The First Few Days...

The First Day of Term

What will I need to bring?

- SCHOOL BAG/RUCKSACK : To carry books and pencil case
- PENCIL CASE:
 - Pen, pencils, coloured pencils, ruler, rubber.
 - Small glue stick and paper scissors are also useful items.
 - Pair of compasses and a protractor will be needed
- GAMES & PE KIT: In a separate sports kit bag.
- We hope we will be playing rugby and hockey as usual, but under the current circumstances, we are unsure. We will let you know, but you will usually need the following;
 - All pupils to bring a self-moulding gum shield and the girls to bring a hockey stick.
 - (Opro gum shields may be ordered through the school once term starts.)

What will I be given?

- LOTS OF TEXT BOOKS & EXERCISE BOOKS—you will probably receive these in each lesson
- TIMETABLE

What will I be asked?

- LUNCH: Will you be having School lunch or a packed lunch? (The cost of school lunches are added to the termly bill.)

What will I do on arrival on the first day?

You will have received a letter telling you who your tutor is and where your tutor room is. During the Induction afternoon your tutor will have made sure you know where your tutor room meets each morning so make your way there for registration at 8:25am. You will then be given instructions about the rest of the day.

Make sure you arrange with your parents where to collect you as you are being picked up.

Next Steps

There are several further induction events designed to settle the pupils in quickly and make friends for life!

In addition, a variety of events and opportunities will be available for you to come into School and meet parents and staff and new friends over the coming term.

Communication

My School Portal

Much of the information about your child and communication with the School is done through My School Portal. This will have your child's timetable, grades, reports, activities and much more. You will be sent details of how to sign up – it is an excellent tool for keeping track of everything.

At the beginning of the academic year you will be emailed a reminder to log on and create a password. Pupils will be able to access the pupil portal using your general school log on details which you will receive in September. As a school we use email to communicate with pupils and parents regularly. It is important that we have up to date contact details so if there are any changes could you please let the school office know as soon as possible. All pupils are issued with a school email account and we ask that they get into the habit of checking these regularly.

We use Firefly as an on-line learning platform – tasks and homework can be set on this. Pupils will be given a logon to access all the relevant information.

Calendar

A full school calendar is on the website and on My School Portal, so you can plan events, holidays and school commitments. We also produce a termly diary which lists all school activities, fixtures, trips, contact details, staff, parents' meetings and all planned events for the term – it is a fabulously useful little booklet!

Marketing and Admissions

You will always be able to get hold of someone to answer any questions you may have. You have, so far been dealing with the Marketing and Admissions team and they will continue to guide you until you join the School...and beyond. Tutors and Head of Year

Once you join the School in September, pupils are put into tutor groups comprising around 12-15 children. Tutors will be the first port of call for any queries, concerns, questions or conversations – they will see each pupil daily and will know any issues arising, the background and the context. They play a crucial role in overseeing pastoral care and academic progress. You will have regular sessions with your tutors and your house each week.

Separate Heads of Year for Year 9, 10 and 11 will have general oversight of all activities within that year group who will closely monitor day-to-day progress. Both years sit within the Upper School, which is headed up by a Head of School Mrs Sam Dean and Assistant Head of Upper School, Mrs Claire Davies. The Upper School meets regularly for assemblies and is a tight-knit community.

Requesting Absence

All requests for absence from School (excluding medical issues) must be made in writing. If it is for one day, this should be requested by email and sent to Mrs Sam Dean, if more than one day, then it should come to the Headmaster.

Academic

Prep (Homework)

Homework is an important part of ensuring our pupils can work independently. In Year 9 the expectations increase as they begin to prepare for Year 10 and external examinations. A homework timetable will be published in September but Year 9 pupils should expect an hour each evening. It is extremely important that the pupil completes work, where possible, on the night it is set otherwise work can build up and become unmanageable by the weekend.

New Parents will be invited to create their own account on Firefly, once term is underway in September, where they are able to view their children's homework tasks. However, parents cannot see marks or feedback from those tasks.

