Get to know Lister Hannah

Lister is a fourth-generation Australian, who was born and spent his early years in East Africa. He completed his secondary education in Australia and graduated from the University of Melbourne. Together with his wife Davidene, he taught in Australia, New Zealand, the UK and Canada, where he also pursued graduate studies, and in 1972, became principal of Digby Regional High School.

In the mid-1970s, Lister served as headmaster of International School Moshi (now UWC East Africa). Over the next 20 years he was a principal at United Nations International School (UNIS) New York, headmaster of Munich International School (where he also helped establish the Bavarian International School), and in the 1990s returned to Australia as the head of Geelong Grammar School. In the 2000s, he co-founded the Prem International School in Chiang Mai and was involved in establishing Phuket International Academy (PIA, now UWC Thailand) and IGB International School in Kuala Lumpur.

Lister has extensive consultancy experience, and has previously been heavily engaged with the Council of International Schools (CIS) and the accreditation of schools. He has long been involved in sports, the outdoors and the arts. He remains on several school and education-related boards in both Asia and Australia. With a lifelong commitment to educating for a sustainable future, Lister has been a Trustee of the Jane Goodall Foundation in the United Kingdom, helping to launch her youth environmental initiative "Roots and Shoots" in Europe, and is also a co-founder of Compass Education.

In 2008, Klaus Hebben established Phuket International Academy (PIA). Facing challenges in its inaugural year, Klaus enlisted Lister's expertise in July 2009 to guide PIA through a pivotal period of development and expansion. As the Executive Chairman of the Management Board from 2009 to 2012, Lister's remit was to oversee the development and growth of PIA. This included establishing PIA as an International Baccalaureate (IB) World School, the embedding of Social-Emotional Learning and Mindfulness, and the expansion of facilities to support its growing student body and educational programmes.



With a good leadership team in place, Lister left the Management Board and moved to Kuala Lumpur but remained on the School Board until 2014, when he settled back in Melbourne. Over the next few years, he maintained occasional contact with the school mainly through visits. With his background at Phuket International Academy and long-standing ties to the UWC movement, Lister keenly observed Phuket International Academy's transition to a UWC. He was delighted when in 2016, UWC Thailand was established. The emphasis on scholarships promised an enhanced global diversity of nationalities, cultures, and socioeconomic student backgrounds. However, what was especially pleasing was that the philosophies of both Phuket International Academy and the UWC movement were significantly complementary: 'Good Heart, Balanced Mind, Healthy Body' blended seamlessly into the UWC framework of action and educating for a more sustainable, peaceful future.

In 2020, as part of Project Independence, Lister joined the new UWC Thailand Board, starting in January 2021. Honoured to accept, he remains committed to seeing the school thrive as a UWC school and continues his involvement as a board member.

Yearly Update

UWC Thailand Strategic Plan 2021 - 2026

During the 2022/23 year, UWC Thailand continued to move forward with our 5-year Strategic Plan with a focus on **PEOPLE**, **PLACE**, **PROGRAMME** and **PURPOSE**.

Some Strategic Plan successes in 2023/23 include:

- The introduction of our **Director of Wellbeing**, allowing for the development of data recording of the non-academic elements of a UWC experience.
- Successfully transitioning Multicultural Day to Intercultural Day and Festive Fair
 to Festival of Light with the intention of reframing the language used, with the
 continuation of building our bespoke definition of global citizenship/international
 mindedness.
- Change of the Primary timetable to end with a reflection time at the end of the school day.
- Modification of the Middle Years Programme schedule to prioritise interdisciplinary learning time.
- Joining the **ASEAN Sports and Activities Conference (ASAC)**, allowing us to partake in international, competitive sports.
- Plastic Free Phuket working alongside the Phuket governor promoting sustainable practices and reducing our environmental impact.
- The addition of **Spanish language** to Middle Years and Diploma Programmes.

Supported by the School Board, the UWC Thailand Strategic Leadership Team continues to support the school in planning and implementing steps that move our strategic plan forward.






