

MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

I hope you had a wonderful holiday season and are enjoying a happy new year in what has been a mild winter so far through early January. By the time you read this, we will have completed the first half of our school year and the end of the second marking period. We have had several students recognized for achieving honor roll status, which you can read in a later section of this newsletter. We are witnessing students excel through academics, athletics, music, drama and additional extracurricular activities, and we encourage everyone to work to the best of their ability to utilize our instructional and support staff to maximize their potential and to enjoy their school experience.

I am also writing to bring to your attention a significant challenge that our school district is currently facing – a reduction in federal funding that has put us in a precarious financial situation. As you may be aware, the stimulus funding that districts received during the pandemic is ending. Over the past few years, we have worked diligently to manage our resources efficiently and maintain the high standards of education that our community values. This includes employment of staff to support learning loss during the pandemic, such as positions in Title I reading and math as well as in the counseling department. These positions have met and continue to meet the academic and mental health needs of our students. As the stimulus money evaporates, we will be challenged to fund these positions with our general operating budget, limiting our ability to generate fund balance. It is imperative that we find ways to maintain these positions in some manner in order to continue to address the needs of our students. In short, our initial budget outlook that maintains our current programs presents us with a significant budget gap.

At the January 16, 2024 Board of Education meeting, the District began its formal process for developing the 2024-2025 school budget. The District will work between now and April 2 (our anticipated budget adoption date) to mitigate this budget gap, while doing all we can to maintain our fundamental mission to meet the needs of our students.

In order to sustain the quality of education our students deserve, we find ourselves in the unfortunate position of having to seek additional funding. The most viable solution at this point is to request a slight increase in local taxes. We understand the impact of taxation on our community, and I assure you that we have not taken this decision lightly. Any potential tax adjustment would be carefully considered and thoughtfully balanced to minimize its impact while maximizing the benefits for our students and the overall community. The funds generated from this modest tax increase would be dedicated to preserving and enhancing crucial educational programs, providing our educators with the tools and resources they need to continue delivering exceptional instruction and expanding educational opportunities that empower our students for success. By investing in our schools, we are investing in the future of our community, ensuring that our children receive the best possible education and are well-prepared for the challenges of tomorrow.

Kindergarten Registration

Kindergarten registration for eligible children in the Sauquoit Valley School District will be held March 12 and 13, 2024 from 4:00 - 7:00 p.m. in the elementary school office. Registration will be by appointment only. Please call the elementary office at 315.839.6339 to schedule your appointment. The time slots will be 20 minutes apart. Children do not need to be present for registration.

To be eligible for kindergarten:

- A child must be five years old on or before December 1, 2024
- The child must reside in the Sauquoit Valley Central School District

All paperwork listed must be handed in at the time of registration:

- A completed registration packet
- Copy of a birth certificate
- Immunization record
- Two proofs of residency*

*Required documents will be explained in detail in registration packet

If your child attends the Sauquoit Universal Pre-K Program, you do not need to schedule a time slot. Please send your completed packet in with your child and if we have any questions or need additional paperwork, we will contact you.

You will only have to supply the list below at the time of registration:

- A completed registration packet
- Any new immunizations*
- If you have moved since your child started Universal Pre-K, you will need to send in new proof of residency.

Students currently enrolled in Head Start or Universal Pre-K will receive a packet prior to registration. If your child is eligible for kindergarten and you have not received a packet, please call the elementary office at 315.839.6339.



READING to MAKING

With the generosity and support of many individuals and businesses, the elementary library has been adding and making some changes to help promote a culture that is centered around reading. Although Kelli will tell you that "you can learn to read with a stick in the sand," because it does simply require systematic phonics instruction, we love to put our own fun spin on it for our primary students.


Middle School News


