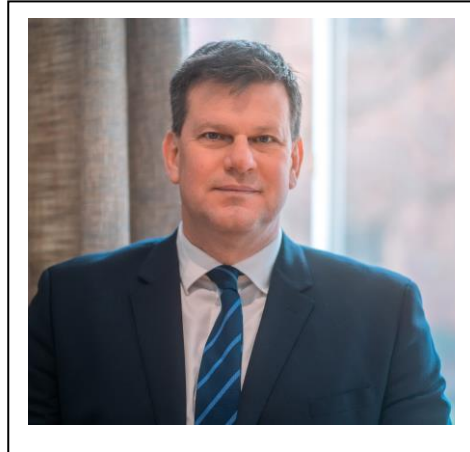


Headmaster's Welcome

The First Day of Term

What will I need to bring?

- **SCHOOL BAG/RUCKSACK:** To carry books and pencil case
- **PENCIL CASE:** Pen, pencils, coloured pencils, ruler, rubber.
Small glue stick and paper scissors are also useful items.
Pair of compasses and a protractor will be needed.
- **GAMES & PE KIT:** In a separate sports kit bag. We hope we will be playing rugby. You will need the following: a self-moulding gum shield and the girls to bring a hockey stick.

What will I be given?

What will I be asked?

- **LUNCH:** Will you be having School lunch or a packed lunch?

(The cost of school lunches are added to the termly bill.)

What will I do on arrival on the first day?

Go to Houserooms to meet the tutors at 8:25am. You will then be taken to your tutor classroom for registration and given instructions about the rest of the day.

Make sure you arrange with your parents where to collect you if you are being picked up.

Next Steps

There are several further induction events designed to settle the pupils in quickly and make friends for life!

In addition, a variety of events and opportunities will be available for you to come into School and meet parents and staff and new friends over the coming term.

Pre-season sport

We run some pre-season session in the weeks before the start of term. You will receive information about pre-season training over the coming weeks.

Meet the tutors

In the third week of term, we invite parents to come into school for a glass of wine and a chance to meet your child's tutor at the "Introduction to Year 7 Evening". It is also a chance to meet some of the other parents you will be standing on a touchline with for the next 7 years!

Camping

At the end of the third week, we all go camping! Staff and pupils all have a chance to get to know each other, enjoy the beautiful Somerset countryside and cook sausages!

Open Evening

After a few weeks, we ask the pupils to bring their parents into school. This is a chance for parents to see where the lessons take place, where their children meet their friends, meet some teachers and become more familiar with the School.

Parents' Evening

Regular Parents' Evenings are held throughout the year to provide an opportunity to talk to individual subject teachers about each pupil's progress.

Carol Service

A chance to join staff and our fabulous Chapel Choir for a delightful seasonal celebration, followed by mulled wine and mince pies.

Sports Fixtures

We do hope you will come along and support the various teams at home and away matches where possible. They are always very social and enjoyable event and a chance to meet other parents.

Drama and Concerts

There are frequent drama productions and musical concerts, which give everyone the chance to perform and parents are always most welcome.

Headmaster's Open Forums

The Headmaster hold regular open forums for parents to come along, hear from him and raise any queries they may have about any aspect of school life.

We are fortunate to have a very active and positive Friends groups, which comprises parents, teachers, ex-parents and individuals from the local community who wish to be involved. Communication

My School Portal

Much of the information about your child and communication with the School is done through My School Portal. This will have your child's timetable, grades, reports, activities and much more. You will be sent details of how to sign up – it is an excellent tool for keeping track of everything.

Calendar

A full school calendar is on the website and on My School Portal, so you can plan events, holidays and school commitments. We also produce a termly diary which lists all school activities, fixtures, trips, contact details, staff, parents' meetings and all planned events for the term – it is a fabulously useful little booklet!

Marketing and Admissions

You will always be able to get hold of someone to answer any questions you may have. You have, so far been dealing with the Marketing and Admissions team and they will continue to guide you until you join the School...and beyond.

Tutors and Head of Year

Once you join the School in September, pupils are put into tutor groups comprising around 12-15 children. Tutors will be the first port of call for any queries, concerns, questions or conversations – they will see you child daily and will know any issues arising, the background and the context. They play a crucial role in overseeing pastoral care and academic progress.

A separate Head of Year for both Year 7 and 8 will have general oversight of all activities within that year group who will closely monitor day-to-day progress. Both years sit within the Lower School, which is headed up by a Head of Lower School,. The Lower School meets regularly for assemblies, has shared common rooms and is a tight-knit community.