Manta Annual Fund

The 2022/23 academic year saw the official launch of the Manta Annual Fund. The funds raised through the annual fund were directed to our three key areas for the year: scholarships, learning spaces and areas of greatest need (financial requirements that support our mission and goals).

Scholarships

The classes of 2022 and 2023 consist of 135 students from 74 countries representing a variety of academic, socioeconomic, cultural and language backgrounds. 57% of these students received partial or full scholarship funding. This funding has been provided through individual donors, community donations and school partnerships. The Manta Annual Fund will continue to provide life-changing scholarships and a world-class education to our next generation of leaders.



Learning Spaces

Learning spaces are just one part of how the Manta Annual Fund supports new teaching and learning initiatives, helping to better prepare our students to become problem solvers and future leaders. Gifts received make a difference to our students' learning experiences!

Area of Greatest Need

Gifts to this fund are unrestricted and are used to help wherever the need is greatest, supporting a diverse range of important projects. This year, funds were used to support the movement of refugee students from Kabul to Phuket. It was also used to support some boarding maintenance projects that had been deferred due to the pandemic.

Heads Retreat

in Israel / Palestine

As UWC seeks to make education a force to unite people, nations, and cultures for peace and a sustainable future, there is an imperative to know, understand, and support our vulnerable communities around the world, impacted by ongoing violence, strife, and conflict. A six-day journey through the holy, and heavily disputed, lands of Israel and Palestine in March 2023 provided over half of the Heads of schools and colleges within the UWC movement, including our own Head of School, Lural Ramírez, with the opportunity to experience first-hand one of the central conflict zones from which our UWC students are selected - Israel and Palestine. The following are excerpts of Lural's insights shared with our staff after the trip and during our monthly Staff Colloquium, a shared time designed for collective reflection and future thinking in relation to our school's position of responsibility within the UWC movement.

In reflection on Jerusalem and the Aida Refugee Camp:

"Jerusalem sits as what many refer to as the heart of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, with ongoing tensions in a land that is a religious centre for Jews, Muslims and Christians. With ever increasing expansion of Israeli settlements since 1967, Jerusalem sits as a bit of a boundary line in the ongoing conflict between Israelis and Palestinians as both entities see the land as their state capital. The complexity of the dispute, combined with its multiple layers of implications, has led to tense, ongoing and challenging negotiations, with little hope for change in the future. Our time in Jerusalem, Ramallah, Bethlehem and the Aida Refugee Camp, allowed us to bear witness to the harsh political, economic and social reality of the region, with significant deterioration of Palestinian living conditions and ever present struggles for peaceful and just coexistence between the two states.

The morning after my night in the Aida Refugee Camp, as I walked up the hill to the ancestral farmlands of my host

family, now fenced off and with settlements upon them, the words from outside of the exit gate to the Holocaust museum in Jerusalem came to mind: "I will put my breath into you and you shall live again, and I will set you upon your own soil..." Ezekiel 37:14. "Whose soil was I witnessing?"

Considering the opportunity to have met with National Committee leads from both the Israeli and Palestinian National Committees:

"It was inspiring to meet with UWC alumni from different schools and colleges within the movement and to hear their stories of personal transformation and impact following their two-year UWC experience. Our alumni spoke of the perspectives gained, the impact of personal connection with a people they have been taught from birth to resent and the potential to make an impact in their communities in the region. UWC Atlantic alum and The Guardian Middle East reporter, Bethan McKernan, made an especially impactful impression. Sharing dinner with her and hearing her speak of her reporting in the region, her experiences, and how UWC shaped her perspectives on service and the responsibility to engage in work that makes a difference was enlightening. It gives me hope for what our young people might be able to contribute to our movement's mission. In Tel Aviv we joined the weekly protest of the Israeli people against their government's actions in regards to judicial overhaul and the passion and commitment our alumni displayed to ensure a peaceful and stable future for the region was inspiring, even in the midst of turmoil, conflict and protest.

There are no simple solutions in the region and there is hurt and need throughout. As a movement, we must stay informed, extend compassion and work actively for peaceful resolution of the world's conflicts."

