FOOTHILL'S FAVORITE WINTER HOLIDAYS



Candy Craze



HOMEWORK: IS THE "A" WORTH THE STRESS?

In the entire world, the U.S. has the most stressed students in school. Today, the average middle school student (aged 11 - 13) experiences more stress than a child psychiatric patient in the 1950s. Piles of never-ending work can significantly impact a child's behavior.

The homework load for many 6th-grade students at Foothill includes an IXL or IP assignment for math, science, and some core homework. The specifics may vary depending on a student's elective courses, but if you take music, you must practice your instrument for 20 minutes daily. This homework workload can range from 20 minutes to three hours for a typical 6th-grade student. According to an online survey, 72% of students exhibit negative behaviors associated with stress from homework. Parents can inadvertently add to the stress when they question their children about their poor grades. There is also the "what if thinking": when students ponder, "What if I don't achieve good grades, and my parents become upset with me?"

Ms. Casassa from the 6th-grade math department emphasizes that staying organized is the key to success. She assigns 20 minutes of online homework and acknowledges the advantages and disadvantages of using Google Classroom. "It's important for easy communication with students, but some students click the 'turn in' button even when they haven't completed the assignment." Additionally, there are opportunities for retakes to alleviate some of the stress related to testing and achieving specific grades in her class. Ms. Casassa stresses that the top priority is not getting an "A" but ensuring her students master the standards.

Now that we've heard from the teachers let's see what the students have to say! Levi Hershman believes that a letter grade shouldn't define one's life. He argues, "Stress isn't worth a letter. You should pass your tests without stress." However, some students disagree with that. Kayliann Zung disagrees, saying, "A little stress can be a good thing; it can motivate students to be organized. But too much stress can take a toll on their behavior." Stress could motivate some students, but for some, it scares them; everyone is different in their mind, emotions, and opinions.

In conclusion, homework stress is a pressing issue affecting students worldwide, especially in the United States—the burden of assignments and the fear of parental disappointment. Homework can take a significant toll on students' mental and emotional well-being. However, it's crucial to recognize that teachers like Ms. Casassa is aware of these challenges and are taking steps to remove stress through innovative teaching methods and focusing on mastery over grades.