Requesting Absence

All requests for absence from School (excluding medical issues) must be made in writing. If it is for one day, this should come to Mr Swarbrick, j.swarbrick@wellington-school.org.uk or if more than one day, then it should come to the Headmaster, headmastersoffice@wellington-school.org.uk

Academic

Prep (Homework)

You will have Prep to do every day.

Often there is time to do some prep at school. The best place for this is in the library which is quiet and supervised; the computer room is also close by should you need it. If it is taking significantly longer than the time given to complete all prep set for one evening, you need to let your teacher or tutor know.

Academic Work

Grades are given every half term - dates of when grades are due are put in the school diary. They are also published on the School Portal. They are a good way to see how you are progressing. You can also be awarded merits, usually for excellent work, effort and for behaviour.

Learning Support

We have a fantastic learning support department, and pupils requiring individual support will have their needs assessed and a plan created.

Grades tracking/Report Cards

Grades are issued in each subject every 5 weeks. Conversations will be had with tutors if there is a cause for concern. Reports are issued and there is a Parents Evening at the end of the Autumn and Summer terms.

If there is persistent lack of effort, pupils may be given a report card which needs to be signed by the tutor daily to ensure focus.

Rewards

Merits and super merits are regularly given to encourage pupils and these will be issued through an email.

Class structures

All pupils in the Lower School are put into a class, and they take all their lessons in that class (with the exception of Maths, for which they are in sets).

Activities

After School Activities

A wide range of clubs and after school activities are available to all pupils in the Lower School. You sign up to activities through SOCS, and your tutor will help you.

Activities run from 4:00pm until 4:45pm each day and enable the school to account for every pupil during that time if they are remaining at school to catch buses or waiting to be collected. In addition, there are many lunchtime activities which you can participate in.

Activities may vary slightly from term to term. Some of the clubs have limited availability so it is important to get your form in as early as possible to secure places. There is a Prep club every evening.

Music / instrumental lessons and LAMDA

If you study an instrument or sing, you can have lessons at school. We have a wide and experienced range of visiting music teacher. You can sign up in the joining pack forms, or let your tutor know. You can also study for your LAMDA (drama) qualifications.

When: Once a week, in class time. The lesson will be in a different period each week.

Where: George Corner Music School (Music) – Southside (LAMDA)

How: You will be told by the Music/ Drama Departments when your next lesson is. There are also notice boards with timetables in the Music School and outside the Drama office - check the boards regularly.

Procedure: Ask permission from the teachers whose lessons you are going to miss, at least 24 hours in advance. Make sure you catch up with any missed work.

Sport and Fixtures

Team coaches will give everyone the chance to grasp the basics and inter-school fixtures are arranged for pupils in all age groups. We have a reputation to uphold and want the very best participants in the 'A' teams. However, we try to cater for all skill levels and in the Lower School there are A, B & C teams for most sports.

If you are picked to be part of a team you are representing the school. You need to show the right level of commitment and attend practice sessions and matches when asked.

Should you be unable to attend a practice, meeting or a match for any reason please let the team coach or relevant teacher know as soon as possible so that a replacement can be found.

Matches

Please remember that School matches on Saturday take priority over social activities

- ⚽ Make sure you know if you have a match and all of the relevant details.
- ⚽ Look at your calendar and the notice boards. Make sure you can play and have the right equipment. Tell your coach as soon as possible if you have a problem.
- ⚽ Make sure your parents know you are in a match especially if it is an away game and you will need to be collected at an unusual time.
- ⚽ If you are playing at home look after your guests right up to the point they go home and sit with them at tea.
- ⚽ If you have an away game, be good guests.
- ⚽ Listen to your coach's instructions.
- ⚽ Play your hardest (even if things aren't going your way) and support your team mates.
- ⚽ Never retaliate or argue with the referee/umpire. Remember she/he is right, even if she/he is wrong!
- ⚽ You are representing the school so be a good ambassador!

Don't forget, there are match teas for parents at home matches after the games and the café is open for you to grab a much-needed coffee before, or during the matches. Match teas at Wellington are legendary and a fabulous time to meet other parents and socialise.