Awards and Recognition

East Asia Regional Council of Schools (EARCOS) Leadership Conference 2022, Bangkok, Thailand

Our Head of School, Lural Ramírez, joined a panel of Heads of Schools in a presentation led by ISC Research's Pia Maske, at the EARCOS Leadership Conference. After a presentation on the latest market data in relation to International School Governance, a review of key trends and emerging practice, and the take-aways on ISC's governance research, the session moved to a more interactive phase. Lural and colleagues shared their experiences in regards to governance shifts post-COVID and their recommendations to governors as they seek to best support their respective school communities.



EARCOS Teachers Conference 2023, Kota Kinabalu, Sabah, Malaysia

With the objective to share the strength of our programming across three pedagogical areas - Transformative Learning, Mindfulness and Outdoor Education - our Head of School, Lural Ramírez accompanied our Director of Outdoor Education, Rob Carmichael, Director of Mindfulness, Kim Young, and secondary teacher, Amanda Molnar, to the EARCOS teachers conference in Malaysia to share three separate presentations designed to highlight our educational model as a school and to engage in exchange of ideas with other like-minded educators.



EARCOS Humanitarian Award

The Richard T. Krajczar Humanitarian Award recognised the outstanding efforts of UWC Thailand and their partnership with Ban Ya Literacy Centre in 2021. This prestigious award was officially presented at the EARCOS Leadership Conference held in Bangkok in October 2022. Representing the school, Heidi Oxley-Whitnell had the privilege of conducting a workshop that showcased the impactful work of UWC Thailand with the Ban Ya Literacy Centre. Additionally, Heidi had the honour of delivering a presentation during the award ceremony, which was attended by more than a hundred Heads of School.

Admissions Conference 2022, London, United Kingdom

Our Director of Admissions, Marketing, and Engagement, Raquel Silva, participated in the closing panel at the OpenApply Admissions Conference in London. Alongside Claudine Hakim from the International School of London, and Joshua Clark from TASIS, The American School in England, the panel, led by Catalina Gardescu, CMP, PR, and Communication Specialist, discussed enrolment management and success strategies. Key topics addressed included optimal enrolment alignment, resource optimisation, smooth student transitions, and encouraging re-enrolment and positive word-of-mouth. UWC Thailand showcased strategic actions that led to a remarkable 46% growth, making this conference an excellent opportunity to share our success.

Outstanding Schools Asia 2023, Online

Head of School, Lural Ramírez, chaired a panel discussion during the 2022/23 Outstanding Schools Asia conference. The panel discussed the ways in which international school leaders create sustainable and ethical schools, including how international schools positively contribute to the global sustainability agenda, the steps school leaders can take to ensure equity amongst educators and contingent staff, and the importance of ethical education for the development of global citizens. It was an honour for UWC Thailand's Head of School to be asked to chair this powerful conversation, joined by leaders from Green School Bali, Education in Motion and Chinese International School.



Thai Teacher Awards

Srisuphak Boonbongkarn and Saruta Paothong of UWC Thailand have been awarded 'Outstanding Teacher of the Year in Private School' by the Ministry of Education, recognising their dedication, innovative teaching methods, and significant impact on students. Student Agency: Empowering Young Minds

At UWC Thailand, we encourage students to take ownership of their learning and make meaningful choices. Throughout the year, we witnessed an increase in the student voice, choice and ownership in their learning including:

- **Personalised Learning:** Our students actively engaged in setting learning goals and monitoring their progress. They embraced the opportunity to pursue areas of interest and showcased their unique talents through an increase in the number of mini-exhibitions, assemblies, and (in grades 3-5) co-constructing their report cards.
- Leadership Opportunities: Students participated in various leadership roles (Student Council representatives, Student Ambassadors, and House Captains) during the school day. These positions allowed students to develop essential leadership skills.
- Community Involvement: Our students took an active role in community engagement
 initiatives, fundraising events, and environmental projects. They demonstrated
 empathy, responsibility, and a commitment to making a positive difference in the world
 around them.

