This target will determine the revenue the district can expect to receive from the state. The document provided explains the 2023-24 school year enrollment target, budgeted enrollment and the Oct. 1 enrollment data. This data is provided to determine if the projected enrollment from last year was accurate. Next the document shows the recommended enrollment targets and enrollment for budgetary purposes. As a reminder to the board, the school board is required to set enrollment targets every year at each grade level. This target determines the program and capacity limitations at each grade level. Schools also use this target to accept or deny open enrollment applications. This is the first review of enrollment projections. The board will be asked to take action on these targets at the March Regular School Board meeting.

American Indian Parent Advisory Committee (AIPAC)

February 6, 2024

How does the MDE determine a school district's need for AIPAC?

 All school districts that have 10 or more American Indian Students are required to form an AIPAC.

What role does the AIPAC play in the district?

 The AIPAC should be involved with the creation of American Indian Program to meet the criteria in Minnesota Statutes, section 124D.74, subdivision1. This can include but is not limited to focusing on grade-appropriate education material, providing a process for content for cultural relevance, and reviewing American Indian content and state standards alignment.





American Indian Education Plan

The plan should be based on the following:

- Support the Academic
 Needs of Native Americans
- Support Post-Secondary preparation
- Make the curriculum relevant to the needs, interests, and cultural heritage of American Indian students
- Develop intercultural awareness among pupils, parents and staff

- Provide positive reinforcement of the self-image of American Indian pupils.
- Supplement, not supplant, state and federal educational and cocurricular programs

SUMMARY

The Superintendent contract ends on June 30, 2024. Over the fall of 2023 Chair Phillip and Vice Chair Oksnevad met and negotiated with the Superintendent. The memo will outline the changes in their contract for the next three years (2024-2027).

ANALYSIS

A market analysis of Superintendent compensation demonstrated that the salary and benefits in the current contract was the lowest in comparable districts. The proposed contract reflects an adjustment to fair market value for Superintendents. In addition some language was changed per state statute and based on MSBA Model Contract language.

The majority of changes in their contracts are related to compensation. Below are some details regarding those changes.

- *Compensation* a near-market increase in salary.
- *Tax Sheltered Annuity* an increase in the TSA yearly contribution and district matching.
- **Retention Incentive** increases each year of employment
- *Holiday* Juneteenth added (state statue).
- Sick and Safe Time updated per state statute
- Life Insurance market comparison increase from 2x to 3x salary
- Workers Compensation added language including the Superintendent in coverage

MSBA/MASA Model Policy 613 Orig. 1997 Rev. 2015, 2016, 2017

Updated: Feb. 6, 2024

613 GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

I. PURPOSE

The purpose of this policy is to set forth requirements for graduation from the school district.

II. GENERAL STATEMENT OF POLICY

The policy of the school district is that all students entering grade 8 in the 2023-2024 school year and later must demonstrate, as determined by the school district, their satisfactory completion of the credit requirements and their understanding of academic standards. The school district must adopt graduation requirements that meet or exceed state graduation requirements established in law or rule. Students who enrolled prior to 2022-2023 and earlier will continue to follow the requirements outlined in the 2017 version of Policy 613, linked below.

III. DEFINITIONS

- A. "Academic standard" means: (1) a statewide adopted expectation for student learning in the content areas of language arts, mathematics, science, social studies, physical education, or the arts, or (2) a locally adopted expectation for student learning in health, the arts, career and technical education, or world languages.
- B. "Credit" means a student's successful completion of an academic **semester** of study or a student's mastery of the applicable subject matter, as determined by the school district.
- C. "Section 504 Accommodation" means the defined appropriate accommodations or modifications that must be made in the school environment to address the needs of an individual student with disabilities.
- D. "Individualized Education Program" or "IEP" means a written statement developed for a student eligible by law for special education and services.
- E. "English language learners" or "ELL" student means an individual whose first language is not English and whose test performance may be negatively impacted by lack of English language proficiency.

F. "Advanced Experience" means students engaging in a course that provides opportunities to gain insights on readiness after graduation around both college and career learning.

IV. DISTRICT ASSESSMENT COORDINATOR

The Superintendent or designee shall be named the District Assessment Coordinator. Said person shall be in charge of all test procedures and shall bring recommendations to the school board annually for approval.

V. GRADUATION ASSESSMENT REQUIREMENTS

For students enrolled in grade 8 in the 2012-2013 school year and later, students' state graduation requirements, based on a longitudinal, systematic approach to student education and career planning, assessment, instructional support, and evaluation, include the following:

- A. Achievement and career and college readiness in mathematics, reading, and writing, as measured against a continuum of empirically derived, clearly defined benchmarks focused on students' attainment of knowledge and skills so that students, their parents, and teachers know how well students must perform to have a reasonable chance to succeed in a career or college without the need for postsecondary remediation and which facilitates the monitoring of students' continuous development of and growth in requisite knowledge and skills; analysis of students' progress and performance levels, identification of students' academic strengths and diagnosis of areas where students require curriculum or instructional adjustments, targeted interventions, or remediation; and determination of students' learning and instructional needs and the instructional tools and best practices that support academic rigor for the student based on analysis of students' progress and performance data; and
 - B. Consistent with this paragraph and Minnesota Statutes section 120B.125 age-appropriate exploration and planning activities and career assessments to encourage students to identify personally relevant career interests and aptitudes and help students and their families develop a regularly reexamined transition plan for postsecondary education or employment without need for postsecondary remediation.
 - C. Based on appropriate state guidelines, students with an IEP may satisfy state graduation requirements by achieving an individual score on the state-identified alternative assessments.
 - D. Students meeting the state graduation requirements under this section must receive targeted, relevant, academically rigorous, and resourced instruction which may include a targeted instruction and intervention plan focused on improving the student's knowledge and skills in core subjects so that the student has a reasonable chance to succeed in a career or college without need for postsecondary remediation.
 - E. Students meeting the state graduation requirements under this section and who are students in grade 11 or 12 and who are identified as academically ready for a career

or college are required to complete one advanced experience. The Advanced Experience selecting from the following:

- a. Courses awarding college credit to high school students such as AP, CIS, or PSEO or
- b. An internship or work-study or
- c. A SANB and/or 916 Career and Technical Education (CTE) course or
- d. Complete a staff-supervised Capstone. A Capstone project can take many forms. A student could do a research project, plan and create an engineered product, or study for and take an international language and gain a Bilingual/Multilingual Seal test. The student will be provided an advisor to support the Capstone process.

Students are not required to achieve a specified score or level of proficiency on an assessment to graduate from high school. This is a type of credit, not a standalone additional credit.

VI. GRADUATION CREDIT REQUIREMENTS

Students beginning 9th grade in the 2024-2025 school year and later must successfully complete, as determined by the school district, the following high school level credits for graduation:

- A. Eight credits of language arts sufficient to satisfy all academic standards in English language arts;
- B. Six credits of mathematics, including an algebra II credit or its equivalent, sufficient to satisfy all of the academic standards in mathematics;
 - Students will need to satisfy all of the 8th grade standards in mathematics in algebra I by the end of 8th grade.
- D. Six credits of science, including at least:
 - (a) two credits of life science;
 - (b) two credits of chemistry or physics; and
 - (c) two credits of earth and space science.

The combination of credits must be sufficient to satisfy (i) all of the academic standards in either chemistry or physics and (ii) all other academic standards in science;

- E. Seven credits of social studies, encompassing at least United States history, geography, government and citizenship, world history, and economics sufficient to satisfy all of the academic standards in social studies;
- F. Two credits in the arts sufficient to satisfy all of the state or local academic standards in the arts; and
- G. One credit of health and one credit of Physical Education
- H. One credit of Personal Finance.
- I. A minimum of fifteen elective credits.

J. The total minimum number of credits to graduate from the district high school is 47 credits and must include completion of an Advanced Experience.

K. Credit equivalencies

- 1. A one credit of economics taught in a school's agriculture education or business department may fulfill a one credit in social studies under Paragraph E., above, if the credit is sufficient to satisfy all of the academic standards in economics.
- 2. An agriculture science or career and technical education credit may fulfill the elective science credit required under Paragraph D., above, if the credit meets the state physical science, life science, earth and space science, chemistry, or physics academic standards or a combination of these academic standards as approved by the school district. An agriculture or career and technical education credit may fulfill the credit in chemistry or physics required under Paragraph D., above, if the credit meets the state chemistry or physics academic standards as approved by the school district. A student must satisfy either all of the chemistry or physics academic standards prior to graduation. An agriculture science or career and technical education credit may not fulfill the required biology credit under Paragraph D., above.
- 3. A career and technical education credit may fulfill a mathematics or arts credit requirement under Paragraph B. or Paragraph F., above.
- 4. A computer science credit may fulfill a mathematics credit requirement under Paragraph B., above, if the credit meets state academic standards in mathematics.
- 5. A Project Lead the Way credit may fulfill a mathematics or science credit requirement under Paragraph B. or Paragraph D., above, if the credit meets the state academic standards in mathematics or science.

VII. GRADUATION STANDARDS REQUIREMENTS

- A. All students must demonstrate their understanding of the following academic standards:
 - 1. School District Standards, Health (K-12);
 - 2. School District Standards, Career and Technical Education (K-12); and
 - 3. School District Standards, World Languages (K-12).
- B. Academic standards in health, world languages, and career and technical education will be reviewed on a periodic basis. A school district must use the current world languages standards developed by the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages.

- C. All students must satisfactorily complete the following required Graduation Standards in accordance with the standards developed by the Minnesota Department of Education (MDE):
 - 1. Minnesota Academic Standards, English Language Arts K-12;
 - 2. Minnesota Academic Standards, Mathematics K-12;
 - 3. Minnesota Academic Standards, Science K-12;
 - 4. Minnesota Academic Standards, Social Studies K-12; and
 - 5. Minnesota Academic Standards, Physical Education K-12.
- D. State standards in the Arts K-12 are available, or school districts may choose to develop their own standards.
- E. The academic standards for language arts, mathematics, and science apply to all students except the very few students with extreme cognitive or physical impairments for whom an IEP team has determined that the required academic standards are inappropriate. An IEP team that makes this determination must establish alternative standards.

VIII. EARLY GRADUATION

Students may be considered for early graduation, as provided for within Minnesota Statutes section 120B.07, upon meeting the following conditions:

- A. All course or standards and credit requirements must be met;
- B. The principal or designee shall conduct an interview with the student and parent or guardian, familiarize the parties with opportunities available in post-secondary education, and arrive at a timely decision; and
- C. The principal's decision shall be in writing and may be subject to review by the superintendent and school board.

VIV. PRIOR VERSION OF POLICY 613 STILL IN EFFECT

In order to ensure an orderly transition to the updated graduation requirements, the previous version of Policy 613 remains in effect for students in grades 9-12 during the 2023-2024 school year). Please refer to this policy link. Students may work with the High School counselors and principal to take advantage of opportunities that the school may offer, though they will not be required for these students at this time.
