Japan Evacuates from Tsunamis and Earthquakes

On January 1st, Japanese authorities had announced a Tsunami warning and issued an evacuation after a series of earthquakes had affected the west side of the main island. A 7.6 magnitude earthquake was reported at 4:00pm, the strongest of more than a dozen earthquakes that had already been documented by the Japan Meteorological Agency.

Tsunami warnings were issued in Ishikawa prefecture. It was later lifted; however, coastal residents were ordered to keep a distance from their homes due to the possible danger of the waves. There had also been a television warning to the state from station NHK about the rising of water up to 16.5 feet in the local area, as a 10-foot tsunami was predicted to make its landfall in Niigata prefecture on the coast of the Sea of Japan. The earthquakes had disrupted train lines, cut off power to multiple areas, and ignited fires on residential buildings, causing chaos and necessitating emergency responses.

There have been no confirmed deaths due to the earthquakes yet, but meteorologists say there's a high possibility for further earthquakes in the next several days. These earthquakes are what has raised tsunami concerns across both North Korea and Russia. South Korea's meteorologists had urged vigilance on the country's eastern coast and heightened caution due to possible delayed after-effects. An emergency center has been established by Prime Minister Fumio Kishida to collect information on the earthquake and tsunami risk as the situation continues to develop. Still now, tsunami warnings are still coming out and evacuation orders are still ongoing.



Earthquake in Japan Takes Thousands From People

People all over the western coast of Japan are left homeless after a huge earthquake strikes New Years day. Japan is left searching after an amass of people are missing, and 180 were found dead.

Thousands of Police, troops, and firefighters were called to search through the rubble in hopes to find some of the missing people., The rescue effort since the 7.6 magnitude earthquake has been unsuccessful so far.

Authorities were uncertain of the number of people missing in Wajima ahead of the large-scale search involving about 100 police officers at the Wajima Morning Market, where around 200 buildings were destroyed.

Snow, rain and plunging temperatures have complicated the relief effort in Ishikawa by increasing the risk of landslides, and endangered communities that are isolated due to quake-induced damage to roads.

"Living Skin" in the Great Wall of China?

According to some sources, portions of the Great Wall of China have living skin protecting it. These portions of the Great Wall of China were built by compressing natural materials with soil and were once considered a weak point in the Great Wall.

This "living skin" consists of tiny rootless plants and microorganisms known as biocrusts. Biocrusts are commonly found in dry soil regions, but are not typically located on handmade structures.

Past studies have revealed that lichen and moss biocrusts can be a threat to modern heritage stone structures due to the microbial communities' long-term impacts on the aesthetic value, the production of acid and other metabolites, and the alteration of microenvironments, which could cause erosion and rock weathering. Those findings have led to the removal of plants growing on the top of parts of the Great Wall.

The effects of biocrusts look different for landmarks. Cyanobacteria and moss actually increase the Great Wall's stability. Which has improved its resistance to erosion, according to the new paper.

Samples have been taken from over 300 miles away. This is across eight rammed earth sections of the site. The authors found that more than two-thirds of the area is covered in biocrusts.

Researchers compared the stability and strength of samples layered in biocrust with samples without "Earth's living skin." They discovered that samples with biocrust are as much as three times stronger than those without.

Biocrust is made up of components such as cyanobacteria, algae, moss, fungi and lichen.

Biocrusts cover an estimated 12% of the planet's surface; the communities of tiny plants and microorganisms can take decades, or longer, to develop.


NASA'S Super Sonic Jet

Lockheed Martin and NASA set out to unveil their new X-59 Supersonic Jet, said to be quieter than any previous one. This high-tech aircraft is to break the sound barrier without the super-loud sonic boom sound. The *X-59* Quiet SuperSonic Technology (Quesst) jet has been under construction at Lockheed Martin's "Skunk Works" facility in Palmdale, California, circa 2019. The X-59 Quesst's sound barrier-breaking technology is said to lower the volume of a sonic boom to a 'thump,' similar to slamming a car door. NASA says the aircraft could aid in remolding regulations that previously held back supersonic flight over populated areas due to the disruption that a thunderous sonic boom can create.