Staff Collaboration: A Collective Commitment to Excellence

Collaboration amongst our dedicated staff has been a focus for us this year with a deep dive into how we use our collaborative time effectively to support the social/emotional and academic lives of our students. Some notable successes include:

- More collaborative meeting time: We restructured the start of our Thursday morning
 to allow homeroom teachers the time and space to work together on math and language
 written and taught curriculum. Moreover, the addition of collaborative time at the
 end of the day (during Ma Ruam Gun) allowed our student success team (composed
 of counsellors, Accelerated English Language Acquisition Programme and Language
 Support teachers) to meet with homeroom teachers once a week to discuss students and
 set action items to support at-risk students.
- Parent-Teacher Partnership: Our staff actively communicated and collaborated
 with parents and guardians, ensuring a strong home-school connection. Through the
 increased use of Toddle, our educational communication app, expansion of Hopes and
 Dreams conferences to include all teachers, and grade-specific (as well as whole Primary)
 parent workshops, we promoted a shared responsibility for the success and wellbeing of
 our students.
- Co-teaching and co-planning: We continued to build on the strong collaborative
 nature of our staff and increased the amount of co-teaching and co-planning taking
 place throughout the Primary school. Increasingly, grade levels are seen less as two
 separate classes and more as one large group with two teachers (i.e. from "my class" to
 "our students"). This approach allows more flexibility and enables relationship building
 amongst our students, enables staff to adapt teaching approaches to best suit needs,
 offers mentoring, and encourages more creativity in planning. Teams regularly work
 together to reflect on learning and make choices for the learning ahead.







Enhancing our UWC Thailand Model of Learning and Teaching

Our model is a wonderfully complex one where a transformative learning experience relies on the embedding of our foci (student-centered academics, service, sports and activities, outdoor education, and social-emotional learning). Some of our successes this year include:

- Coordinators: the introduction of math, language, and early childhood coordinators
 has encouraged more discussion, planning, and reflection around these subject areas
 and sections of the school. Our Middle Leadership team have worked incredibly hard to
 support the understanding of our written curriculum and think differently about how they
 approach core subjects in the classroom.
- Commitment to 'The Outdoor Classroom': we increased the amount of time our students spend outdoors through the deeper integration of outdoor learning and community engagement opportunities integrated into our units of inquiry. We continue to push outdoor education from the realm of a 'one-off' unit to something integrated daily into the teaching and learning of our student's lives.
- Authentic Language Development: this year, Thai learning and teaching time increased
 in kindergarten to grade 3 and officially introduced our mother tongue programme for
 students in grade 3. This has allowed students to learn and practice a language in their
 immediate community or include their first language development during the school day.
- Data Analysis and Monitoring: we sharpened our focus on the collection and use of
 data (MAP results, GloSS and JAM mathematical interviews, benchmark assessments,
 classroom observations, and teacher conversations) to identify areas of strength and
 growth. This data guided our instructional planning and interventions, enabling targeted
 support for each student and clearer monitoring of student progress in both homeroom
 and specialist classes.

Looking Ahead: Commitment to Continuous Improvement

Reflecting on the past year, the school has seen significant successes and is eagerly looking forward to building upon these achievements and setting new goals for the future. There's a continued commitment to expanding the programme, with a particular focus on learner agency, collaboration, and inquiry-based thinking.

Gratitude is extended to the students for their hard work and determination, the teaching staff for their dedication to daily learning and teaching, the support staff for their role in the effective functioning of the school, and the parents and community members for their ongoing support. This collective effort has been instrumental in creating an environment where every child can thrive in all areas of their learning and lives.



Future Change-makers

Secondary School Programming

DocuMantaRays

Beyond the academic achievements and community spirit celebrated at graduation, individual student projects like the grade 6 documentary on elephant conservation, exemplify the hands-on learning and personal growth that are hallmarks of the UWC Thailand experience.

DocuMantaRays are short documentary films created by our grade 6 students as part of their Interdisciplinary Unit. These films showcase students' creativity and storytelling skills, and they serve to raise awareness and inspire positive change.



