## Sixth Grade

## English with Ms. Stedje:

Sixth-grade Readers and Writers are beginning Q3 by hopping into social issue fiction book clubs! Students will be reading a chosen fiction book centered around a social issue and discussing the book in small groups.

In Writers Workshop, students participate in an Essay Boot Camp mini-unit. After we graduate from 'Boot Camp', we will be writing thematic essays about the books we are reading.

## Math with Mr. Klemme:

In math 6 we have continued our exploration of algebra. Most recently we've been using inverse operations to solve one-step equations. We will continue to explore equations, inequalities, and graphs here at the beginning of the 3rd quarter.

## Science with Ms. Crowley:

In $6^{\text {th }}$ grade Earth science, we have been working on our Cold Cup Challenge. Students have been designing, testing, and redesigning their cup using what they have learned about thermal energy. This project was a super fun way to end the quarter. We are excited to start quarter three beginning a new unit studying weather where they can apply also what they have learned about light and thermal energy.

## Seventh Grade

## Math with Mr. Klemme:

Students in pre-algebra have been exploring standards that work with ratios and proportions. We've been finding unit rates and constant rates of proportion. We will apply this knowledge to creating equations and graphs when we know the constant of proportion. In the following unit, Unit 5, we will explore and solve problems dealing with finding percents of a number, percent increase/decrease, and simple interest.

Social Studies with Ms. Newman and Ms. Atchison:
7th Grade United States History
Our Historians are currently putting their finishing touches on their rough drafts for their History Day Projects.
The theme is Turning Points in History. We plan on sharing our Final Projects with each other during the first week of class in the 3rd quarter. Students are finishing their website, documentary, virtual exhibit, performance, or paper to show what they know about their topic. Our official due date is February 2nd, 2024. After our due date we will be entering the competition part of our History Day experience. The Regional Competition is at Johnson Senior High on Saturday, March 16th. Students who wish to be considered for advancement to Regionals will complete a google form for the committee. More information about the Regional Competition will be emailed to students chosen to advance in February.

## Eighth Grade

## Math with Mr. Hayden:

In Integrated Math, we are finishing up our unit on Systems of Linear Equations and Inequalities. We learned three different strategies for solving systems of equationsgraphing, substitution and elimination. We also discovered the majority of systems have one solution- the point or ordered pair where the two lines intersect. However, there are some special systems that either have no solution or infinitely many. When we began to explore systems of inequalities, we saw that our solutions are now a specific region of our graph or any ordered pair that satisfies both inequalities. Although it is also possible to have a system of inequalities that has no solutions.

In Algebra, we are finishing up Part 2 of our Analyzing Linear Equations topic. In this unit we learned about 3 different forms of linear equations-slope-intercept form, point-slope form, and standard form and how all 3 of them are used, with an extra emphasis on slope-intercept form.

We also learned about the relationships between slopes of parallel and perpendicular lines. Parallel lines have the same slope and perpendicular slopes are opposite reciprocals of one another, or they can be multiplied to give a product of -1 .

Both classes will be taking their midyear assessment next to gauge our growth from the start of the year and both classes are also beginning to transition to entirely digital assignments, so it is paramount for students to remember to charge those iPads every night!

## Social Studies with Mr. Kareem and Ms. Croone:

Students are finishing up their History Day projects. It's great to see their excitement around the project! The completed projects will be the first assignment due for Quarter 3. Those students who are interested in competing will have a couple extra weeks to put the finishing touches on their projects. They should have their project ready for consideration for the Regional Competition by Feb. 16.

## MONDAY, FEBRUARY 12, 2024

SPPS will commemorate this day by holding individual school celebrations throughout the district, ending with a communitywide celebration and resource fair at Benjamin E. Mays Elementary in the evening.

## History of NAAPID - The Founder's Story

Inspired by the MiWion Man March, where 1.7 milwon African American men convened and made a vow to be more involved in their community:
In 1995, Joe (Dulin) attended the Millon Man March in Was hington, D. C. During the event, he witnessed a speech from a young orator who challenged the men in the crowd to go back to their communities and do more. That speech hit home for Dulin as he sto pped to call his wife a nd tell her a bout the experience and the message he'd just heard. "Joe called me from the march a nd said,' that boy was talking to me'," Yo nne ecalled. When he returned home, he set a bout creating the first National African American Parent Imolvement Day (NAAPID). Go ing back to his days in Detroit, Dulin remembered how critical parent imolvement was to getting kids into college. He thought by o rgarizing a day where parents could learn just how impo rtant that imvolvement was, he could make a change in his community. "The more parents are imolved in their children's education, the more s uocess ful the student will be," Monne said, adding that her hus ba nd believed parents a and teachers are a childs greatest ally.

Dullin launched the day in February 1996 and NAAPID has taken place on the second Monday of February every year since.
