-reducing medications for 24 hours prior.

Please continue to report absences, and the reason for them, when calling or emailing. The more information I have, the better I can track trends and offer assistance. Many students wind up in my office after returning back to school; if I know what they are recovering from, I can better assist them to participate in their day. Thank you for your support with that! If your child visits the pediatrician, please send along an MD note excusing the absence. Please note that greater than ten absences over the school year requires an MD note to be considered excused.

With Valentine's Day approaching and the movement towards celebrating birthdays in the classroom increasing, I request that you check in regarding food allergies in the classroom. Thank you to those parents who have contacted me so far this year. Please know that teachers always appreciate new books, art supplies, or games for their classrooms in celebration of a student's birthday as well!

As always, an extra set of leggings/pants/mittens/socks is a good idea for your child's backpack or cubby as the weather this time of year is so erratic and playground conditions can be muddy and wet. We always appreciate donations of gently used black leggings for girls (sizes 6, 7-8, & 10-12) and black, gray or blue sweatpants/joggers for boys (sizes 6, 7-8, 10-12). Kindly wash and return pants that have been borrowed from the health office. Thank you.

Reinforcing good hand washing habits, drinking plenty of water, making healthy food choices, maintaining a regular sleep schedule, exercising in the fresh air ~ all good practices to reiterate with your child so that they continue to have a great school year!

Coping Skills Corner

Looks like I could have used a SMART goal when it came to having this write up ready for the new year! Happy New Year KES Families! The new year brings new joy and hope to many; for some it is a time to reflect on the past year, and for some it is a time of renewal and planning for the year ahead. If you are thinking of planning for the year ahead, a great tool to use would be creating SMART Goals. You may be wondering what SMART Goals are. They are a unique tool we use when trying to break larger goals, such as reading more, into manageable and obtainable steps. Let's take a closer look; S - specific, simple, sensible, significant. Is my goal specific; if I were to explain it to someone they would know exactly what I am talking about? M - measurable, meaningful, motivating. Am I actually motivated to achieve this goal; what do I want to get out of it? A - achievable, attainable, actionable. Are my expectations for this goal too high? Is this really something I can physically, mentally, emotionally do? R - relevant, reasonable, realistic, result-based. Is this goal based in reality or is this just something I want to strive for? Am I just trying to manifest? Are there measurable results, or is it more interpretive? T - time-bound, time-based, time-limited. Am I giving my goal a specific start and end time, or is it just whenever I feel like it? When we create SMART Goals, we are choosing to take control of the uncertainties by breaking them down into the smallest steps possible. Below is an example of a SMART Goal. After reading it, try and create some of your own SMART Goals. Sit down with your little ones and see if they can come up with some SMART GOALS too.

Goal: Read More

- S I want to read two new books, one about dinosaurs and one about volcanos
- M Learning about dinosaurs and volcanos will help me understand more about each topic
- A I might need some help from my caregiver when reading the big words but I am really good at reading
- R Reading these books will help me move up in my reading levels
- T I want to read a little from each book at night before bed for two weeks

Hello KES Families!

We have been having lots of fun while learning a variety of gross motor and social skills in PE class. Our focus has been on manipulative skills such as using hula hoops and jump ropes. Students have been challenging

themselves to try different tricks using these materials and even engage in some games using hula hoops and jump ropes. This past month we spent the first two weeks learning how to hula hoop and try different hula hoop tricks. The last two weeks we spent practicing the many ways to use a jump rope. Given the nature of a new year, students were introduced to setting personal goals for themselves in class and working to achieve those goals through practice and reflection. We are always focusing on having a growth mindset.

Coming up in February we will learn new fun exercises to help improve our cardiovascular endurance, muscular strength, and flexibility. We will be working on our volleying skills and fun team-building activities relating to the sport of volleyball. Students will learn how to properly strike different objects with their hands to keep an object in the air or pass to a target and/or partner. We will also continue to work on hula hoop skills and jump rope skills to continue to progress and meet our goals.

We live in New England, gear up and go outside! It is fun year round in Connecticut! Exercise is important for your body and mind. Here are some fun examples of family friendly activities you can do to continue exercising: ski, ice skate, sled, snow shoe!



During the month of February, our music classes are filled with seasonal activities. Third grade students can play up to five notes on their recorders

So far, 2024 is going well in the library! The weather has cooperated in giving us some snow to go along with related books in preschool: Snowmen All Year, Pizza Pie Snowman, and Sadie and the Snowman (in the morning), and Poe and Lars, My Penguin Osbert, Snow Riders, and Ten Ways to Hear Snow (in

the afternoon). Kindergarten wrapped up our unit on identifying fiction and non-fiction books with informational texts about giraffes (did you know they have purple tongues?) and ducklings and fiction books Giraffe and a Half and My Toothbrush is Missing. First graders finished their unit on non-fiction texts with Is a Blue Whale the Biggest Thing There Is? (spoiler alert: no) and Hippos Are Huge. Second graders completed their unit on narrative non-fiction with Otis and Will Discover the Deep (ask your child about swordfish orbital bones) and The Fastest Girl on Earth. Third graders completed their paragraphs on Amelia Earhart to complete their unit on biography. All classes in grades K-3 learned about an amazing Australian marsupial in Wombats are Pretty Weird. Those grades will now be moving into a unit on digital citizenship. Want to see the lessons for each grade? Search online for "Common Sense Media digital citizenship." We are in the midst of the third round of third-grade Book Club. Have a second grader who's interested? You are in luck! The next round of Book Club, which begins in late February, will offer a third-grade club on Tuesday mornings AND a second-grade club on Thursday mornings. Not sure when your child has library? Our preschool students have enjoyed exploring the winter season PRESCINE and learning a little more about the arctic and animals who live in that type of habitat. During the month of February we will direct our focus to friendship appreciation and acts of kindness and begin a unit around

buildings. We will focus on the shapes that make up different buildings, materials, and the tools used

to create structures and enhance our vocabulary further.