Student Agency: Empowering Young Minds

At UWC Thailand, our commitment to transformative learning is embodied in our close collaboration with the IB to pilot innovative initiatives for grades 11 and 12. These pilot programmes are not only about expanding the range of courses available to our students but also aim to revolutionise the IB Diploma assessment model to be more inclusive and supportive of diverse learning styles.

- Open Book Exam Pilot: The class of 2024 will partake in the Open Book Economics exam in May 2024. This innovative format permits students to use personal notes, emphasising critical thinking, creativity, and inquiry skills over rote memorisation.
- Creativity, Activity, and Service (CAS) Pilot: Beginning August 2023, our grade 11 students explored a redesigned Creativity, Activity, and Service (CAS) component of their IB Diploma. The traditional CAS reflections will be replaced by a portfolio aligned with UWC Thailand's Mission and Values, intertwining their CAS experiences with our educational ethos for more personalised and meaningful reflections.
- Language and Culture Pilot: Starting in August 2023, we introduced a 'Language and Culture Course' for the IB, in line with our diverse student community. This course explored the relationship between language, culture, values, and social dynamics, ideally suited for our multicultural students at UWC Thailand.

These pilot programmes exemplify our dedication to educational innovation, aligning with UWC Thailand's mission to offer an education that is academically challenging, culturally enriching, and socially aware. These initiatives are shaping a curriculum that equips our students to excel in a complex, global society.

Pathways in grade 11 and 12

At UWC Thailand, we recognise the diverse needs and aspirations of our grade 11 and 12 students. To support this diversity, we offer several 'Pathways' to graduation, each tailored to different learning styles and goals.

Full UWC Thailand High School Diploma

Grade 8

8 days in Krabi

Emphasising eco-friendliness and environmental impact, the camp promoted teamwork, resilience, and an appreciation for nature.



Grade 9

9 days along Phuket's Coastline

Kayaking over 70km along Phuket's coastline using self-crafted paddles, students also contributed to a mangrove planting service project. The expedition, a culmination of camping, kayaking, and leadership training, focussed on personal responsibility, teamwork, and a deep appreciation for the environment.



Grade 10

This 10-day camp focussed on developing sailing skills for a 5-day expedition on 25-foot keel boats. Training included sailing techniques and safety procedures, complemented by a service day with 'Seeds of Change'. Hands-on Insights

Experiential Learning at UWC Thailand

Experiential Learning at UWC Thailand integrates real-world company experiences into the educational journey, blending theory with practice. Key foci include real-world application, skills development, career exploration, networking, personal growth, and social responsibility. This holistic approach prepares students for global complexities, whilst instilling a lifelong passion for learning.



From October to January, grade 9 Design Technology class students crafted their own wooden kayak paddles, mastering woodworking, power tool use and CAD programmes. Their perseverance was rewarded as they used these paddles to navigate over 70kms of waterways around Phuket during the grade 9 camp.



Students furthered their experiential learning by taking on the role of visitor liaisons which allowed them to acquire practical experience in a real-world environment. Engaging directly with attendees, they honed vital communication and interpersonal skills by managing diverse interactions.

Grade 10 Work Experience Week

During their work experience week, our Grade 10 students had the opportunity to choose and spend a day in diverse off-campus work environments. Each selected location offered a unique learning experience, covering sectors such as physical fitness, hospitality, conservation, healthcare, and real estate. This personalised approach allowed students to explore career paths of their interest and develop practical skills in those areas.



At U Time Fitness, students observed the operations of a gym and discussed growth plans for the brand. This provided an opportunity to learn about this sector of the wellbeing industry.



Activities included strength and conditioning coaching, Muay Thai, health and yoga instruction for students interested in the mind-body connection.



Students with hospitality skills and a passion for animals participated in restaurant service and tour guiding. They delved into organic farming, gaining insights into farm-to-table concepts.



Students tried various roles, including contact centre operation, taxi relations and housekeeping. This experience suited for those who may wish to venture into the hospitality industry.



This experience included kitchen food preparation, restaurant service, barista and juice training experiences. Students were taught valuable communication and customer service skills.



Tailored for those interested in the medical field or in areas of sourcing and business operations, students learned about the role of a pharmacist and stock management.