Often there is time to do some homework at school, either at the end of the school day or occasionally at lunch times. The best place for this is in the library which is quiet and supervised; the computer room is also close by should you need it. If it is taking significantly longer than the time given to complete all prep set for one evening, you need to let your teacher or tutor know.

Academic Work

Grades are given every half term - dates of when grades are due are put in the school diary. They are also published on the School Portal. They are a good way to see how you are progressing. You can also be awarded merits, usually for excellent work, effort and for behaviour.

Learning Support

We have a fantastic learning support department, and pupils requiring individual support will have their needs assessed and a plan created.

Grades tracking/Report Cards

Reports are published twice a year for Year 9 and you will be alerted by email when they are ready to access on the parent/pupil portal. Effort grades for classwork and homework are also published regularly. These will be monitored closely by the pupils tutor and support put into place if it is required.

Conversations will be had with tutors if there is a cause for concern and appropriate monitoring put in place.

There are also Parents Evening twice each year.

Rewards

Merits and super merits are regularly given to encourage our pupils and as a parent you can view these on My School Portal.

Class structures

All pupils in Year 9 are put into a teaching class, and they take the majority of lessons in that class. There are some exceptions to this such as mathematics and languages. From Year 10 upwards, after they select their GCSE options, they will be in different classes for each subject.



Activities

After School Activities

There are an extensive number of activities available at both lunch times and after school. Tutors will discuss these with the pupils at the beginning of each term and pupils will be encouraged to commit to a number of these activities per week.

Once they are registered for an activity they are expected to attend regularly and commit to it fully. Our pupils are very busy and whilst we encourage this, it is important that they do not burn out. Please contact the tutor if you do have any concerns and they will help the pupils manage clashes and workloads.

Activities run from 4:00pm until 4:45pm each day and enable the school to account for every pupil during that time if they are remaining at school to catch buses, or waiting to be collected. In addition, there are many lunchtime activities which you can participate in.

Music / instrumental lessons and LAMDA

If you study an instrument or sing, you can have lessons at school. We have a wide and experienced range of visiting music teacher. You can sign up in the joining pack forms, or let your tutor know. You can also study for your LAMDA (drama) qualifications.

When: Once a week, in class time. The lesson will be in a different period each week.

Where: George Corner Music School (Music) – Southside (LAMDA)

How: You will be told by the Music/ Drama Departments when your next lesson is. There are also notice boards with timetables in the Music School and outside the Drama office - check the boards regularly.

Procedure Ask permission from the teachers whose lessons you are going to miss, at least 24 hours in advance. Make sure you catch up with any missed work.

Sport and Fixtures

Sports Fixtures are an important part of the Wellington School experience and we hope as many pupils will participate as possible. The school diary which is issued at the beginning of each term has all of the fixtures listed. Many fixtures for Year 9 are scheduled on a Saturday afternoon and the expectation is that pupils will embrace these opportunities. We appreciate that from time to time families may have another commitment but we ask that the sports department are given plenty of notice so another team member can be found.

Team coaches will give everyone the chance to grasp the basics and inter-school fixtures are arranged for pupils in all age groups. We have a reputation to uphold and want the very best participants in the 'A' teams. However, we try to cater for all skill levels and there are A, B & C teams for most sports.

If you are picked to be part of a team you are representing the school. You need to show the right level of commitment and attend practice sessions and matches when asked.

Should you be unable to attend a practice, meeting or a match for any reason please let the team coach or relevant teacher know as soon as possible so that a replacement can be found.



Matches

Please remember that School matches on Saturday take priority over social activities

- Make sure you know if you have a match and all of the relevant details.
- Look at your calendar and the notice boards. Make sure you can play and have the right equipment. Tell your coach as soon as possible if you have a problem.
- Make sure your parents know you are in a match especially if it is an away game and you will need to be collected at an unusual time.
- If you are playing at home look after your guests right up to the point they go home and sit with them at tea.
- If you have an away game, be good guests.
- Listen to your coach's instructions.
- Play your hardest (even if things aren't going your way) and support your team mates.
- Never retaliate or argue with the referee/umpire. Remember she/he is right, even if she/he is wrong!
- You are representing the school so be a good ambassador!



