- II. Resolution No. 12-15-21
 - Resolution No. 12-15-21 was unanimously approved which ratifies the proclamation of a state of emergency by Governor issued on March 4, 2020 and authorizes remote teleconferencing meetings of the COC
- III. Public comment
 - a. Benjamin Bigarré asks that PUSD keep special education students in mind when considering facilities upgrades. Leonard Hernandez provides his contact information. Question from COC member regarding number of SPED students at Willard. Mr. Bigarré notes that the issues go beyond ADA compliance.
- IV. Approval of November 2021 meeting minutes
 - a. Approved unanimously
- V. Review of Measure TT and Measure O related Board Reports
 - a. No Board reports to review for this meeting. Two actions items from the last meeting: TJ is in attendance to review financial updates. Ms. Kenne requests that Bylaws be placed on Measure O page on website. Leonard Hernandez

reports that the website update is in progress, to include the Bylaws relating to both Measure TT and Measure O.

- VI. Board of Education COC Liaison Report Kim Kenne presenting
 - a. PUSD Board Organization update: Dr. Pomeroy is President, Ms. Bailey is Vice-President, and Ms. Kenne is Clerk as well as COC liaison.
 - b. The Board will meet on December 16, 2021 to review Facilities Task Force recommendations. The Task Force was given the job of reviewing sites without operating schools, and making recommendations to the Board for uses, including for example District use, workforce housing, revenue, and for the good of the community. Currently there is the potential for workforce housing at Roosevelt. A survey went to staff to gauge interest.
 - c. The Board will also discuss starting and Armenian DLIP at Webster Elementary, beginning with TK-3rd grade in the first year and building off of that.
 - d. Salary negotiations continue, with the exception of CSEA.
 - e. The redistricting process for PUSD trustees is underway. Maps will be sent to the public, with a final determination expected by the end of February, 2022.
 - f. At this time there are no dates set for January public outreach/townhalls, but that will be discussed and scheduled.
 - g. The First Interim Budget is up for approval. The current year looks pretty good with artificial revenue stream, but the out years look tricky. This does not however consider the California budget surplus and the District is awaiting word as to how that will play out.
 - h. Ms. Kenne attended the California School Board Association conference in San Diego, during which she visited the Accountability booth. TBD whether Accountability will continue doing PUSD's budget system.
 - i. Regarding Special Education and the earlier public comment, the issue will be whether we have the same amenities, i.e. sufficient bathrooms, play areas, places to be safe, etc., for kids that left Roosevelt to attend other schools. Roosevelt was designed with special needs students in mind. COC member discusses considering program access/accessibility as low-hanging fruit as projects to possibly be done soon.
 - j. Ms. Kenne notes that the Facilities Master Plan includes not only physical needs but also programmatical needs.
 - k. COC member asks if classrooms are broken down by type with respect to special needs students. Leonard Hernandez is getting input on that.
 - I. The Board committee assignments are changing, and the Board will discuss committees at its meeting tomorrow night. There is a recommendation for a 3-member committee to prioritize Measure O projects and create a Facilities Master Plan.