On Friday, January 12th, premiering at 4 pm, NASA is hosting a free-to-join live stream unveiling the red, white, and blue painted X-59 jet as it rolls from its hangar for the first time since completion. The X-59 was shown once in August 2023, before its patriotic paint job or livery. During its first rollout, the geometry of the X-59 left viewers in awe. The aircraft details its striking features and showcases its sharp, elongated, beak-like nose section that measures 38 feet (in length). This nose portion of the jet plays a role in shaping the shockwaves that the aircraft produces during its airtime.

Its iconic nose also means that pilots flying the X-59 aircraft would not have the ability to see out of a forward windscreen, so It does not have one. Instead, pilots will use the External Vision System (XVS), according to NASA, to see the front of the aircraft. This system works by using a forward-facing camera, a cockpit-mounted display screen, and custom image processing software to create an "augmented reality view of the X-59 pilot's forward line-of-sight along with graphical flight data overlays," according to a 2019 statement from the agency.



Iowa School Shooting

On January 4, 2024, Dylan Butler shot and killed a sixth grader, and wounded four other students and a school administrator. Later that day, Butler ended up taking his own life.

The police received news of the active shooter at around 7:37 AM. There were not many students on school grounds at the time of this tragic event, but a breakfast program was going on.

This shooting took place at Perry High School in Iowa on the first day back from winter break. Butler was armed with a pump shotgun and a small caliber handgun. Police later found out that the 17 year old boy also had an "improvised explosive device." Butler was said to have acted alone, and authorities have not released a motive due to the on-going case.

During the investigation, officials later found out that Butler was a part of a discord group dedicated to talking about school shootings. Police later found messages of him saying, "I need him to leave so I can assemble my guns" and "I'm in the bathroom gearing up." Discord was previously used to plan a shooting back in 2022, but the boy was caught by the police before anything occurred.

Since this tragedy, the community has come together in many different ways to show support for the victims and their families. The community has put posters around the outside of the school that say "Perry strong," and there was a candlelight vigil to mourn the loss of the boy who lost his life.



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Nevada Man Attacks Judge in Courtroom

Cameras in a Nevada courtroom would capture a dramatic scene in which a man could be seen jumping across a courtroom table to attack a judge in Nevada. On Wednesday, January 3, 2024, a Clark County District judge sentenced felon Deobra Redden after he pleaded guilty to attempted battery (assault) with substantial bodily harm.

In the video, Judge Mary Kay Holthus reads out the sentencing to the courtroom. Redden suddenly jumps over the bench and attacks Holthus, and it would take three people to restrain Redden. Fortunately, Judge Mary Kay Holthus is in stable condition as of right now. A court-martial who was seen attempting to restrain Redden was injured but is also in stable condition.

Redden has a criminal history which includes multiple charges of domestic violence. In 2021, he previously served time in prison for domestic battery. He claims that during the time he was going through mental health problems, and he is currently doing better because of a support system he had set up.

Following this, his lawyer would advocate to give Redden probation instead of returning to prison. Holthus would deny the lawyer's request stating, "I appreciate that but I think it's time he gets a taste of something else because I just can't with that history."

Immediately after her statement, Redden can be seen lunging at her. The video of this attack has gone viral on social media, and Redden has recently been called to the courtroom again for a resentencing. In the new footage, he is seen with a muzzle-like device around his mouth and gloves restricting his movement.

Gypsy Rose Gets Released

Gypsy Rose is a very well known woman, but not for the reasons you would think. When Gypsy was a little girl, she lived with her Mother Dee Dee and was raised in Louisiana, but she and her mother eventually moved to Missouri. When Gypsy was just a baby, her mother began telling people she had different illnesses. But when Gypsy reached age 8, her mother told her she had Leukemia and Muscular Dystrophy. Dee Dee told Gypsy she would be in a wheelchair and need a feeding tube.

As the years went on, it only ever got worse, the list of medical problems Dee Dee related about her daughter would go on to include seizures, asthma, and hearing and visual impairments. Due to Dee Dee's actions, Gypsy had to be prescribed with multiple medications and had to sleep using a breathing machine. Gypsy also went through multiple surgeries as well, including surgeries on her eyes and the removal of her salivary glands. Later on Gypsy's teeth started to rot due to the medication she was taking. They were later pulled out.