Don't forget, there are match teas for parents at home matches after the games and the café is open for you to grab a much needed coffee before, or during the matches. Match teas at Wellington are legendary and a fabulous time to meet other parents and socialise.

Trips and Events

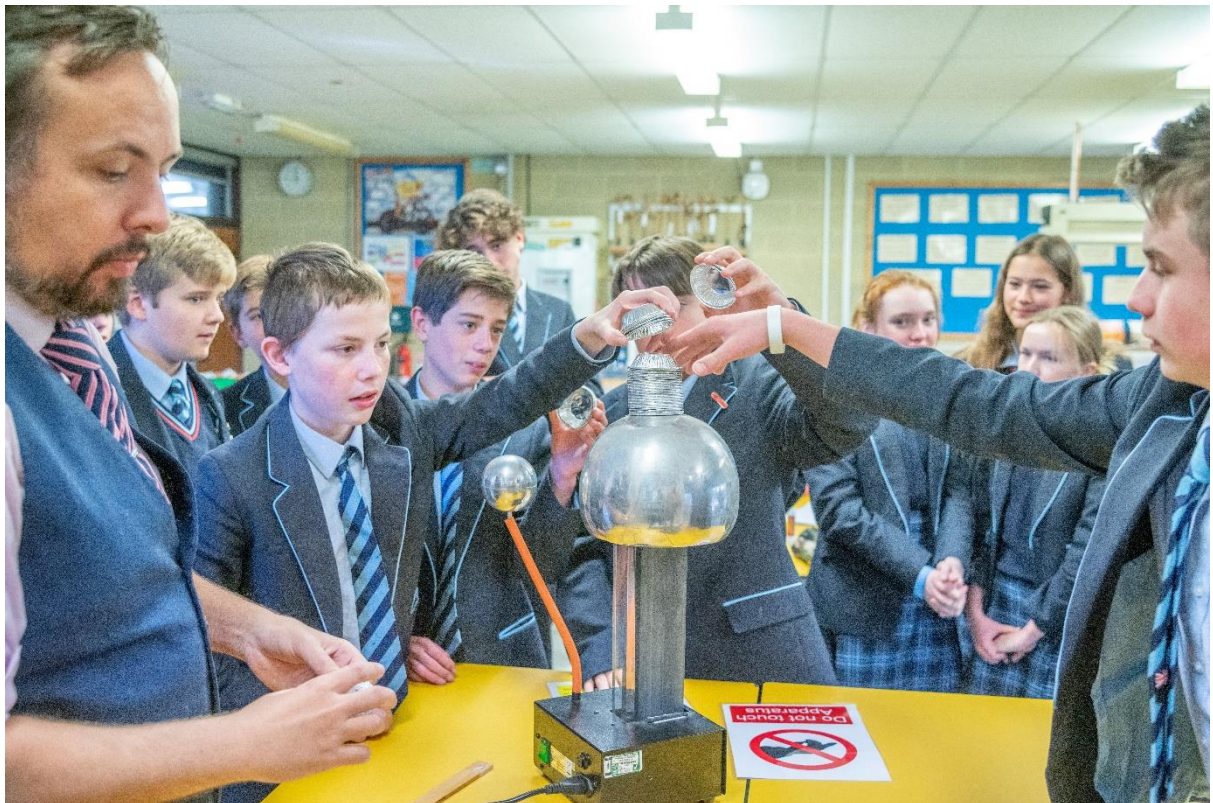

Logistics

Buses, start of the day

If you are coming on the bus, they arrive around 8.15 down at the Sports Centre. If you are being dropped off, the Quad or the “drop-off zone” by the zebra crossing are the best places to be. Make your way to the House Rooms to meet your friends, put your stuff in your locker – then you will go to either a tutor meeting, a house meeting on Chapel depending on the day. You will then go into your first lesson in your class groups.