VII. Facilities Reports – Dr. Leslie Barnes

1. Kahua Presentation to PUSD/COC

- a. Rob Shrack gives a presentation and sneak peek regarding Kahua, a project management system to instill best practices and provide insight as to what is going on with the projects. Mr. Shrack reports that Kahua was built for owners, is easy to use, and provides productivity tools to generate documentation. He touts security. Kahua streamlines project execution: scope, budget, scheduling, risk, and quality. Mr. Shrack reports that Kahua allows users to follow how projects are doing financially, and to follow construction administration, including RFI's and responses, document control, and design management, as well as photographs and field documentation.
- b. COC Member asks about competitors, and what Kahua offers that others don't. Mr. Hernandez reports that PUSD interviewed three other firms as well: Procore, E-Builder, and Unifier. Mr. Hernandez reports that Kahua has a high reputation based on the experience of other school districts and higher education institutions.
- c. COC Member asks about Safeworks' experience with Kahua. From a program management perspective, Safeworks uses Kahua to provide dashboard a report that will be presented to the COC and to the Board. Kahua provides for special reports that are easier than working with other systems.
- d. Mr. Hernandez explains that Kahua is the platform for proceeding with construction programs and systems, and will join with Safeworks to provide the District with financial transparency.
- e. In order for Safeworks to manage the project, a project management system was needed to manage the contractors, cost and schedule. Kahua helps manage RFI's, costs, and the program.
- f. Accountability is a financial reporting tool. Safeworks has experience working with Kahua on other projects, most recently the Chaffey Community College with a \$750 million bond program.
- g. Ms. Kenne asks whether a program like Kahua was in place with respect to Measure TT. The answer is no. The last bond was run internally with an accounting system. Kahua will push information into Accountability.
- h. Mr. Hernandez explains that Kahua is a deliverable for Safeworks and is part of the Safeworks budget, not a separate expense.
- i. Mr. Sierra explains that Safeworks will provide reports to the COC, including for active projects, change orders, and projects whether started or not.
- j. The District will have a designated support person from Kahua when assistance is needed.
- k. COC member encourages Safeworks/Kahua to provide reports to COC that are identical to Board reports.

2. Consolidated Budge Status by Funds

- Measure TT Projects
 - a. For track and field, retention is all that is left for both schools. Approximately half a million was added for Altadena portables. The rest has not moved.
 - b. COC member asks about the chiller at PHS uncommitted moved up by \$100k.
 - c. Ms. Kenne asks about the chiller, restrooms, and campus appearance at PHS, each of which has uncommitted funds identified. Does that mean extra money or are we not paying for those. Answer: the work is done and we have some DSA fees to be paid.
 - d. \$495k was moved to Altadena for portables. There is a bit of a buffer there plus project manager expenses. Ms. Kenne confirms that the Board approved the project manager and the \$400k for portables.

• Measure O Projects

- a. Presentation by Kiyana. Page 35 of the pdf currently reflects \$19,822,859, of which there are four projects in the works. \$340k is for cleaning and refresh of leased devices. \$12,305,345 is for furniture and equipment, split into four payment allocations so as not to chew up the initial Measure O raise. It was split over multiple years to allow for the ability to do multiple projects.
- b. Presentation by TJ: COC indicates the spreadsheet provided is helpful. The goal is for COC to understand the reports.
- c. Ms. Kenne asks if these can be cross-referenced so that expenditures can be grouped together in both systems, including PeopleSoft and Accountability. Mr. Hernandez indicates that we don't control Peoplesoft and are focusing on Accountability.
- d. Ms. Kenne asks to have buckets included in PeopleSoft. Ana indicates that she usually asks for the resource codes and is sometimes denied.
- e. Ms. Kenne asks TJ, because we've signed a contract and made these payments, does that trigger our financial system to show it is committed. Ms. Kenne asks about the \$340k for devices that is bunched under refresh, and whether that should go with the buyout, or is it included with refresh because they have been made fresh and new. TJ explains that yes that is why it is grouped as it is.
- f. Page 36 of the pdf is the capital projects report, showing the current projects in place.

 - a. Resolution No. 1-26-22 was unanimously approved which ratifies the proclamation of a state of emergency by Governor issued on March 4, 2020 and authorizes remote teleconferencing meetings of the COC

IV. Approval of December 2021 meeting minutes

Minutes to be reviewed and approved at the February 2022 meeting along with the January 2022 meeting minutes.

V. Review of Measure TT and Measure O related Board Reports

Board Report No. 1537-F for Executive architectural services: DLR, Inc. was recommended. This is going to the school board tomorrow. Fiscal impact is \$1,283,524. COC member asks if hourly rate is set for term of the contract. Safeworks indicates the contract is for two years, and hourly rate is good for the duration of the contract.

COC Member asks about fee sheet for DLR – there is a delta of about \$300k. There are five items that Safeworks will provide, which will be presented to the Board. The contracts are not attached to the report. Item No. 15 is added which shows \$300k to be managed by the district for additional services, if applicable.

