Greetings and Happy New Year! On behalf of the students and staff of Ross Local Schools, we sincerely hope you had a wonderful holiday season.

I would like to take this opportunity to share with you some of our District's top accomplishments during this past year.

The 2022-2023 Ohio State Test results were released in the Fall, and I'm thrilled to report the Ross Local School District earned a 5-star rating. Furthermore, we were the only school district in Butler County to receive the 5-star rating!

We also excelled in the Performance Index category, a calculation that measures student performance on the Ohio State tests. Ross High School finished FIRST among Butler County high schools (grades 9-12) and Ross Middle School finished FIRST among Butler County middle schools (grades 6-8). Morgan Elementary finished FIRST and Elda Elementary finished SECOND among elementary schools (K-3). Ross Intermediate School finished FIRST of any school building in Butler County with two tested grade levels. Furthermore, Morgan, Elda, and RIS are the only three buildings classified as elementary and including any grades K-5 that achieved 5-star ratings in achievement.

These are remarkable rankings! We are thriving academically which speaks volumes about our staff, students, and families who work so hard to continue to maintain our standard of education. Our goal is to continue to challenge and grow each student every day.

We appreciate that this community is passionate about their schools. Thank you for all you do to help our students!

The Ross Local School District recently submitted the first of two required filings of the 5-year forecast to the Ohio Department of Education. The 5-year forecast is required by law to be submitted each year in November & May. The November version was approved by the Board of Education at the November 16, 2023, regular meeting. The forecast is a long-range financial planning tool that analyzes three previous years of actual financial data along with 5 years of projections including the current fiscal year (FY24). The forecast takes into consideration numerous assumptions including future revenue projections from our primary sources of funding including property tax revenue, income tax revenue, and state foundation aid. The forecast also utilizes assumptions on expenditures including salary and benefit increases, building and facility costs along with other purchased services.

From a revenue standpoint, we've mentioned previously that we are projected to receive an increase in state funding from the recently passed biennium budget and are also projecting an increase in property tax revenue from the real estate reappraisal for 2023. On the expense side, the forecast includes the projected savings from the change in health insurance plans as well as the salary increases from the recently approved Collective Bargaining Agreement with the Ross Education Association.

Our school counselors and the curriculum department continue to invest in student and staff wellness as well. 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

MRS. KAPPESSER'S TRANSITION TO LIFE CLASS

In the world of education, hands-on experiences are invaluable. For students in my Transition to Life class, a field trip in the fall to Headlines, a local printing and design company, offered a unique opportunity to see their creativity come to life through designing Ross spirit wear. This excursion was not only an educational adventure but also an opportunity for our students to gain valuable skills and insights into the world of custom apparel production all thanks to Headlines, a booming local business that specializes in creating custom apparel for schools, sports teams, businesses, and various organizations.

The students began their graphic design journey at Headlines, where they learned how their initial sketches evolved into digital designs, emphasizing the importance of color, font, and layout. Moving on to the production phase, they were introduced to printing techniques like screen printing and sublimation. The pressing area revealed the meticulous process of transferring digital designs onto garments, ensuring du-



rability and aesthetic appeal. This journey, from design conceptualization to the creation of spirit wear, proved both informative and fascinating.

But what set this field trip apart was the opportunity for our students to create their own shirts. With the assistance of Headline's experienced staff, the students were given the chance to personally hand make shirts they had chosen from a list of Headlines logos. This experience allowed them to see every aspect of shirt creation up close, from printing the design, laying the design, to precisely applying the heat for pressing. The excitement and satisfaction on their faces were unmistakable as they watched their shirts come to life in their own hands. The smiles were contagious as each student lifted the heat press and saw their chosen logo pressed onto the shirt they chose earlier.



One of the most important takeaways from the trip was the development of various skills. The students not only acquired technical skills related to graphic design, printing, and pressing but also developed teamwork, communi-

cation, and problem-solving skills. The collaborative nature of creating spirit wear designs fostered a sense of unity among the students, and they learned how to work together to bring their

ideas to life. They were also exposed to the importance of attention to detail, as even the smallest mistake in a design or print could affect the final product. In addition, they learned skills in entrepreneurship and marketing. Selling and creating the merchandise isn't the only benefit. Students are gaining financial literacy and mastering customer service. By using their creativity, critical thinking and project management skills, the students are becoming more prepared for life after high school.

The experience not only expanded their horizons but also helped them gain confidence in their creative abilities and ignited their interest in potential career paths in the industry.