The day included an introduction to real estate, agent training, office visits, and property viewings, aimed at students eager to learn about the real estate market, business management and marketing strategies.



Tasks involved sorting, clearing, cleaning, labelling merchandise and customer interaction. It appealed to those interested in fashion and the sustainable production of clothing.



Students either worked in sales at a central outlet or created website content. This experience suited those interested in ocean conservation and the sustainable companies emerging on the island of Phuket.



The focus was on planting and working within nature, perfect for students who love being outdoors and who wanted to connect to the local community.







Nurturing Emotional Intelligence

Social-Emotional Learning & Mindfulness at UWC Thailand

Primary and Secondary Programming

Our Primary school students experience Social-Emotional Learning and Mindfulness as integral parts of their daily activities and Units of Inquiry. Through age-appropriate practices, they developed skills in emotional regulation, empathy and kindness. In Secondary, our approach was tailored to the unique needs of adolescents, incorporating Daily Time-In sessions and Health and Wellbeing classes. We provided additional support during critical periods such as exams and transitioned grade 12 students with a specially designed camp focusing on preparing them for life beyond school.

Parent Engagement

Recognising the importance of parental involvement, we hosted monthly Wellbeing Walks, combining physical activity with mindfulness practices. Parents also participated in regular Yoga and Meditation sessions. Our Emotional Intelligence and Breathworks workshops, along with the Foundations of Mindfulness course, were well-received, strengthening the ties between home and school and enhancing our community's overall wellbeing.

Teacher Professional Development

Investing in our teachers' growth, we offered comprehensive professional development opportunities focused on Social-Emotional Learning and Mindfulness. These included Orientation Week activities, a Foundations of Mindfulness course and training in Mindful Communication and Mindfulness-Based Stress Reduction techniques. This not only equipped our teachers with skills to incorporate mindfulness into their teaching practices but also supported their personal wellbeing.

Presentation at East Asia Regional Council of Schools (EARCOS) Conference

At the EARCOS conference 2023 in Kota Kinabalu, we showcased our journey and achievements in Social-Emotional Learning and Mindfulness. This platform allowed us to share our innovative practices, learn from others and contribute to the wider conversation on integrating these approaches in international education settings.

Values-Aligned Day - Mindfulness

Values-Aligned Days in 2023 provided a unique platform for both staff and students to engage in leadership roles centred around mindfulness. These days were marked by activities and sessions led by students and staff, reinforcing mindfulness as a core value and demonstrating our commitment to a holistic learning environment.

Leadership Opportunities for Diploma Programme (DP) Students

Our DP students were given numerous opportunities to lead and participate in Social-Emotional Learning and Mindfulness activities. They facilitated sessions, shared personal experiences and mentored younger students. This involvement not only honed their leadership skills but also deepened their personal practice and understanding of mindfulness, preparing them for mindful leadership in their future endeavours.



Finding meaningful work and building significant relationships have been central to our 14-year journey of balancing internationally mobile careers. As adult third culture kids with cross-cultural backgrounds, our paths to UWC Thailand and international teaching have been distinct yet converging.

Laura's journey began with her move to Canada from Romania as a teenager. Adapting to a new culture and language sparked her interest in facilitating cultural understanding, a passion that led her to study Psychology and Spanish at Concordia University, followed by a Bachelor of Education at the University of Ottawa. Over 14 years, Laura's teaching career has spanned Canada, China, South Africa and now Thailand, driven by her passion for languages and cultural connectivity.

Loy Krathong is a Thai festival held annually in November, marked by the release of 'Krathongs' - small, ornate baskets made of banana leaves, adorned with flowers, candles and incense. This ritual, symbolising the release of negativity and seeking forgiveness from the water goddess, brings together people of all ages for music, dance and Thai cuisine. As the Krathongs float on water at night, they create a stunning visual, embodying gratitude, nature reverence and renewal, integral to Thailand's cultural heritage.




Steady Growth

Blueprints for Brilliance

UWC Thailand's Development and Growth

Ongoing development and transformation of our Master Plan came about throughout the 2022/23 school year, with transformation of the full Master Plan and important forward momentum in regards to the new Boarding House.