The truth is that Gypsy could walk, did not need a feeding tube and did not have cancer. Gypsy's head was only ever bald because Dee Dee shaved it all off so it could look real. Dee Dee has a mental illness called Munchausen Syndrome by proxy. This syndrome made Dee Dee fabricate her daughter's health in order to receive attention for taking care of a "Sick Child".

When Dee Dee told Gypsy's dad, Rob Blanchard, she had many illnesses, he complimented Dee Dee for her devoted care. As Gypsy got older, Dee Dee would lie about her age, going so far that Dee Dee was changing the dates of Gypsy's Birth certificate. Gypsy was becoming harder for Dee Dee to control. In 2011, Gypsy tried hiring a man to kill her mother, but Dee Dee found out that Gypsy was talking to people online, smashed her computer, and restrained her to a bed. Gypsy stated that her mother would sometimes hit her also and deny her food. Gypsy managed to get back online and met a man named Nicholas Godejohn. She later then told him the truth about her mother and asked him to kill Dee Dee so they could be together.

In June 2015, he came to her house and stabbed Dee Dee while Gypsy waited in the bathroom with her ears covered. In 2016, Gypsy pled guilty to second-degree murdered and was sentenced to 10 years in prison. Gypsy was released December 28th, 2023. On the other hand, the man who helped her was charged with first-degree murder and sentenced to life in prison.

A Tragedy of a Surgery

A woman in Florida seemed to have gotten more than what she bargained for after leaving her dentist appointment with brain damage and 24-hour care after receiving an unnecessarily high dose of fentanyl during her dental procedure on May 10th, 2022.

Maria Lugo Querales traveled to Marble Falls, Texas, to undergo a dental surgery procedure and had a quick brush with death after being put under anesthesia by Dr. Jerry Teauge. Querales' husband, Luis Espana, had accused Teague of allowing Querales to take such an extensive amount of fentanyl without properly informing her first. Teague is not the only dentist involved, as Dr. Lane Freeman and Dr. Stuart Nunnally were also present during her procedure.

Querales had initially visited the clinic in Florida to be sent in for a procedure for "alleged cavitations" along with the extraction of an asymptomatic root-canal treated tooth." Her medication for this procedure was 400 grams of fentanyl, the sedative midazolam, and the anesthetic lidocaine.

Teague had worked as an anesthesiologist at the Texas clinic. He administered these drugs to Querales a day before his disappearance after taking an evening walk. Teauge's wife would reveal that he was suffering from "cognitive issues" as he was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer with less than a year to live. Only two weeks after this dental procedure would Teauge succumb to his illness.

Espana is now suing the dental clinic due to their "negligence" and claimed that they were "offering, planning and performing unnecessary dental surgery." The doctors have since denied all indictments, leaving Querales to live in a neurological rehabilitation facility where she breathes through a tracheotomy.



Opinion: Trouble in Schools?

The Chicago Board of Education is reportedly seeking to remove all officers from high schools in fall of 2024. Mayor Brandon Johnson and Chicago Teachers Union leadership have vocally opposed police officers being stationed in Chicago Public Schools buildings. The school board was appointed by Johnson, a former CTU organizer, and will vote on whether to renew the \$10.3 million police contract this summer.

During his campaign, Johnson said police "have no place in schools." Once in office he ultimately deferred to Local School Councils to vote on whether to keep police officers in schools.

Research on the effectiveness of officers in schools can vary depending on areas and other factors. This shows the importance of letting decisions regarding these officers rest with the school leaders, who know their schools and environment. Theoretically, they should be the best people fit to make this decision.

These decisions could be very controversial due to the rising rate of school related violence and crime. Just last week there was a school shooting in Iowa. Without the presence of officers in the schools, these violent crimes could skyrocket and be uncontrollable, especially in a place like Chicago that has crime everywhere and doesn't seem to be going down anytime soon.

In 2022 the people of Chicago reported 29% fewer crimes, but also large spikes in violent crimes including assaults, motor vehicle theft, and homicide. So removing police officers from schools could potentially lead to more of these crimes occuring at the schools, which would truly be a horrific sighting.

All in all, this is a very serious decision for the Chicago Board of Education that should be carefully considered and looked at many times before being put into motion. If they do plan to go through with this, it will be interesting to see how they plan on protecting their students.