Item 16 on the sheet should be replaced to reflect the total board report amount (approx. 1.2 million) – to allow the money to be reconciled.

COC member Uriu notes that "meet with the Principals" is on the list. Question about work being done without community input. Leonard Hernandez indicates that this architectural firm does research and reaches out into the community. There will be surveys and meetings with the community including parents.

Task No. 13 involves work with district/facilities to provide opportunities for community/atlarge participation. The number of schools listed needs to be revised. This is for the master plan - pulling ideas and concepts - it then funnels out for community outreach meetings to determine what is best for the school based on a variety of inputs.

Regarding Number 2, preparation of condition assessments, \$215k, Ms. Kenne asks if this is different from needs assessments for the sites. Mr. Hernandez says it could be, though DLR has taken in the needs assessments. Ms. Kenne asks if they're already going out there and being paid for that if the needs assessment has been done. Mr. Hernandez replies that the needs assessment was for an overview, not down to the nitty gritty. COC member asks when the needs assessment was done – it was done about a year and a half ago per Mr. Hernandez.

Ms. Kenne question: If there are state-of-the-art science labs desired at each secondary school, where does that kind of programmatic determination from the board/district level happening? Ms. Kenne would not want to depend on each site wanting something different in that regard. Where at the district level does that planning happen? Mr. Sierra replies that will be on the revisions of the standards. The executive architect will take the district standards and revamp them.

Mr. Sierra advises that with this additional assessment, they are looking at HVAC, plumbing, roofing, etc. to evaluate the systems to assess what needs to be replaced, going into detail looking at boilers, chillers, window systems, ceiling tiles, floors, fences, security, etc.

Ms. Kenne asks if this includes all sites, including closed sites: Mr. Sierra responds yes.

Ms. Kenne asks about proper number and usage of facilities, and where does that happen. Mr. Sierra and Jesse discussed how to integrate demographics and move forward to 2022, 2027, 2050 etc. as part of those additional services. Part of the additional scope of work

will include evaluating demographics as we move forward, and an update of the educational master plan as well. They have an expert team that will do that portion of the work.

Ms. Kenne does not want to spend money on sites that in 5-10 years will not be needed.

Safeworks: The needs assessments you have today don't account for needs of systems, so this contract includes looking at the life-cycle

COC member asks about reimbursable expenses. The contract refers to language in the PUSD contract – Mr. Sierra indicates that the contract signed right now has a section that discusses reimbursable expenses in detail, under Article IV, on page 3.

ACTION ITEM: Safeworks to forward to COC the contract that was approved by counsel.

Board Report 1538-F: For outreach and labor Compliance Services. Fiscal impact \$274,982

Solis Group contract includes the hourly rates for five years. Ms. Kenne asks about length of the contract which is not stated clearly in the report. Per Safeworks, this is a 2-year contract with an option for 3 more years. This contract was not attached. This is a one-year cost, with a 2-year contract, with firm "not-to-exceed" costs for first year, that could go into a second year.

COC member raises question of hiring a consultant to get local businesses engaged, and wants to make sure community is also involved. Mr. Hernandez talks about discussions with the City and public about what to do different from what was done with Measure TT. Will be doing best to reach out to community, though not hiring a firm to do that.

Report No. 1539 – Two DSA inspection services.

There is no hourly in the package for Vital Inspection Services. Question whether they are the same rates as for Knowlsand. Mr. Sierra indicates that there are hourly rates, to be provided. Each firm to receive \$250k/year. The last sentence seems to be incorrect - Fiscal impact should be \$500k.

Safeworks was looking for several firms, and wanted to make sure there was enough capacity for Class 1 inspectors. This is especially important given capacity issues. Safeworks determined which firms got the contracts based upon their qualifications.

Ms. Kenne asks if this is a "do not exceed", i.e., we won't spend the money until there is a project they will be working on, and their time will be charged to that project. This is confirmed.

Ms. Kenne asks about using the Measure TT inspectors. They are not being used here, having moved on to other districts.

