

Superintendent's Message




SUPERINTENDENT, MRS. YVONNE GILLIAM

Congratulations to our many local, regional and state winners in Beta Competitions, Governor's Cup, Science Olympiad, and several other academic endeavors. Successful students are usually a result of dedicated teachers. Our Board meets the third Tuesday of each month at 6:00 p.m. You are always welcome at our meetings. I need your support and involvement in order to keep our district focused on children.







Lone Jack School Center students celebrated the 100th Day of School on Wednesday, February 3, 2016. They celebrated with an educational fun-filled day of activities. All of the primary teachers (Kindergarten through 3rd grades) greeted their students with streamer door signs that read: "Get Ready to Party! It's the 100th Day! 
100th Day of School



National School Lunch

The National School Lunch Program (NSLP) was conceived in 1946 as a "measure of national security to safeguard the health and well-being of the Nation's children." School districts receive federal reimbursement for each school lunch served that meets the United States Department of Agriculture nutrition guidelines. These guidelines promote meal quality while commodity donations help the farmer and help schools keep down

. Federal regulations require that we offer minimum portion sizes of meat, fruit and/or vegetable, whole grain breads and fluid milk during every lunch meal service. The portion sizes are designed to meet the needs of growing children and, as a rule, we increase the sizes as the children grow older. Only whole grains are offered at lunch and at least 50% of the time at breakfast . We offer a variety fresh fruits and vegetables every day. The menu cycle provides for variety and allows us to make the most efficient use of the donated commodities, especially seasonal fresh fruits. We offer 1% and fat free milk, as well as 100% fruit and vegetable juices



Expanded Dental and Health Services Coming Soon

Bell County School students will have expanded dental and health services through mobile dental units and a telemedicine station before the school year ends. Grace Community Health Center, who has provided school nurses in each of our schools this year, will be expanding their services by adding a telemedicine unit in the elementary schools and providing mobile dental health screenings and preventative care to PreK thru twelfth grade students.

Previously only students in PreK through sixth grade received dental care. With this new plan, students will still be seen by Dr. Kathy Lefevers, but services will be extended through twelfth grade. Dr. Kathy will bring the mobile unit into the schools where students' teeth will be examined, cleaned, and treated in the school. Any restorative work will still be performed in her office.

With the implementation of telemedicine, students will have remote access to a nurse practitioner even if one isn't physically at their school. Students can be diagnosed and treated without having to leave their building.




