Assembly Bill 101

- AB 101 adds the completion of a one-semester course in ethnic studies to the graduation requirements commencing with pupils graduating in the 2029-30 school year.
- School districts and charter schools are required to offer an ethnic studies course commencing with the 2025-26 school year.



Course Description

This course will operate from the consideration that race and racism, have been, and continue to be, profoundly powerful social and cultural forces in American society. The class will examine California as a microcosm of the United States and focus on themes of social justice, social responsibility, and social change by increasing student agency. Ethnic Studies will use primary and secondary sources, class discussion, and project based learning as the basis for inquiry.