Board report 1540-F: Materials Testing Services: Fiscal impact \$250k. Smith-Emery, Koury, and Geocon West.

COC member requests that the contracts be included with the board packages where possible. Mr. Hernandez notes time constraints in putting those in, but that should occur more frequently as we move forward.

Mr. Hernandez notes that for clarity, the \$250k per vendor will be laid out. COC member points out that this is of import for the fiscal impact

Board Report 1541: For DSA Approved Shade Structures: This piggybacks off of the Fullerton Unified School District deal. Fiscal impact, just over 4.4 million. Smaller school districts like PUSD can get a better deal by piggybacking off of a larger school district's deal.

COC member asks about solar panel structures and how they might conflict. Ms. Kenne asks about the status of installation of solar panels. Mr. Hernandez explains that solar installations are complete with the exception of moving some at Altadena. No solar is slated for the future at this point, including at Longfellow.

COC member asks how does Safeworks know that Fullerton got a good deal. The drawings they provided are DSA approved. That is in the package for Fullerton.

Ms. Kenne asks about "playground resurfacing" shown on photos, and asks if the playground resurfacing is included. Safeworks will not be replacing shade structures or resurfacing. It is adding them where needed.

Ms. Kenne asks if trees will be cut down or green areas removed. At this point, Safeworks does not see a need to cut down or replace any trees as a result of shade structure placement.

COC member raises question of equity: Look at schools that had less money spent in prior measures forward. COC member mentions that optics are critical. Mr. Hernandez points out that these are just recommendations, to be presented to facilities task force.

Regarding Field elementary, it is believed this package contains and old picture and there is a playground there where the drawing is now.

COC member asks, re DLR proposal, whether they will do a tree analysis. Safeworks responds that is not in the scope of work.

VI. Board of Education COC Liaison Report

Education did okay in Governor Newsom's proposed budget for 2022-23. PUSD's average daily attendance is not great this year because of Covid. Regarding calculating attendance and income, one proposal is 3-year average daily attendance, which would protect PUSD in a declining enrollment environment.

The proposed budget included a higher COLA than was expected, which while not yet approved is a good thing. Overall amount of spending on education is highest it has ever been.

Preliminary enrollment is 14,545, a loss of 678 students since last year. The year prior PUSD lost 638 students, approximately 1,300 students over two years. Concerned that this includes loss of a lot of elementary-level students.

PUSD Board he had a presentation of task force recommendations at the December meeting, looking at different uses for sites. Next steps going forward are TBD. There was a presentation about use of sites but undetermined whether some will be declared surplus or not.

Tomorrow's Board meeting will include approval of Armenian DLIP for Pre-K-5 at Webster.

Covid test kits have been distributed to students/families. Fewer staff are out than were out during the first week back from the holidays. The district may still be using some Central Office staff to cover classrooms, but it is getting better.

Covid testing: About 350 positive results the week before return to school; 615 during the first week of school; 450 during the second week of school.

The Facilities Committee is resuming. Ms. Bailey (Chair), Ms. Hall Lee and Mr. Cahalan are the three members.

Ms. Kenne expressed the hope that the facilities committee will have a close relationship with the public to look into some of the priorities and to ensure that what is being done is equitable, and then the committee will bring its recommendations to the Board for approval.

VII. Facilities Reports

Presentation Mr. Hernandez, who introduces DLR Group, who has been selected as executive architect. DLR went through an RFQ/RFP, and was not only the lowest bidder, but

has also been named as the #1 architectural firm in CA. DLR is very familiar with master facilities planning.

Mr. Sierra explains that DLR did a great job with the statement of qualifications. DLR will produce a "live" document as a facilities master plan. Jesse Miller of DLR will explain how that will be done for the good of the COC.

Presentation by Mr. Jesse Miller, Jesse Miller, Principal-in-charge with DLR group. DLR will oversee the master plan for PUSD. Mr. Miller makes a presentation regarding DSA certification process and what that means, including a PowerPoint presentation on the 7-step process.

The web-based master plan is transparent to the community, and there can be live updates. DSA certification certifies the project is completed as required per Ed code.