Lost Property

If you lose anything, the cleaners scoop it up and take it to a very well-organised room called “The Pound”. If it is labelled, it will be sorted into houses and you can go and look to see if your items are there. It is situated in the cleaning manager’s offices which you pass on the way to the dining room opposite to the Lights Boarding House.

Lunch

Most pupils have school lunches – this is all enjoyed together in the Dining Room, along with the staff. If you do not want to have school lunches, you can bring a packed lunch which will be eaten in the Dining Room. The catering team provide for all diets, allergies, tastes and religions – so there will always be something delicious for you!

Our current Year 8 pupils will notice a considerable change with the lunch arrangements. They will be eating lunch much later at approximately 1 pm so a snack at break or some money for the cafe may be advisable for the more hungry amongst you!

Mobile Devices (Home and School)

We are constantly reviewing and updating our mobile phone policy but currently our Year 9 pupils are welcome to use their phones only with the permission of a member of staff.

Any pupil seen with their phone will have it confiscated and will need to collect it from the office at the end of the day.

We encourage pupils to chat to each other and communicate directly, rather than via a device.

We also strongly advise parents not to allow devices in bedrooms or after 9pm at night.

Lockers.

There are a number of **lockers** for the pupils to use around school and pupils should bring a padlock and keys so they have a safe place to leave their belongings.

Going intoTown

Year 9 and Year 10 pupils are not allowed to visit town after school as we feel they should be taking advantage of all of the activities on offer.

Supervision and Sixth Form Mentors

There are always members of the Upper School staff team on duty around school and we very often have visits from our Sixth Form mentors who engage with the pupils, advise and guide them in school matters.

Café

The café is open at break time, lunch time and after school and sells delicious home-made cakes, savouries, smoothies, drinks and snacks. Pupils can bring in money for the café.

Access to building – wristbands

All pupils will be given a wristband which gives them access to the buildings they need to get into (so boarders will have different access abilities). If they are lost, there will be a £10 charge for a replacement. They are individually coded, so if one is found, we know who it belongs to.

Buses

We have a huge range of buses picking up across Devon and Somerset. All details about routes, fees and bookings can be done through transport@wellington-school.org.uk. We expect high levels of behaviour on the journeys to and from school and any misbehaviour would be dealt with in line with school behaviour policy.

All buses leave at 5pm from the Sports Centre.

Activities finish at 4.45, to allow time to collect possessions and get to the bus in time.

Illness

If you child is are unwell and will not be attending school, you need to notify us by telephone or email. 01823 668800 attendance@wellington-school.org.uk by 9am. You can also notify us via My School Portal.

Medical Appointments

Please notify the tutor that there is an appointment, and sign in and out at Reception

Health Centre

If you feel unwell whilst you are in school, then the Health Centre is the place to go. The nurse will call your parents if they think it is necessary. Please ask your teacher/tutor or tutor for permission to leave the class.

Uniform

All uniform is supplied by SchoolBlazer who will also label items for you. They have an excellent "intelligent sizing" system and a good exchange / return service if items are the wrong size – they will also sew labels onto the uniform.

We would like to remind you all that we do expect our pupils to look neat and tidy so as you all go off for your long summer break please remember no extreme hair cuts or hair dying please. Hair should look neat and tidy. Please spend some time reading the uniform guidelines which can be found on the Schoolblazer website.

In addition, we do have some second hand uniform, and have regular sales. We will notify parents of these as they are planned.

What if...?

- **...I lose something**

1. Ask a friend to help you try to find it or see your tutor. If the item has been found by someone else and was named it will be handed to your tutor. If it was not named it will be sent to the Pound (details of when the Pound is open is available from the School Office)

- **...I forgot something (a book or games kit)**

1. See the teacher. Check with the office - it may have been brought in by parents

- **...I am unhappy about something**

1. Talk to a friend or your tutor and then speak to your parents when you get home

- **...I am feeling ill**
