Staff Spotlight - Mrs. Flores



Mrs. Flores is the Spanish Teacher at Hillcrest Academy North and has been teaching here for two years. She has been with UCESC for over a decade. Classroom Spotlights



Ms. Lederman, English Teacher

Ms. Lederman's English class finished up "author's purpose" by exploring why Machiavelli wrote *The Prince*. Then they started exploring "theme" by reading *Names/Nombres* by Julia Alverez. For both the passage and the short story, students answered written questions and had discussions about the texts. Then they wrote a claim, evidence, analysis paragraph about each.

In Creative Writing the class has been writing short stories, scoring their classmates short stories with a rubric they created (based off of one Ms. Lederman created), and then revising those short stories to make them even better, making sure they include dialogue, imagery, and proper punctuation.

Mr. Mojovich, Physical Education & Health Teacher

During the 2nd marking period, in Health Class, the topic of discussion was Sexual Health Education. There were so many topics being discussed that are very important for students to be aware about and know more about. Some of the topics discussed were the reproductive systems, the importance of knowing about and how to treat and prevent HIV/AIDS/STDs, and prenatal

development and care. Students would listen to me present my Google Slide presentation and it would be followed up with a 'questions for understanding' worksheet. All of the students were engaged and asked great questions about the topics that were discussed.

Along with talking about Sexual Health Education, I also assisted on administering an ELA portfolio essay. Students had to read an article named, "How the Web Affects Memory," where a Harvard Professor Daniel Wegner did several experiments testing out



whether or not the internet has proven that we rely too much on it, instead of using our memory. Students had to complete a multiple choice assessment, along with a 5 paragraph essay, agreeing or disagreeing with Wegner's assessment. Students worked on completing the essay daily, as they were instructed to complete a paragraph daily. At the end of it all, they had to type up the essay and submit it to the Supervisor of Instruction for credit.






Therapist Spolight - Ms. Aliza

We ended the month with special visits and a sing-a-long!

































January - A time to show Leadership and Courage

learning environment, while above all having fun.































Ms. Mund's Class











Therapy Spotlight - Ms. Aliza - PT





Message from the Director



Dear WRA Community,

I hope the first few weeks of 2024 have treated you all well! I am proud of the collective efforts by our students to continue to work hard to develop critical skills for employment - both in the classroom and at their Work-Based Learning experiences. We are looking forward to our WBL rotations which tentatively begin the week of February 20th (we are closed on the 19th). January also saw the WRA survive its first snowfall of the season! The winter

weather brings additional safety considerations as it relates to traveling to and from our internship sites...and the commute for our Project SEARCH students who use NJ Transit or Access Link. I want to thank our students and staff for their flexibility on those days, and to Rachel, Sharlene, Jodi & Jourdan for quickly identifying engaging and meaningful alternative programming when needed.

I am also very excited to share that the Work Readiness Academy (and Project SEARCH) have been named a sub-recipient of a \$2.75 million grant that Atlantic Health System (the parent company for Overlook Medical Center) has received from the U.S. Department of Labor (DOL) as part of the department's Nursing Expansion Grant Program. The WRA will receive a total of \$256,000 over four years to help expand our Work-Based Learning of young adults with disabilities at Overlook Medical Center & the Overlook satellite campus in Union, New Jersey. Students from the WRA will be piloting internship experiences at the Overlook-Union campus beginning in late February.

The grant will also fund the establishment of Atlantic Health System's Pathway to Ensuring Access and Clinical Excellence in Nursing (AHS PEACE), an innovative, new program designed to expand and diversify the pipeline of nursing professionals, practicing at the top of their licensure, to fill positions that are in high demand. AHS PEACE will institute professional pathways for Registered Nurses (RNs) in acute care and critical care specialties, as well as development of clinical pathways for nursing assistants, and other entry-level clinical positions that only require a high-school diploma (i.e patient transporters, patient care representatives, radiology technicians, etc).

Included among the candidates for these positions will be candidates from historically marginalized and underrepresented populations. We are thrilled to be a part of this initiative!



for agreeing to facilitate this elective & learn more about this niche interest area!






















What's Happening at Project SEARCH?



Understanding Supported Employment Options Available AFTER Graduation

SUPPORTED EMPLOYMENT IN NEW JERSEY

Supported Employment helps individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD) secure and maintain **competitive employment**, or work in a setting to prepare for competitive employment. An individual's interests, likes, and dislikes are important factors when considering a job or career path.



KEY TERMS

Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA)

Federal legislation signed in 2014 to help individuals access education, training, and support services to succeed in the workplace.

Competitive Employment

Work performed on a full-time or part-time basis in an integrated setting that is compensated at or above minimum wage.

<u>Division of Vocational</u> <u>Rehabilitation Services</u> (DVRS)

The state agency which provides vocational services for individuals with IDD or other barriers to employment.

"Employment First" State

An initiative that outlines that competitive employment is the preferred post-education activity. It presumes that all individuals, including people with IDD, are capable of integrated employment.

EXAMPLES OF SERVICES

Pre-Employment Transition Services

 Offered to high school students to plan and prepare for entering the workforce.

Job Development

 Assists individuals with a job search, interview skills, and resume development.

Job Sampling

 Gives the individual the opportunity to explore different types of employment and identify areas of interest and ability.

Job Coaching

 Provides assistance with learning essential job tasks, transportation training, social skills, and can act as a liaison between the employer and employee.

Long-Term Follow Along

 Ongoing support through worksite visits designed to help individuals maintain skills built during job coaching.

Trial Work Experience

- A workplace readiness assessment administered by a Supported Employment provider agency, such as Project HIRE.
- *This is not a fully inclusive list. Services may vary between agencies, school districts, and funding sources.

NJ WORKABILITY

NJ WorkAbility offers people with disabilities who are working, and whose income would otherwise make them ineligible for Medicaid, the opportunity to receive full Medicaid coverage.

REQUIREMENTS OF COMPETITIVE EMPLOYMENT

Wages

Individuals are compensated at or above minimum wage, and at a comparable rate to coworkers without IDD performing similar duties with similar experience and education.

Benefits

Individuals receive the same benefits as other employees in a similar position with a similar level of service.

Scheduling

The schedule is determined by the needs of the employer, not the availability of the individual.

Integration

Employment takes place in a setting where individuals with and without disabilities have the opportunity to interact and work alongside each other.

Advancement

The same opportunities for promotion and advancement are available for employees with and without disabilities in similar positions with similar experience.

Through NJ WorkAbility, individuals can earn up to \$65,196 of gross annual income and maintain less than \$20,000 in assets without threatening their Medicaid status. A couple cannot exceed \$87,900 in gross income and \$30,000 in assets. Learn more about NJ WorkAbility and eligibility requirements at: bit.ly/njworkability

About the Work Readiness Academy

The Work Readiness Academy serves students ages 18-21 with disabilities and provides a comprehensive employment training experience that incorporates both classroom-based instruction and community-based work-learning experiences. While in the

training classroom, students work cooperatively with similar aged peers to learn critical skills related to employment and socialization. Students also work on career exploration and planning, including the development of a person-centered, post-secondary vision and plan with clear goals and action steps. Program staff remain on-site during the internships to provide and fade support and assistance as needed. Students also participate in field trips focused on career discovery, independent living skills, recreation and independent travel training.