Our AM classes have been working hard to strengthen their early literacy skills. We are exploring the letters of the alphabet and playing around with rhyming words. Our PM classes have been working hard at further developing their phonemic awareness as well. We have focused a lot on isolating the beginning and ending sounds of words, identifying rhyming words within our read alouds, and blending syllables to form whole words. This month, we will learn how to write a few lowercase letters of the alphabet! We will begin focusing on skyline letters.

Continue supporting your child at home through reading stories together and asking questions about the characters, settings, problems, and solutions. Try going on a letter hunt or playing I spy with letter names/sounds. To help support our mathematical thinking, ask questions to elicit problem-solving strategies, count groups of objects and compare which group has more/less, explore numerals by going on a number hunt, the possibilities are endless!!

In science, students will be starting our PLTW Animal Adaptations unit. In social studies, we will continue learning about historical figures who have left a positive impact on our world. For social emotional learning, we will learn strategies to build mindfulness as well as how to cope with strong feelings.

It may be cold outside, but second grade is on fire!

In math, we continue to progress through our third unit of the year. This unit focuses on numbers within 1,000. In these next few

weeks, we will learn how to add and to subtract three-digit numbers using multiple strategies such as breaking numbers into their place value with picture models, expanded form, and the use of an open number line. During these lessons, we will also practice how to regroup when adding and subtracting.

In our second Wit and Wisdom module, we continue to learn what life was like in the west for early Amercians. We our finishing up with our mentor text "Plains Indians" by Andrew Santella, where we focused on learning what life was like for the Plains Indians. As we move into our next mentor text, "Journey of a Pioneer" by Patricia J. Murphy, students will learn what it was like for pioneers in the early west. We are amazed by all the historical knowledge students are gaining within this module!

In social studies, students are learning about the history of people in our community who have made a difference. In this unit, we are also learning why communities protect historical resources and artifacts from the past and how communities are formed. We will be Identifying natural resources, boundaries and historical markers on a map of Killingworth as well. In addition, students will learn about the historical monuments, buildings and people who have made contributions in Killingworth.

Using knowledge gained from our core text, *The Starry Messenger*, students will participate in a Socratic Seminar focused on explaining how Galileo's actions caused important effects. Students will use the cause-

effect structure when discussing their ideas grounding them in text evidence. Additionally, students will plan and draft a multi-paragraph essay that explains how Galileo helped people learn about space. Students' writing will include compound sentences, specific vocabulary, facts, definitions, and details. In math, students are learning to use multiplication to find the area of rectangles and squares. Students will be learning how to find the area of combined rectangles and solve one-step word problems using multiplication and division. Daily practice of the multiplication and division facts continues to be important for mastery. Thank you for your continued support.

HOW TO HELP KIDS WITH MATH AT HOME (EVEN IF YOU HATE MATH)

If you have a less than stellar math history, it's okay! You can still help your child learn the math they need to succeed. Here's how.

1. Maintain a positive attitude

A lot of kids (and adults) feel anxiety when presented with a math problem. But if your child is struggling with a concept, that doesn't mean they're bad at math. You're not bad at math either! Math is a skill that takes practice, just like any other. You'll learn it, even if it's confusing right now. This just means you don't understand it *yet*.

2. Ask math questions that interest your child

Let's face it — some math can be boring. Math is everywhere. You'll find mathematical relationships throughout nature. Your child can discover angles and physics while jumping toy monster trucks. Or they can explore measurements while baking or doing crafts. Find numbers in what they already love and watch their interest in math grow!

3. Encourage communication

When possible, try to open up some judgement-free conversations about math. Ask how it's going and if they feel good about their new lessons. Don't jump in and try to solve their problems right away. And be careful about remarks like, "oh, that's easy". If they talk, just listen.

4. Be patient and take it slow

Math builds on itself, but that means it can be tricky to keep up if your child is struggling with a new concept. When this happens, slow down and back up. Don't keep pushing new ideas until they understand the old ones.

5. Practice and refine math vocabulary

Math vocabulary is all around us, but that doesn't mean we're very comfortable with it. Try using math vocabulary in everyday language and it will slowly start feeling a lot less intimidating. Bring up percentages when you're shopping a sale, or talk about parts of a whole while cooking.

6. Show math in everyday life

When kids are young, just counting or sorting is a great start. As they get older, look for math lessons while baking, shopping, playing games, or talking about money. Budgeting is a major life skill that uses so much math. Find these practical math moments and help your child see the value in a math education.

7. Get your child to teach you math

Math looks a little different now. If your kid's homework is confusing for you, ask them to explain their process.



SNOW CANCELLATION PROCEDURES

The decision to cancel/delay school is made between 5-5:30 a.m.

- 1. Transportation gets the report from the State Police and Public Works.
- 2. RSD #17 Superintendent consults with various agencies and individuals.
- 3. Weather conditions are reviewed using local and area media services.
- 4. A decision is made by the Superintendent using all available information.
- 5. School Messenger alert system is initiated.

If school is delayed, the start time will be at 10:40.

If school is dismissed early, the dismissal time will be at 1:05.

A decision to dismiss early will only be used when the threat of weather is predictable and probable. The logic here is as follows:

In some cases, we would be dismissing students during the height of road crews completing the treatment of the roads. It is always best to wait until treatments are completed to a certain level.

In some cases, we would be sending students home without anyone home and without advance notice. We respect the fact that many people work away from their homes.