The activities are designed to stimulate interest and allow pupils to make the most of opportunities. We strongly encourage all pupils to participate in as many activities as possible, but we do not want them to be overloaded! If you feel there is too much going on and the pressure is mounting, or if there are clashes between activities, please speak to your tutor who will sort it out – we do not expect pupils to have to be caught in the middle of departmental demands on their time.

Years 7 and 8 have games on Wednesday afternoon. They start in lesson time and sometimes do not finish until 4:30pm.



Logistics

Buses, start of the day

If you are coming on the bus, they arrive around 8.15am down at the Sports Centre. If you are being dropped off, the Quad or the “drop-off zone” by the zebra crossing are the best places to be. Make your way to the House Rooms to meet your friends, put your stuff in your locker – then you will go to either a tutor meeting, a house meeting on Chapel depending on the day. You will then go into your first lesson in your class groups.

Lost Property

If you lose anything, the cleaners scoop it up and take it to a very well organised room called “The Pound”. If it is labelled, it will be sorted into houses and you can go and look to see if your items are there.

Lunch

Most pupils have school lunches – this is all enjoyed together in the Dining Room, along with the staff. Lower School pupils go in first! If you do not want to have school lunches, you can bring a packed lunch which will be eaten in the Dining Room. The catering team provide for all diets, allergies, tastes and religions – so there will always be something delicious for you!

Mobile Devices

Pupils are not permitted to use mobile devices at school. We completely understand that they may need to contact parents, so they can bring them in and use them between 3.45 and 4pm if necessary, but we encourage pupils to chat to each other and communicate directly, rather than via a device.

We also strongly advise parents not to allow devices in bedrooms or after 7.30pm at night.

Common rooms

We have a delightfully large and airy social space, which is used by all Year 7 and 8 pupils. There are always members of the Lower School staff team on duty and we very often have visits from our Sixth Form mentors who engage with the pupils, advise and guide them in school matters.

Lockers and padlocks

All pupils have a locker to store their equipment, bags and books. They will need to bring in a padlock with a combination or 2 keys (we keep one – just in case it gets lost!).

Café

The café is open at break time, lunch time and after school and sells delicious home-made cakes, savouries, smoothies, drinks and snacks. Pupils can bring in money for the café.

Access to building – wristbands

All pupils will be given a wristband which gives them access to the buildings they need to get into (so boarders will have different access abilities). If they are lost, there will be a £5 charge for a replacement. They are individually coded, so if one is found, we know who it belongs to.

Buses – End of the Day

All buses leave at 5pm from the Sports Centre.
Activities finish at 4.45, to allow time to collect possessions and get to the bus in time.

Health Centre

If you feel unwell whilst you are in school, then the Health Centre is the place to go. The nurse will call your parents if they think it is necessary.

Uniform

All uniform is supplied by SchoolBlazer <https://www.schoolblazer.com/> who will also label items for you. They have an excellent "intelligent-sizing" system and a good exchange / return service if items are the wrong size.

In addition, we do have some second-hand uniform, and have regular sales, which we will notify parents of. Pupils joining us from the Prep School are permitted to wear their WPS blazer in Year 7.

School Houses

All houses are co-educational and run throughout the School from Year 7 to the Sixth Form.

Various competitions will take place throughout the school year which will involve either the whole House or a select group. Not all House activities are 'sport' based and all House members will get involved in fund-raising and other engaging group activities.

Older students will mentor the younger ones and welcome them into the School and their House.

The tutors play a crucial role in overseeing pastoral care and academic progress - if you have any problems then he/she is the first person you should talk to. You will have regular sessions with your tutors and your house each week.

There is also a Head of Year 7 and Year 8 who will closely monitor day-to-day progress and be an essential point of contact.

What if...?

- **....I lose something**
 - ❖ Ask a friend to help you try to find it or see your House Tutor/Housestaff. If the item has been found by someone else and was named it will be handed to your Housemaster/mistress. If it was not named it will be sent to the Pound (details of when the Pound is open is available from the School Office)
- **...I forgot something (a book or games kit)**
 - ❖ See the teacher. Check with the office - it may have been brought in by parents
- **...I am unhappy about something**
 - Talk to a friend or your House tutor/Housestaff and then speak to your parents when you get home
- **...I am feeling ill**
 - ❖ Go to the Health Centre but tell someone you are going first. If you are in a lesson, ask the teacher
- **...I am late for registration**
 - ❖ Go to the School office and sign in and then go to wherever you should be.
- **...I need to find a member of staff**
 - ❖ Go to the Common Room - someone will be there to help you