Master Plan Evolution

In the 2022/23 period, the evolution of our campus Master Plan was a collaborative effort, informed by extensive consultations with our Boards and donors. Guided by the insights and recommendations from our Boarding Task Force, which diligently examined our school's growth strategies and development requirements, we made significant progress in refining and advancing our Master Plan.

The latest Master Plan modifications achieve the following:

- Integration of our infrastructure independence projects, designed to bring onto our campus our own electrical, potable water, waste water, fire protection, internet and IT.
- The addition of the final draft design of the new Boarding House.
- The addition of a Sports Complex remodel of our existing small gymnasium, which will integrate locker rooms

for students and adults as well as provide two full basketball courts and four volleyball courts.

 Remodelling of the current Multi-Purpose Hall to establish a dedicated indoor Auditorium and Performing Arts Space.

New Boarding House - final design stages

Highlights include:

- A two-story building with central access and a common space.
- The layout is designed to maximise movement and community interaction across both boarding buildings.
- A capacity to accommodate 60 students and four staff apartments.
- Shared spaces will include a common room, quiet room, seating areas, laundry room, storage room, and kitchenettes.
- Our long-term goal is to achieve a final boarding capacity of 158 students, housed in two on-campus buildings.

Arin's Story

The Enduring Impact of Future Women Leaders

Meng Heang (Arin), from Cambodia, embarked on her educational journey at Seametrey Children's Village in her home country. Her aspiration led her to apply to UWC through the Cambodian National Committee, resulting in her placement at UWC Thailand in August 2021. Upon her arrival, Arin was honoured with the UWC Future Women Leaders Scholarship, a prestigious two-year comprehensive award, granted in recognition of her moving application.

The UWC Thailand Future Women Leaders Scholarship is a scholarship programme created by generous UWC Thailand parents and patrons, who committed support to 10 students over five years, supporting young women as future leaders. The yearly selection process identifies two or three female grade 11 students, one of whom must be of Thai nationality, who have a chance of receiving a two-year fully-funded scholarship for the International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma Programme. The qualities that the selected students should possess are: strength of character, commitment to equality, mindful leadership, service and academic standing.

As a UWC Future Women Leader Scholarship recipient, Arin was able to participate in monthly Round Table discussions, where invited guest speakers from around the world shared their experiences as female leaders. Arin also represented UWC Thailand at the Phuket Women's Day event sharing her

story and experiences with the broader community. Arin was also elected as co-leader of an extracurricular activity 'Because I am a Girl' (BIG) - a group where topics of women's rights are discussed and injected with different perspectives from multiple countries. Arin worked closely with this group until graduation.

Back in Cambodia, Muoy You, Arin's Head Teacher at Seametrey Children's Village, expressed heartfelt gratitude to UWC Thailand and its Head of School, Lural Ramírez through a letter filled with appreciation. Muoy You wrote, "I wanted to thank you and UWC for extending this opportunity to Meng Heang and Cambodia. Your school truly lives up to its name." This letter, along with a yearbook from 2011 - 2012 showcasing Arin's photos, symbolises the enduring impact of this opportunity.

While Muoy You had aspired to witness Arin's graduation from UWC Thailand, she sadly passed away before being able to attend the event. However, Arin's mother proudly attended her graduation in May 2023, celebrating her achievements and the opportunities afforded to her by UWC Thailand, delivering the letter and yearbook from Arin's first Head of School, in person to our own Head of School.

"As I look back on my memory-packed two-year experience I can see immense growth in my character. This change inside of me is for the better and the connections forged at this time of my life will always be a core memory I cherish. It still puzzles and amazes me looking back on how much I have done and the number of diverse people I met, in just 24 months or less."


Scholarships at UWC Thailand




Financials

The school is required by Thai law and the UWC International Office to produce annual financial reports for submission to relevant Thai authorities and the UWC International Office. We take this opportunity to share these reports with our community through this 2022/2023 Annual Report.

As is usual with international schools, the predominant source of income is from school fees, which are collected as per the schedule of fees published on the school's website.
