How To Do Well In My Class:

Classroom Rules and Procedures

Make-Up Work (MHS Policy):

When a student has been absent for three (3) or more consecutive school days due to illness or excused absence the parent or student may call the Attendance Office to request make-up homework be sent to the office for pick-up. Please allow 24 hours for teachers to respond before coming to the office to pick up work. In the case of pre-arranged absences, it is the responsibility of the student to contact individual teachers for any make-up work prior to the absence.