Following Mr. Miller's presentation, COC member asks about average timeline for design process. The DSA transitioned to a project inspector card system a few years back. On average it could be as quick as two months for DSA certification after a project is complete. If something takes longer than 2-3 months it might be because someone didn't submit a required form.

VIII. Consolidated budget items

Measure TT: one project going on now. Ms. Kenne notes that for Measure TT, the total budget went down \$10k. The PHS track and field seems to have been taken out, and in Peoplesoft there is a project at Wilson identified. ACTION ITEM: Mr. Hernandez to get back to COC re that project. Per Ana, the Wilson project relates to anticipated expenditures for project management.

The only Measure TT project currently is at Altadena elementary school, where it is anticipated the portables will be set in the Spring, and they are on track to be completed by Summer.

Ms. Kenne: there is approximately a half-million dollars which isn't showing yet. Ana indicates that this may refer to the accrual for last year. Whenever accrual, it has to be set aside to be paid for last year, not this year. Ms. Kenne is looking at ending balance for fiscal year from last year. But when we started the new year, we started lower by half million. Ana: we have to set aside money for last year expenses which we can't move over to pay for this year. Ms. Kenne expresses hope that separate buckets will be set up in Peoplesoft to track.

Measure O: Device refresh includes list of all projects. Unallocated is basically a holding fund until TJ gets board approval and then assigns projects.

IX. DSA Closure status

Page 204 of the package: DSA closure status. Types of Closeout letters. Donald Cristobal is one of the project managers on the Safeworks/Facilities team who comprised this new format for closeout letters. Mr. Cristobal explains the process. Given a list of DSA assigned projects, cross-checked to get a certification status from DSA. The first page lists four different types of categories for closure of certification.

The next slide lists 30 projects with certification of compliance, then there are some (nine of them) with close of file without certification. Nos. 1-9 are what is left to close due to missing reports. Construction is complete. Some are "cancel without refund", some are notification of requirement for certification, and some are access only and some are resolution of decertification. (See this list for notes)

Mr. Hernandez: These were measure TT projects. Items 1-9 are works in progress. With respect to the 3 items on the list that are "on hold," the likelihood of getting them done by the dates indicated are slim, so they will drop down to "cancel without refund."

The Track/Fields at PHS and Muir are not on this list as they were not DSA projects.

Non-Competitive Justification

The purpose of this memo is to provide non-competitive justification for the below-described purchase order request.

BACKGROUND: The existing public announcement (PA) system at Washington High School is not functioning at the Gymnasium and Building A. The campus PA utilizes a Bogen Engineered System. The equipment needed to complete the work must be system compatible and additionally, the installation must be performed by an authorized installer.

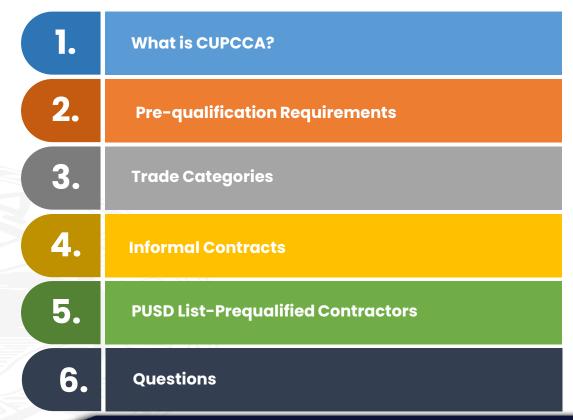

What is CUPCCA?

- Pasadena USD elected to become subject to the CUPCCA procedures (PCC §22032)
- CUPCCA California Uniform Public Construction Cost Accounting Act Informal Bid Procurement Process
- Provides for alternative bidding procedures when an agency performs public project work by contract (up to \$200,000)
- In November of each year, participating districts place an ad in various construction trade journals inviting all licensed contractors to submit the name of their firm for inclusion on the district's list of qualified bidders for the following calendar year.

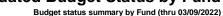
Consolidated Budget Status by Fund
