Earning College Credit in High School

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What is concurrent enrollment?


- Concurrent Enrollment refers to high school students taking a college course through the college, outside of the high school bell schedule
- High school students can take community college courses for free (with the exception of textbook and other fees)
- Some community college courses can count for BOTH high school and college credits
- Students can take up 11 college units during the Fall or Spring, and up to 8 in the summer

What's the difference?


There are many ways for students to earn college credit in high school:

- **AP courses**- students are required to earn a 3 or above on the College Board AP exam in May (colleges independently decide whether or not they will accept this credit)
- **Dual Enrollment**- where a student is taking a college course at their high school within the bell schedule earning BOTH high school and college credit (completely free for students)
- **Articulation**- certain high school courses (typically CTE) have agreements in place where IF a student enrolls at the articulated community college after passing the course with a B or higher, they will obtain college credit for the course

Dual enrollment can be accomplished with or without a Career Access Pathway (CCAP) Agreement



Finding courses for early college credit

- Choose your own adventure: General Education, or Major-specific?
- **Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC):** pattern of core academia that UC and CSU require for a Bachelor's Degree
- **Major-specific:** courses applicable to the program of study you will pursue at community college or university



IGETC COMPLETION SAMPLE

Completion of at least 37 units in specific courses in areas
I-5 *and* at a Grade C or higher.
