ACADEMICS

Many OIS students choose to take part in academic competitions beyond the school curriculum. Their dedication and enthusiasm drive them to push their intellectual boundaries, and sometimes lead to outstanding results.

Mathematics

- OIS students made their mark nationwide in the ABEL mathematics competition, with one IB2 attaining a perfect score in a tie for first place. Another student placed in the top five, and also represented Norway on the national team in the 2022 Baltic Way maths competition held in Tromsø.
- In the middle school competition of the ISMTF (International Schools Mathematics Teachers Foundation), three OIS teams ranked in the top ten worldwide.
- OIS students have been competing in the under 12s Maths Quest competition for the last eighteen years. This year, our Year 6 team stood among the top five. In the individual section of the competition, an OIS student won the silver medal.



Science

An IB2 student achieved the top spot in the second round of the 2023 Norwegian Physics Olympiad, going on to qualify for the team that will represent Norway in the International Physics Olympiad in Tokyo in July 2023.



Languages

- With their winning video about gender equality, Upper Secondary Spanish students impressed ambassadors of six Spanish speaking embassies, securing first place in Oslo's 2023 Spanskfestivalen. They were also awarded a 3-day cultural language trip to Madrid.
- Lower Secondary French students achieved first place and Upper Secondary French students achieved second placed in Norway's final of the ILC (International Language Competition) in Kristiansand.





In the International Writing Competition, Untold Tales Youth Writing Competition, an IB1 and a Pre-IB student won first and second prizes, respectively, in the poetry competition. A second IB1 student won best short story.

Model United Nations



- In their first Model United Nations (MUN) competition of the year, OIS won eight out of a possible ten independent awards from a competing delegation of 120 students.
- At their second event in the greater Oslo area, and with more than 100 competing delegates from six participating schools, OIS students swept half of the Best Delegate and Best Speaker awards.

RESULTS

Our students consistently achieve results that are above national and international averages.

Nasjonale Prøver

Norwegian compulsory tests (Nasjonale prøver) provide information on skills in reading, arithmetic and English. In Primary, there are 3 bands (mestringsnivå) of attainment, with Level 3 being the highest.

Year 5:

English: 91% achieved Level 3

Numeracy: 55% achieved Level 3, 36% achieved Level 2 Norwegian: 45% achieved Level 3, 55% achieved Level 2

In Secondary, the points* attained were also above the national and regional average in all three subjects areas.

Year 8:

English: 62 points (compared to a national average of 50) Numeracy: 58 points (compared to a national average of 57) Norwegian: 55 points (compared to a national average of 50)

Year 9:

Numeracy: 60 points (compared to a national average of 54) Norwegian: 58 points (compared to a national average of 54) English: *not tested in Year 9*

*Total possible points are 80.





International Schools Assessment

The International Schools Assessment (ISA) is an internationally benchmarked assessment for primary and middle school students (Years 3 - 10). Tests are conducted in Years 4, 6, 8 and 10 at schools with an international focus.

In all three subject areas, Mathematical Literacy, Reading and Writing, results were higher than all categories of schools in almost all comparisons worldwide.

IB Diploma Programme

In what is recognised as the most rigorous pre-university programme in the world, our academic results speak loudly. The OIS class of 2022 achieved well above the worldwide average in the IB Diploma Programme.

100% pass rate, alongside a worldwide pass rate of 85%

37 mean points in comparison to a worldwide mean point score of 31.98

28 points or more earned by all students, an impressive accomplishment considering **24** points (out of a possible 45 points) is the passing requirement

44 points highest score out of a possible 45 points

39% achieved 40 points or more (**top 14%** of Diploma candidates worldwide)

5.91 mean grade in comparison to the worldwide mean grade of 5.12

41% were awarded Bilingual Diplomas (27% worldwide)



ACTION

Sport

With our competitive sports programme continuing to grow and diversify, several trophies were won at home and away. On the field, court and track, our students exemplified the spirit of teamwork, perseverance, and sportsmanship.



- In basketball, the Junior Boys and Junior Girls teams won first prize in the Nordic League (NL) tournament in Copenhagen. The Senior Girls team won all four games in the senior NL tournament in Helsinki, while the Senior Boys also placed first. In the Norwegian International Schools League (NISL) in Stavanger, the Junior Boys brought home the trophy.
- In football, the Junior Girls took the top spot in the first NISL tournament, and the Junior Boys secured second place. The Senior Boys and Senior Girls teams were runners-up in the Nordic Sports League (NSL) tournament in Stockholm and Oslo, respectively.
- In badminton, the Junior players achieved second place in their first-ever competitive event in the NL tournament in Copenhagen, while, in cross country, the OIS runners had the most wins in the first NISL cross country event.

Service

Through philanthropy and fundraising, our students foster meaningful connections with local and international organisations, making a real and tangible impacts through service action.

- IB1 students travelled to Mozambique to lend support and muscle power to a community centre build in Bobole.
- Year 10 captivated Norwegian educators at the Skole i Verden conference at the University of Oslo (UiO), with their views and vision on the power of experiential learning.
- Year 9 were commended by Katapult Ocean, on their Seaweed Farm presentation about entrepreneurship and ocean sustainability, described by judges as "better than some in the professional world."
- Year 8 took part in the Mycellium Project in parnership with UiO, and applied concepts from National Geographic's "Cities of the Future" in their creation of a Minecraft ecofriendly city.
- Year 7 students participated in HoldNorgeRent and led a significant significant beach clean-up of Huk Beach on the Bygdøy peninsula.



 Primary engaged in initiatives to recycle, mend and exchange clothes during Earth Week. School-wide clothes donations, and an Upper Secondary organised food drive went to Fattighuset in Oslo.

Fundraising

This year, our fundraising activities supported four main charitable organisations: Bobole in Mozambique, Doctors without Borders, Clean Coast Anglers, and Fattighuset.

- Chores for Change raised nearly 15,000 NOK, while Primary Student Council generated over 8,000 NOK in just one day through a bake sale and recycled jewelry sale during Earth Week.
- Kindness Week raised more than 10,000 NOK through various activities such as ice lolly and bake sales, guessing treats in a jar and a student versus teacher basketball game. Upper Secondary fundraising, organised by Interact and Doctors without Borders student clubs, totaled 31,445 NOK.
- Lower Secondary Student Council raised almost 9,000
 NOK through fundraisers like Halloween Boo Candy
 Grams, winter and spring dance tickets, and bake sales.





Community

The involvement of parents, alumni and local partner organisations, in various aspects of school life, has continued to enrich the learning environment at OIS.

- Community members have generously shared their expertise, volunteered in classrooms, and engaged in many OISPA-led activities like Spirit Wear, Trunk or Treat, and the Primary Easter Egg Hunt.
- We have also welcomed back several former students to share their experiences of life after OIS at university and beyond. In May, we were honoured to have one very special alumni, OIS founder Elsa Hvas, join us to celebrate her 90th birthday.



Nationalities of our Students




FINANCIALS

OIS is a non-profit organisation. The school operates within an approved annual budget, and the fiscal year runs from 1 January to 31 December.

Revenue is generated by school tuition fees based on annual enrollment. No government funding is received to support Years 1 through to IB2.
